I have the hypour to state that I have burefully considered in consultation with the Gedretary of State for the Colonies your notes of the 7th June, July 13th, and Geptember 13th last respecting the treatment of Messra a. Arulder and winkelpan in British East Africa.

Mrs Majesty's Government are informed that

Mr. Woulder on the outbreak of war attracted attention by his strong pro-German attitude and by
visiting in company with Mr. Wintelman military
posts such as the lighthouse and allindini, and that
on one occasion he forced his way into the signal
station and made use of the telescope at a time
when a notice had been circulated by the officer
in command of the troops prehibiting persons visiting these places.

There was also reason to believe from an intercepted letter that Mr. Krulder had communicated information as to the movements of ships to certain German subjects.

Accordingly when H.M.J. "Ghatham" went ashore in full view of Mr. Kruider's house it was considered

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considered necessary to arrest min to parent this information reaching the enemy, a matter at that time of the greatest importance owin; to the derman cruiser Konigsberg being in the meichbourhood.

Mr. Winkelman lived with Mr. Arulder and owing to the suspicion attaching to the latter, and the fact that Mr. Winkelman had been associated with him in some of his suspicious actions, it was not considered possible to leave the Tumer gaileman at liberty,

With regard to Er. Erulder's status as acting Consul for the Hetherlands at Mombasa, although Mr. W. Besseling, Metherland Vice Consul, in a letter dated July 18th last informed the Acting Provincial Commissioner that the Consulate would be ; epresented by mr. Krulder no information as to his appaintment was received by this Department, and it as not recognised by the Governor of British East Africa and Hr. Krulder cannot therefore be held to possess any consular status.

During Messrs Arulder and Cincelman's detention they were permitted every mivilege consistent with safety, and were visited by two Visiting Justices

who gaw and spoke to them, but they made no complaints.

while much regretting that it should have been considered medessary to detain two Netherland subjects in this manner. I think that you will agree that the local artherities had good ground for their ection and that Mr. Arulder's proceeding even if entirely innocent, were in view of the aituation existing at the time extremely file-advised, and calculated to arouse serious suspicion on the part of the authorities.

With regard to Mr. Srulder's desire to return to East Africa I regret to have to inform you that this cannot be permitted.
