Sir,

I have the honour to address you in the following circumstances.

My family and myself (Mrs. Ritch and four children arrived in England just
before Xmas having been deported from Mombasa, S.E.A. without may charge
having been laid or explanation or reason given and in my respectful sunmission, quite unwarrantably.

I beg, therefore, that you will be good enough to cause investigations to be made, and meanwhile venture to append the following particulars concerning my personality.

I am a Barrister-at-law, (a member of Lincoin's lnn) and my name may, perhaps, be zecalled in monnection with the South Africa British Indian Committee of which I was Monorary Secretary up to about four years ago.

I returned to the Transvaal in 1910 and practised there up to a year ago, when I proceeded to Mombass and there established myself in practice. My South African Indian connections led, perhaps, to my acquiring a very extensive Indian practice throughout Brivish Rest & Sid to my appointment as standing Councel to the length a Council, and M. E. A. Indian Congress and other reseasing the coules of a similar Character.

It may, I think, be fairly claimed for this contingent that it did valuable Town Guard work and considerably relieved the pressure upon the small European defence force then available.

On subsequent occasions I was happily able to assist the military sutherities to obtain emergency labor from my Indian clients, e.g. military . Forms &c., which were needed at extremely short notice and had to be at me the spot.

With the arrival of the troops from India the local volunteers dirtually resumed their ordinary vocations.

described, organed the return to me of the keys of my offices and of my safe, both of which had been thoroughly searched and office hatled, but brought me the news that orders had been received for my deportation from Africa, to either London or Bombay. I preferred London feeling that here I should be the better able to approach the Colonial Office and secure justice.

A couple of days later we were put aboard the 3.3. Sosphore and transported to Port Said where we were transferred to H.M. Transport "Kenilwarth Castle" and landed at Plymouth.

Two members of the Private-Clothes Police force met us at Plymouth and virtually saw us off to London.

Here I am with my family ruined both in reputation and financially.

I ask for justice with as little delay as possible. The reference to such small services as I was privileged to render the authorities is introduced only because deportation naturally suggests dieloyal or traiterous

conduct on the part of the deportee.
