back to E.A.P. for fear of fever. He
said that, if he could get enough
money to live on, he would prefer to
stay in London. He has no relations
in Africa, but has a wife (with whom
he does not live) in London and a son
in the Army. He feels more at home in

Sir

I have the honor to report that I have this day examined exCorporal T.P.Kiely, late East African Transport Corps, and he has Aortic Heart Disease. The heart is hypertrophied and easily becomes dilated. The condition has been developing in the last five years or so but has been much worse of late. He will only be fit for light work of a semi sedentary nature. Any strain or rapid motion would be dangerous. There would be no advantage in hospital treatment beyond the rest entailed. We could take him in for a week or two when such rest is required but there would be no benefit in any special course.

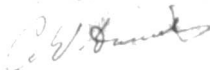

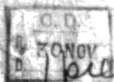

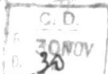
