I am directed by the Secretary of State to inform you that, subject to your being passed medically fit for service, he proposes to select you for appointment as a Postal Clerk and Telegraphist in East Africa with salary at the rate of £110 per annum rising by annual increments of £3 to £180 per annum.

Conveyed quarters will be provided by the Government, free of rent, but not of rates or other similar outgoings. Free second class passage will be provided to any town that there is no free pass over the Uganda Railway between Mombasa and the place at which you are stationed.

A memorandum showing the general conditions intended to prevail in East Africa and a copy of the leave and pension regulations are enclosed herewith. Let you be informed that you will be subject to any regulations which may be introduced hereafter by or with the sanction of the Secretary of State. Copies of the regulations as to pensions and of the Colonial Regulations are also enclosed.

You will be accorded in the first instance
in the Home Service for a tour of thirty months in
East Africa, and the leave incidental thereto, and at
the end of that period you may either be confirmed
in your appointment or the permanent establishment
in East Africa if your services have been satisfactory,
or are still required by the Government, or you
may report to the Home Service.

You will understand that you are liable
to serve either in the East Africa Protectorate or
Kenya, and that you can be transferred from either
Protectorate to the other, according to
the requirements of the Government.

You will be paid half salary as from the
date of embarkation for East Africa and full salary
as from the date of arrival at Mombasa.

You will be provided with passage, lodgings
and attendance in East Africa whilst in the service of
the Government.

In the event of your being married during
the term of your service in East Africa, you will be
required to resign your commission and to refund to
the Government the sum of your emoluments last
received; however, you give six months' notice to
the Government of your intention to marry, the Secre-
tary of State may, on the recommendation of the
Governor, allow a proportionate amount of the marriage
money according to the period served. In the event
of your being married, you will be granted a gratuity
not

(not exceeding twelve months' pay in the aggregate of one month's pay for each year's service, provided that you have completed two years' service in East Africa, and an aggregate of six years' service in the Home and East African Postal Services.

9. In the event of your returning to the Home Service at the end of the period for which you are seconded, pension or gratuity will be granted to you from East African funds in respect of that period on final settlement from the Home Service, provided that you are entitled to pension or gratuity in accordance with the principles of the Superannuation Act of 1897. The amount of the pension or gratuity from Protectorate funds will be reckoned on the salary drawn at the date of leaving the East Africa Service in accordance with the regulations as to pensions and gratuities applicable to East Africa.

10. If you are prepared to accept this offer of appointment, you should present yourself at once to one of the Medical Advisers to this Department, whose names are given on the proposed letter, for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be left with him, and he will send his report direct to this Department. The fee of one shilling for the examination will be paid by the Government, and if it is necessary for you to make a journey by railway to visit the Medical Adviser you may submit a claim for the refund of the return railway fare (third class).

11. I am to request that you will inform me without delay whether you wish to accept the offer of this appointment. You should also inform me what is the earliest date on which you will be able to leave for East Africa where your services are urgently required.

12. In replying to this letter, if you accept the offer of appointment, you should give the name and address of a relative in this country to whom communications can be sent, if necessary, in your absence.

13. A copy of "Notes for Officers appointed to East Africa and Uganda" is enclosed for your information, together with some suggestions as to the outfit with which you should provide yourself, is enclosed for your information.
