In S.W. Africa the forces who  
were employed there were granted  
leave ~~gratuitously~~ when German S.W.  
Africa had been conquered &  
that period of emergency for that  
portion of the Empire had expired.

3 Moreover <sup>in the</sup> British East Africa  
it must be admitted that the  
return of settlers to their farms  
as soon as the period of emergency  
had ceased, & the 1<sup>st</sup> E.A. Division  
were demobilised, was of urgent  
importance in order to make  
good the losses which had occurred  
owing to these absences or other causes.

4 In view of above I trust that  
the S. of S. State may be pleased to take  
such steps as will ensure that  
the interests of settlers who responded

to the call to arms during the  
period of emergency may be safeguarded  
and that they may not be deprived  
of the gratuity which they have fully  
earned by their service —
