

Dear Bottomley,

I certainly think that the whole of the substantive salaries of the two temporary Assistant Auditors as well as the extra allowances of 10/- a day should be charged to the Common Charges Account. It is to be remembered that the Colonial Audit Department is not an Imperial service and that therefore no portion of the salaries of the officers of the Department falls upon Imperial funds. Mr. Collisson's salary, which forms a portion of the total cost of the Home Establishment of the Department, is met out of funds contributed, pro rata, by the various Colonies and Protectorates which avail themselves of the services of the Department and it would be distinctly inequitable that the various contributors, (excepting perhaps, in their small measure, the East African Protectorates) who have their own

3. As these temporary appointments are required solely for the ^{purpose} of the Common Charges Account Mr. Bonar has trusts that the A.C. will agree to the cost of these appointments being charged to that account.

4. I am to add that in view of the special qualifications of the officers selected, the D.C.A. does not apprehend that the selection of a third temporary Audit Auditor will be required.

Sir,

I have the honour to enclose herewith a copy of a Decode Telegram from the Colonial Office to His Excellency the Governor dated 21st January last, from which you will see that the War Office wish to receive the audited accounts of the War Expenditure up to 31st December, 1915 and 31st March 1916 by the 30th June & 30th September respectively. The present position of this Audit is as follows:-

The Accounts up to December 1914 have been completed and queries issued. Those for January, February and March are in hand and will be completed by about the 15th February next. This will leave 9 months accounts to be audited in under 4 months, allowing for 18 days passage to England and this may be done by still further curtailing the Protectorate Audit, and by working longer hours in the War Section (the present hours being from 8-30 - 5 including Saturdays) but I have in addition to allow for:-

The Uganda and Zanzibar Accounts from August 1914 which have not yet been compiled and sent


