CABLE DELAYS

Calls attention to and requests support in bringing to notices of authorities concerned.

My representative to the G.P.O. is cable to world, I fear, only long the reply that the delay is due to the number of Post Telegrams of which the G.P.O. is responsible for the greater number. In another two weeks the T.A.R. and I.C. forwarded further, the volume of Post messages should diminish. The recent announcement by the G.P.O. that commercial telegrams would be sent over the cables alternately with Post Telegrams should also give relief.

In the receipt, say the G.P.O. report that business should be hampered by such delays & that an improvement may result from the new arrangement as to alternate messages.

## CABLE DELAY

May we be permitted to call your especial attention  
not only to the continuation of, but to the great increase in  
the delays which are occurring in delivery of cable messages  
between this country and B.E.A.

On the 18th. inst. we received a cable which was  
despatched by our Manager at Nairobi on the 2nd. inst. - thus  
there occurred between the despatch of this message and its  
delivery to us only one day short of a fortnight. You will readily  
recognise that such circumstances go a long way towards  
neutralising the efforts which we are continually making not  
only to keep, but to increase the trade between this country and  
the two Protectorates in East Africa. By these delays trade, and  
even ordinary business management, becomes utterly disorganized,  
and it is impossible for my Directors to take such steps as they  
would otherwise desire to do with a view to bringing conditions  
back to a more normal state.

We trust that we may rely upon your active support  
in bringing this matter forcibly to the notice of the authorities  
concerned, and we thank you in anticipation for any step which  
you may feel justified in taking in that direction.
