I certainly think it would be necessary to consult the non-African Governments, and I view the step with considerable scepticism. The Eastern Colonies would probably reply that they knew as much about vaccination as any retired Colonel of the I.K.S., could teach them. The West Indian Governments where they could pay would not, and where they would pay, could not, but of course we could ask them if you like whether it is worth while to make this enquiry, when the whole cost is £200 is a matter which perhaps the heads of the Departments concerned could deal with better than I can.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of October 21 (40829/1919) and of the draft of a pamphlet by Col. W. G. King on the subject of vaccination.

2. I do not think that the pamphlet is suited for publication as a Sanitation Number of the Tropical Diseases Bulletin because such numbers deal with a variety of subjects of current interest to tropical sanitarians and this has rather the character of a monograph; but it might be issued by the Bureau as a supplementary publication. In that case, if the edition corresponded to that of the Tropical Diseases Bulletin viz. 1400 copies, we should have an addition to our printer's bill of 240 (on a rough estimate). In the present state of the Bureau's finances I do not think it is justified in shouldering this extra burden and suggest that the cost might be met from funds at the disposal of the Colonial Office. The Bureau would undertake the distribution of free copies and the pamphlet might be placed on sale as a set off against the cost of production.

3. On the matter of Col. King's remuneration it is difficult to advise. Col. King receives for the 'Sanitation' numbers of the Tropical Diseases Bulletin £75 per annum. At present three such numbers are published yearly so that he is paid at the rate of

£25 for each. Seeing that much of the Sanitation Numbers consists of extracts from the writings of other sanitarians, whereas in this pamphlet the Colonial Office has the benefit of Col. King's unrivalled experience and long continued research in India on vaccination problems I am inclined to think that the sum paid to him should be not less than £50.

4. I am retaining the pamphlet till I receive your reply.
