## AGRICULTURAL.

(1) ACREAGE AND DEVELOPMENT.—The total area under occupation by Europeans as at the 31st July, 1927 was 4,737,920 acres; of this area 512,543 acres were under cultivation, while it was estimated that 1,294,581 acres were developed under cattle, and 737,588 acres under sheep.

(2) OCCUPATION.—The number of occupiers as at 31st July, 1927 is given at 1,901, an increase of 92 or 5.09 per cent. The average area cultivated per occupier is 269 acres and the area developed under livestock 1,069 acres, equivalent to a total of 1,338 acres per occupier. On an average each occupier exported produce to the value of £1,034 during the year.

(3) CROPS.—The area under maize decreased slightly during the year by 595 acres. The area under wheat increased by 48 per cent, coffee by 8.14 per cent and sisal by 18.30 per cent.

(4) LIVESTOCK.—The number of cattle in the possession of Europeans increased by 1.04 per cent during the year. There was an increase in the number of pigs equivalent to 42.13 per cent, while sheep increased by 12.30 per cent. The export of wool is given at 7,113 cwt., an increase of 2.30 per cent over the preceding year.

## FORESTAL.

Owing to the general development of the Colony the timber trade was very brisk during the first half of the year. Later, however, the demand for timber fell off; sawmillers continued to cut timber at a rate in excess of that in any previous year, and were left with large stocks on hand at the end of the year. The Artificial Seasoning Kilns of the Public Works Department were in successful operation during part of the year and the Kenya and Uganda Railway Administration commenced to erect kilns for the Railway workshops.

## TROUT.

1927 was a very good year as far as the stocking of new streams was concerned, some 75,000 Rainbow Trout Fry having been introduced into rivers hitherto unstocked with trout. This was made possible owing to the excellent condition in which the eyed ova arrived and the low temperature of the water in which they were hatched.

At other prisons, convicts are employed on roadmaking, bush-clearing, stone-quarrying, fuel-cutting, water-carrying, and in cultivation of foodstuffs for prisoners' food.

(2) How are they supervised?

By one armed warder to every 5 to 7 convicts.

No remission of sentences of 6 months or less. Prisoners serving sentences of over 6 months by good conduct may earn remission of one-seventh of any portion of the sentence over 6 months.

First offenders serving sentences of not less than three years may be released on licence on completion of two-thirds of the sentence on condition that they report monthly to the Police during the remaining period.

XIX.—Have Coroners' Inquests been held on every occasion of a death in prison during the past year? And what were the verdicts?

Yes. Death from natural causes in all cases. Total deaths—61.

XX.—(1) What was the sanitary state of the prisons during the year 1927?

On the whole fairly good.

(2) What were the prevailing diseases?

Pneumonia, Dysentery and Chicken-pox

XXI.—What are, shortly, the rules as to Diet?

There are separate dietaries for (1) Europeans; (2) Eurasians; (3) Indians, Arabs and Somalis; (4) Africans. Each dietary is divided into two categories, viz. (a) for short term male prisoners, women, and juveniles; (b) for long term male prisoners, male remand, and civil prisoners. Diet (b) is on a more generous and varied scale than (a).
