Dear Mr Simmons,

I am most anxious that you should try again to obtain for me returnisation papers, and from the local authorities I understand that it would be pessible for the home Government to pass some sort of an "emergency act" for here or even for England as I am told that there are similar eases to mind at precent harring the home authorities. To help you I am sanding you enclosed three letters in support of my application, one from the object secretary to the local authoristration, the Hon. Mr d.d. Bowring, another from H.H.Judge Hamilton our Object Justice the first two have known me simil I came to this country to years ago, the last one since to is here biggelf, some or of years, I could have obtained many other letters but as those represent the object heads of the local comministration I thought it was sufficient.

Prom my point of view the matter is very serious and I think I have a right to sak the British Governments protection in view of my present and past actions.

To refresh your memory and also to give you the necessary details you may require. I am giving you again the reasons for which I expect my explication to be allowed.

I was born in Frankfort am Main on Pebruary 3rd

In 1898 I went to South Africa to join a relation, in Kimberley and near the end of that year I joined the artillery section of the Diamond Field's Horse to help in the suppression of the Pokwani rebellion, I took then the oath of allegiance to the late Queen Victoria and Onder atood that by this action I was recognised as a British

subject as there was no other colonial naturalisation law.

In 1900 owing to business depression in South Africa I came to this country and have resided here ever since. In 1897 I, became a member of the Church of England (596 copy of Affidavit from our local Chaplain) The original is with the authorities here

Some years ago my local adlicator tried to obtain naturalization papers for me but was informed that this mas impossible as there was no naturalisation act here. In May 1916 for almy tried in London and advised me that a colonial naturalisation les gould be in forze to soie protectorate probably to July of last year, therefore as soon as I returned to this country betein the declaration of war I went to the trown advocate to enquire whether the law was already in force and was icid that it mad not yet arrived eran home To day I em the dally serman subject -fluxed to reside in this country.

The tome authorities wit receive our paper "The Best African Standard regularly must be awars of the fact that we are the strongest supporters of the local military author! lies and we have been several times thanked for our help, further I have been seked to help them in translating confidential documents for them.

My position is very serious, I have always sated as a British subject as I consider myself to be since taking the oath of allegiance in 1898 yet should the British Government not give me the support which I consider I have the right to expect seeing that I took up arms in their defence, and have helped them locally for years, then, as the local military authorities have warned me, I am running the risk of being considered a traitor to Germany and should I fall into German hands my fate is not a brilliant one as my paper has been very stongly anti-Garman.


