I have the honor to bring to your notice that just previous to leaving Nairobi for Uganda I received from H. E. the Acting Governor of East Africa, a copy of a Confidential Colonial Office Despatch dated 16th October, 1918 with reference to the Mulinde Operations, of which I was in charge.

With reference to para. 5, re the valuable services rendered by the Italians on the left bank of the Juba river, I laid no great emphasis as possible on the value of those services, and now venture to suggest that, taking into consideration the fact that had there been no Italian troops to co-operate, the operations which I am invited to suppose would have been impossible. In those would have been nothing to prevent large numbers of the enemy with their steaks from crossing the river unopposed. That therefore the thanks of His Majesty's Government should be conveyed in some more concrete form than words only. I would therefore suggest that the following should, if possible, be awarded a British decoration.

1. Cav Gassparini, the acting Governor of Italian Somaliland, who agreed to send the troops, at my request.

(half Chiaro) 2. The Major Commanding the Italian troops on the Juba. His name is mentioned in my despatch contained in Confidential Despatch No. 74 of April 16th, 1919, from the Officer administering the Government of East African Protectorate.

(diario) 3. The Italian medical officer at Fardera, who attended our wounded and sick, during the absence of the British Medical Troops. He is named in the same despatch.

4. Lastly Signor Ceronaro, Italian Resident at Maryarita, on the Juba, who on my earnest representations urged the acting Governor to co-operate with the troops under my command, when he had at first wished to hold no liaison. This officer also materially helped me by supplying most accurate intelligence and in every possible way.
