I am directed by the Minister of Pensions to acknowledge receipt of your letter 6985/18/19 of the 10th March together with copies of correspondence with local authorities in East and West Africa regarding the supply of artificial limbs and surgical appliances to native soldiers of the King's African Rifles, the West African Frontier Force and the East African Local Forces.

With regard to the proposal of the Officer Administering the Government of the East Africa Protectorate that a man with expert knowledge of artificial limbs and appliances should be sent to East Africa, I am to say that in the present state of supply of artificial limbs it would be difficult to despatch expert workmen to East and Africa. In the Minister's opinion the most effectual way of dealing at present with urgent cases would be to take very careful measurements taken of the amputation stumps and (not hollow) casts made of same. If the measurements casts are sent to the Artificial Limbs Branch of this Ministry arrangements can be made to supply the limb appliances required. I enclose a copy of directions concerning plaster casts. These suggestions however may be best tested by the statistician with Lord Milner has called, which may be such as to encourage trained workmen to go to East Africa and settle there.

I am to add that the communication stated to have been received from the Secretary of State, Whitehall, London S.W.1.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR TAKING PLASTER CASTS OF STUMPS IN

The patient should be in the erect position, supporting himself on the sound limb and on crutches.

In the case of double amputation the procedure is difficult and if the patient cannot stand on crutches with the help of assistants, the mould must be taken in the recumbent posture, taking care that the soft parts are not flattened by pressure of the couch or table.)

The skin having been thoroughly smeared with vaseline, quick-setting plaster bandages are applied from the extremity of the stump to a line a little higher than to which the bucket is intended to reach. The end of the stump should be covered in and enough bandages used form an even covering of three layers. The number of bandages used will vary with the size of the stump, which must not be constricted, the bandages must not be pulled tight nor laid into the commissure, and great care should be taken to avoid compression by virtue of unequal pressure.

As soon as the bandage is laid the mould should be filled with a thin layer of plaster of Paris. This may be done with a brush, a piece of sponge, or a cloth. The plaster should be applied in thin layers, allowing each to dry before applying the next. When the plaster has dried it and allow to set. The plaster should be well packed off and the plaster remains.

With the base of thigh amputations, the plaster will facilitate the carrying of the stump. In the case of pelvic or sacro-sciatic amputations the base can be cut away in order to facilitate the carrying of the stump.

When the base of the stump of fibular or tibial amputations is to be made in the form of a "V" shape or "Y" shape. Through amputations, the mould will have to be made so that it can be withdrawn. For this purpose a thin strip of metal should be laid along the front of the stump on the skin. As soon as the bandaging is done the mould is divided lengthwise down to the metal with a knife. Whence it is sprung open and removed and closed up again with a turn of Plaster bandage.
