
Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 12th instant, No. 29997/1914, I am directed by the Board of Customs and Excise to inform you that instructions have been issued in the desired sense to the Board's Officers in London and Southampton, i.e. that they may waive all requirements, restrictions and prohibitions in regard to stores and personal effects (including reasonable firearms and ammunition for use therein) belonging to Government Officials, civil and military, proceeding to the Colonies, on production of reasonable evidence of their travelling in an official capacity.
