Sir,

In reply to your letter No. 3430/1919 dated 18th January 1919, I am commanded by the Army Council to say that there are a number of mares in Egypt from which no doubt those required for East Africa could be selected and put aside as soon as the class and limits of age and height are made known to this office.

The President of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries is strongly opposed to the repatriation of any animals from Egypt, for fear of introducing disease into Great Britain, and in the absence of shipping facilities the only alternative is to sell locally such animals as are suited to and required by the inhabitants, and to destroy the remainder.

The Council therefore welcome this opportunity of disposing of a number of valuable mares to the Imperial advantage, and I am to suggest that the most expeditious course will be for Viscount Milner personally to obtain the sanction of the Treasury for the mares to be handed over upon whatever terms may be decided. Meanwhile on receipt of an intimation as to the class of mare required, the Council will direct the Commander-in-Chief, Egypt to reserve a selection pending the arrival of the Protecto-rate officials.

Sir,

I am etc. to transmit to you, to be laid before the L.C. of the Treasury, the accompanying copy of corres. with the W.O. Mr. Bottomley, 27/1/19 regarding the proposal to obtain a number of mares from <sup>a</sup> surplus now on hand in Egypt for use for breeding purposes in the E.A.P. Mr. Grindly Mr. Lambert T.L. will observe that the question of the terms on which the animals should be obtained is left to their decision.

2. Lord Milner understands that arrangements have been made in similar cases in this country for surplus mares to be disposed ~~of~~ to farmers without charge, and he trusts that T.L. will be prepared to agree to a similar arrangement being made in the case.

case of the mares required for the E.A.P. He would point out that as expenditure must be incurred in the selection of animals, shipping facilities and the charges for freight and insurance, it will not be possible, in any case, to arrange for a gratuitous distribution to farmers in the E.A.P.

3. Lord Milner is anxious that the opportunity should be taken to replenish the breeding stock as fully as possible, and for this purpose to give stock owners every encouragement to make use of the opportunity. In these circumstances he trusts that T.Ls will be willing to agree to the animals being handed over in Egypt free of charge.

4. If this is not possible he would be glad to be informed what figure T.Ls consider should be decided upon.

Reference Mares for British East Africa

Dear Bottomley,

Herewith the description of the animal required.

Class:- Light Cavalry or Mounted Infantry Cob.

The mares should be practically sound, free more especially from hereditary unsoundness or vice, and as well bred as possible, possessing good bone, feet and short backs.

Age:- Under 10 years.

Height:- Up to 15.2

If mules are going begging I would plead that the Remount Department be asked to set aside a shipload for us. A good home can be found for them in B.E.A. and the country is in urgent need of the transport animal, and could absorb many hundreds. I need not dwell on the very important Imperial aspect of this request.

I enclose a copy of a letter addressed to you on January 22nd., recommending Mr. Fitzgerald to you.

Should the 500 mares prove available, I would recommend Lieut. G.B.P. Fitzgerald to help in selecting and shipping them.

I am etc. to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 23rd of Jan.
