CUSTOMS DUTIES.

Levied under Customs Tariff Ordinance No. 1 of 1910 and 14 of 1910.

TABLE OF IMPORT DUTIES.

- On distilled liquors (other than drugs and medicines imported for bona fide medical purposes), eau de cologne and lavender water, per gallon at 50 degrees of the Gay Lussac alcoholometer at a temperature of 15 degrees centigrade Rs. 5
- The duty to be augmented proportionately for each degree above 50 degrees and diminished proportionately for each degree below 50 degrees.
- On all other goods of every description not being specially exempted in the third table to this Ordinance an *ad valorem* duty at the rate of ten per cent.

TABLE OF EXEMPTIONS FROM IMPORT DUTIES.

- Personal baggage consisting of wearing apparel and other articles of personal use, as are in actual use at the time of importation, or have been actually in use previously, and are the property of the person whose baggage is being passed or of any member of such person's family;
- Bicycles, binoculars, photographic cameras, and sewing machines which have been used, and instruments intended for the professional use of passengers, forming part of passengers' baggage and not intended for trading purposes;
- Goods which imported by, or purchased prior to clearing through the Customs by and for the use of the Governments of the East Africa Protectorate or of the Uganda Protectorate;
- All horses and mules;
- Other live stock imported for breeding purposes, provided that:
 - All live stock imported for breeding purposes for which exemption from Customs duty is claimed shall, except in cases where permission is given by a Veterinary Officer, be landed at Kilindiini.
 - All such live stock shall in order to be admitted free of duty be of a class which in the opinion of the examining Veterinary Officer is likely to improve the existing stock in the country;
 - Live stock for the purpose of this exemption means cattle, sheep, goats, donkeys, swine, ostriches and poultry;
- Goods imported by or consigned direct to officers and men on board vessels of His Majesty's Navy for their personal use or consumption; If goods imported by a merchant are sold to His Majesty's Navy, such goods shall be treated as goods re-exported;
- Ships and vessels imported entire or in section;
- Material for the construction and maintenance of railways, tramways and roads;
- Trees, plants and seeds intended for cultivation;
- Tombstones and ornaments for graves, memorial windows, tablets and brasses;
- Coal;
- Photographs, engravings, pictures and maps;
- Gold bullion;
- Coin admitted to circulation in the Protectorate;
- Agricultural implements and machinery and all apparatus and plant usually and principally employed in farming operations.
- Sheep and cattle medicines whether for internal or external application. For the purpose of this exemption, medicines shall be deemed to include powder and other preparations for the composition of sheep and cattle dips and licks.
- Manures and insecticides;
- Industrial machinery: moulds for the construction of concrete forming;
- Printed matter, which term shall include newspapers, periodicals, literature, fashion plates, pamphlets, music, trade catalogues, price lists, show cards, calendars, and all printed or lithographed matter used or intended to be used solely for advertising purposes.
- Officers' uniforms, viz: the uniform of a Naval, Military, or Protectorate Officer, including the necessary arms, badges and accoutrements thereto;
- Regimental plaques, furniture, and other mess fittings and band instruments the property of any Regimental Mess or the joint property of the Officers of any Regimental Mess.
- Officers' camp furniture and fittings imported as a necessary part of their equipment.
- Goods imported for the use of His Majesty's Land and Sea Forces in the East Africa Protectorate on satisfactory proof to the Chief of Customs that they have been imported solely for the use of His Majesty's Land and Sea Forces and are the property of His Majesty;
- All articles necessary for maintaining telegraphic communication between British East Africa and other parts of the World;
- All coats of arms, flags, seals and official stationery and such other goods as the Governor may from time to time by notice in the *Official Gazette* declare to be within the exemption in respect of any Consulate imported by a Consular Officer on presentation by him at the Customs House of a certificate given by the Consulate for which they are destined, that the articles are for its exclusive use.

- Cups, medals or other trophies imported for presentation or presented as prizes at examinations, exhibitions, shows or other public competitions, for excellence in art, bravery, good conduct, humanity, industry, invention, manufactures, learning, science, skill or sport or honourable or meritorious public services; provided that such articles shall on importation or delivery free from the Customs bear engraved or otherwise indelibly marked on them the name of the presenter or presentee and the occasion or purpose for which presented.
- Wire and wire-netting for fencing, droppers, gates, hurdles, posts, standards, strainers, staples, stiles, winders, and other materials or fastenings of metal ordinarily used for agricultural or railway fencing.
- Empty bags (other than paper bags) and crates for flour, manure, produce, sugar, wool, coal and minerals, and bagging and sacking in the piece and binding twine.
- Bands and belting of all kinds for driving machinery.
- Motor vehicles suitably constructed for, and intended to be usually and principally employed in, the conveyance of goods; and spare parts of such motor vehicles.
- Petrol.
- The luggage, equipment, and stores imported by the Inspector General, King's African Rifles or his Staff Officer, for the use of the said Officers or either of them whilst travelling on duty.
- Machinery, plant, materials and rolling stock, when imported or purchased prior to clearing through the Customs by the Magadi Company for the purpose of the construction or the initial equipment of the Magadi Railway or the Magadi Company's port.
- Every Officer of the Protectorate may introduce one rifle, one shot gun, one revolver, and 300 rounds of ammunition, free of import duty.
- Electric cable or wire, the posts for carrying the same and all other material required for the purposes of generating, storing or distributing electric energy, whether for power or lighting, on satisfactory proof to the Chief of Customs that such articles and materials have been imported solely for such purposes. Such exemption shall not include lamps or their fittings or material, other than industrial machinery, required for the purpose of using electric energy.

- Refund of full duty is allowed on goods declared for transit when exported, if applied for within six months from date of transit entry.

No fees are leviable by a Provincial Commissioner or a District Commissioner for cases under these rules but, in case of appeal to their Courts against the decision of the Native Council, fees are leviable as in the Courts.

All fines imposed by Elders shall be paid by the Council to the District Commissioner and form part of the Protectorate Revenues. The District Commissioner may pay out any such fine to natives as compensation, if due according to native custom. If such compensation shall be paid to a Chief or an Elder the consent of the Provincial Commissioner must first be obtained.

Report of Improvements in Agriculture during the year 1914-15.

Live Stock:	Crops—(contd.)
<p>CATTLE—</p> <p>The outlook in the cattle trade continues to be very good. Rinderpest has broken out in several places, but it has been combated by the use of Anti-Rinderpest Serum. Further, certain large areas have been inoculated against the disease, and in process of time the whole of the settled area in the country should be immune.</p> <p>Dipping has disposed of the risks once attendant to East Coast Fever.</p> <p>Anthrax was formidable this last year, but it also is being defeated by vaccine.</p> <p>Prices for all classes of cattle show a slight advance on those of last year, pointing to increased trade and greater demand.</p>	<p>Sisal—</p> <p>The excellent prices obtained last year have again continued, and, owing to the opening of new factories, the output of fibre has considerably increased. The area under the crop has been largely extended.</p> <p>COTTON—</p> <p>From the Coast Belt, the cotton crop has only proved satisfactory from Jubaland. In the Highlands, experiments with tree cotton have given very promising results during the last two seasons, and the area under this crop has been increased. Small quantities of seed have been distributed by the Government for extensive trial in this district. In the Lake District of the Nyanza Province, the natives have put a considerable area under this crop. Under the weather conditions prevailing, the harvest has been satisfactory. Owing to the war, the prices at present are somewhat reduced.</p> <p>FLAX—</p> <p>This crop has again produced excellent results and large areas have been put down. One Scutching Factory has been in operation for some months, and materials for others have already reached the country. The reports received from home brokers seem to foretell a most successful and profitable development of this industry.</p>
<p>SHEEP—</p> <p>These have had on the whole a favourable year, and the trade in them is very encouraging.</p> <p>HORSE—</p> <p>There are now many country bred animals by imported Stallions to be seen, and these show very fine quality.</p> <p>Disease has been present in places. Lymphangitis giving most trouble, but it is hoped in time to be able to cope with it.</p>	<p>FRUIT—</p> <p>Large orchards have been established during the year of oranges, lemons, and limes, particularly of the latter. The analysis of the citric acid content of the local lime is most encouraging, the numbers obtained surpassing those of the best Tahiti lime. It is proposed to erect a factory for the purpose of exporting citric acid.</p>
<p>PIGS—</p> <p>Pigs have been a profitable proposition for those who have given the animals the care they merit.</p> <p>There are several strains of the best blood procurable in the country, but the demand for breeding animals is greater than the supply.</p> <p>There have been outbreaks of Swine Fever in one or two districts.</p>	<p>COCONUTS—</p> <p>The outlook for the production for better copra in the near future is most promising since the Government has appointed an Inspector and Agricultural Instructor to deal with all Coconut plantations. This work has been going on for the past six months, and much valuable information is now available for the basis of further development.</p>
<p>MAIZE—</p> <p>A noted increase has been made in native grown maize from seed issued by the Government, and still larger areas have been put down by settlers with most satisfactory returns.</p>	<p>WATTLE.</p> <p>Most encouraging reports have been received from the Imperial Institute in connection with wattle bark for tanning purposes. The Highlands are now in a position to strip wattle bark regularly for the next six years. Owing to the war, the building of the factory for the extraction of tannin, which was to have been erected this year, has been postponed, but is hoped that this will not be for long as there is a ready and profitable market particularly for wattle bark extract at home. These favourable conditions of the home market are likely to continue.</p>
<p>WHEAT—</p> <p>Wheat has not been attacked by the green fly this year, and the harvest has been satisfactory. The hybrid wheats at Njoro and Kabete Experimental Farm have given most promising results for the last two seasons, and the production of rust-resisting types should be expected in the near future.</p>	
<p>COFFEE—</p> <p>A large area has been again planted out with coffee, and there is every prospect of this industry becoming one of our most successful branches of farming. The prevalence of leaf disease has had no appreciable effect on well cultivated plantations, and experiments carried out by Government have shown that with sound cultivation, pruning, and spraying, the disease can be entirely eradicated.</p>
