Mr. Toulson & Mr. Keenan

I have the honor to report: -

(1) Up to the time of the departure from Toronto of Mr. Beaulieu the true control for the Whitchurch, Keenan, Toulson & Keenan was I believe in the private employ of Mr. Beaulieu in his business as a general merchant in Toronto. To the best of my knowledge neither were ever employed.

(2) Mr. Beaulieu being apparently Mr. Toulson's chief agent and I believe he would have been Mr. Beaulieu's superior when it was too late to call his attention to the approval component of the appointment.

(3) As soon as I heard of Mr. Toulson's appointment I would have inquired of him as to the nature & extent of the his own control appointment other than the letter at hand by Mr. Beaulieu to me, and received a reply to the effect he had no formal appointment from his Government. I also inquired what if

any steps had been taken to obtain information from the Dutch Colonial Government of the informal appointment made by Mr. Brouwer.

Knowing that Mr. Brouwer was unable to give me any information, under the circumstances I had no reason there was any ground for regarding Mr. Brouwer as representing the Dutch Colonial Government.

3) Mr. Brouwer asked me the reason of his arrest but as he was a Military prisoner & I was unaware of the exact charge which would be brought against him I made no statement. He also asked to be taken before a court & I informed him that I would see the O.C. Tappin on the matter which I subsequently did.

4) Instructions were given to the Guards by the Military Authorities that Mr. Brouwer was not to be allowed to communicate with anyone during the period of his detention.

5) The statement that the Dutch Colonial Consul Post at Tromsø had to remain vacant for a long time due to Mr. Brouwer which is not strictly correct is beyond the informal appointment made by Mr. Brouwer which would appear to be ultra vires no steps appear to have been taken to appoint a substitute when the Consul Mr. Beaulieu was left his post.

6) I have no knowledge of the circumstances

under which several prisoners &
tricksters were released & do
not think I was in Toronto at
the time.
