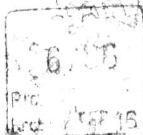

Sir,

With reference to my No. 6/21/5/15 of August 10th 1915 and subsequent correspondence I should be glad if you would kindly inform me further on the question.

(1) Are you continuing to settle Wa-Nyika and others from your district on the Magarini Estate in collaboration with the Manager.

(2) Is any dislike to settlement on Magarini being evinced by the people. If so please enquire the reason from the people and report.

(3) Is the management actively co-operating with Government in this matter. An effort is being made by you and District Commissioner Nyika to get people to settle but the management must arrange for their reception and endeavour to establish relations with the people and induce them to settle or our efforts will be brought to naught.

(4) Have any families from Nyika district been settled on the Estate, if so how many? In one letter there is a mention of 40 to 50 families.

(5) I have no objection to the Manager sending a reliable headman into Nyika district to recruit labour for the Estate and on informing the District Commissioner. You can inform the Manager accordingly.

(6) There will shortly be altogether some 600 Kasiyu people settled on the W. boundary of this Estate and probably some of these be glad to earn some money if they are employed.

Sir,

In reply to your L/21/15/15 of November 20th which I found here on my arrival on the 19th instant I have the honour to reply as follows:-

1) I have not succeeded in persuading any more Wallyika to settle on the Mugarini estate. They apparently will not do so of their own free will and if sent there they would not remain.

2) Yes.

a) Lack of a water supply at Mugarini.

b) The trouble of clearing fresh land.

c) General dislike to settling on land where they know they will have to work.

d) Dislike of "tapping" and the low price obtainable 25 cents per lb instead of 50 cts. as formerly.

e) Love of independence or semi-independence as upon an Arab shamba.

3) No. The Manager has left the district and is managing Powsland plantation at Takaungu.

4) No none at all.

5) The manager informed.

6) There are now 300 Kasigau at Pwani but scarcely 100 able bodied men amongst them. The greater part are women and children. It has been necessary up till now to employ these men in cultivating, building houses carrying food etc.

I have now however informed the manager that some will be available and asked him how many he requires and when.
