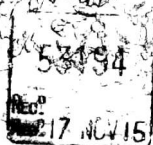

In reply to your letter which has been forwarded to this Department the War Office, I am to inform you that the name of Godfrey Herbert Pattison is included in a list received from the German authorities in June last showing the British prisoners-of-war in German East Africa. It was stated at the time that all the prisoners were in satisfactory health.

2. I am to add that
your suggestion as to
assistance towards the
maintenance of Mr. Patterson's
children should be made
to the Prince & Wales' Fund
or other Funds, as ~~the~~ Mr.
Boswell regrets that it was
not possible for any assistance
to be granted from colonial funds.

3. I am further to state
that from the info. in this
Desk. it would appear that
Mr. Patterson was not a resident
of the E. Afr. but was employed
on a coffee plantation in
German E. Africa at the
outbreak of the war.
