3. Mr. Correa was engaged by the Railway Accounts Department on the 30th of January 1901 and transferred to the Audit Department on the 15th of June 1903.

4. In 1912 these clerks asked that their service with the Uganda Railway might be regarded as pensionable, and stated in support of their request that clerks serving in the Police, Forestry, Telegraphs, and Medical Departments had been granted this concession. The request was refused on the grounds that the service of the Hon. Mysore Railway staff was not pensionable, and that the case of the other clerks referred to was not analogous inasmuch as the administration of these Departments had been taken over in toto by the Protectorate whereas the Department has not been taken over. Pereira and Mr. Corr are however of opinion that their service with the Uganda Railway might be allowed to count for the purposes of seniority and leave.

Should this ~~exception~~ be correct, it would be reasonable to conclude that, in granting the particular concessions referred to, the Secretary of State was influenced by general and not by personal considerations. I consider, therefore, that there is considerable justification for the claims of Messrs. Pereira and Correa and I am of opinion that, in order that possible unintentional hardship may be prevented, they should be again submitted to the Government for further consideration, accompanied by the above expression of my views and the suggestion that, in case of doubt the question may be referred for the decision of the Secretary of State.

I am directed by the Comptroller and Auditor General to transmit, for the information of the Uganda Railway Committee, copy of a letter, dated 30th June last, received from Mr. Barnes, the Assistant Auditor engaged upon the examination of the Uganda Railway Accounts at Nairobi, reporting that his Clerk Mr. B. S. Martins, has been invalided home to India, and suggesting the transfer in his place of a Mr. Pereira, from the Accounts Office of the Railway, the services of that officer having been offered to him by the Chief Accountant.

2. In view of the present and increasing pressure of work in the Audit Office at Nairobi, it is important that the Clerk to be appointed in Mr. Martin's place should have a thorough knowledge of Railway Accounts, and as Mr. Pereira appears to possess this qualification, the Comptroller and Auditor General would be glad to agree to the proposed transfer, should the Uganda Railway Committee consent.

3. However, Mr. Pereira has already been paid a salary at the rate of Rs. 175/- a month by the Railway Office, whereas the salary sanctioned for the position of Clerk in the Audit Office is Rs. 150/- per month only. In the event of the sanction of the Committee being given, Mr. Pereira may be allowed, on transfer to the Audit Office, to continue to draw salary at the rate of Rs. 175/-.
