Your dept is in care to have following advised,
 which we have received from Belgian War Office
 as the share per their Co. London. Belgian W.O
 has a cable from Commandant Montagne at
 Mombasa reporting the safe landing & capture
 tally by BEA Corporation there, of the "Montagne
 battery". Also that all is in order for the
 forwarding of same to Kampalla for the
 organising work at latter, & that Montagne
 expects to be starting for Kisumu end June
 & arrive Kisumu end June. I think he is too
 busy, & would myself reckon that his

Letting will do well if fully organized & marching from Kampalla by end June, arriving Kivu about mid July.

Montalant further cables that Donkeys are too weak for the battery transport & that he must have 20 mules. The Belgian War Office has passed me urgent orders to set the latter.

The British W.O. informed me (informally) that I should make commercial enquiry in Egypt and that if come here as latter they would not stand in way of export if I could arrange shipping.

I have got the offer from our Cairo agents & secured space in Chany Castle, - the mules should then reach Mombasa about 10th July. It will be a matter of urgent rail & lake steamer transport to set them to Kampalla for

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for Montacute. Anything you could kindly
 do to assist by asking informing the
 Govt of B.E.A. of the urgency, would be
 done help to reduce the delay which the
 battery is compelled to suffer if it waits for
 arrival of the mule.

Re motor boat for Lake Kivu You are aware
 that on Belgian Congo C.O. orders are given them
 option on 2 boats now in Mombasa. They
 called Montacute to inspect in company with
 Cox. He called to Belgian W.O. that one of
 boats seems suitable, but other two large. The
 object is to mount machine gun & carry
 6 armed men, for service on Kivu. If he decides
 to accept it will be transported whole, via
 Kampala. He has two in hand.

Meat rations. These have been purchased & Intinac. Rav. Com. permits obtained. About 140 tons so farward. & via Roma (Atlantic) in Belgian Govt. steamer to depart mid June, & 20 to 30 tons via Beira to Elizabethville. Also 8 tons dried cod fish.

Battery for Katanga. The second half of the Moulart battery stores in Benwick Castle has been tallied by my people at Mombasa & sent on to Beira as instructed, and I have arranged for landing & forwarding thence to Congo with Finance Trading Co. and asked Belgian Govt. to advise Portuguese Legation in London.

I think the latter summaries the main matter. I am reporting separately to our Home Office:
