Dear Read,

The Belgian Colonial Office desire me to cable to Mr. Cox, British East Africa Corporation Mombasa asking whether and at what cost delivered Entebbe he can purchase for them in East Africa sixty miles, for their artillery transport work on Eastern Congo frontier.

This seems to be a matter that should not go over the wires in a private cable, and there is no doubt the further point that all mules and horses in East Africa fit for military work are under prohibition of export or even of sale to other than British Military Authorities unless with consent of the latter.

The Belgian War Office at Le Hague have today cabled me per their Colonial Office in London that the four mountain guns with their carriages and pack saddles for artillery transport, ammunition, etc., all recently shipped to Beira, are to be discharged at Mombasa, and sent to their Uganda frontier if I can arrange this in time—the matter of the mules is connected with this.

Perhaps the enquiry to Mr. Cox. can be very kindly sent by your cable per Sir Henry Balfour.

I have suggested that failing mules, they might be able to use donkeys, which are more likely to be obtainable—they ask for corresponding information re donkeys, but prefer mules—if I can either from East Africa, I am to enquire from Aden etc.

Perhaps the enquiry to Mr Cox. could be very kindly sent
