Many thanks for letters in reference to the decision of the C.O. as to leave pay & exchange. I am sorry that officials are not to be allowed to make their own arrangements as to their pay without Government intervention, if they spend their leave in England, though it is so far satisfactory to note that it has been allowed that they may be paid locally in Pounds to the £ to cover commitments in U.S.A. of any kind which an officer may have to meet while he is on leave as the interpretation of this 'concession' will be of importance I should be glad if you could let me know if it is intended to apply not only to those officials who have existing commitments to meet but also to those who desire to invest & employ all or a part of their leave pay in U.S.A. Apart from the point, the question under the present circumstances I understand it, will be as follows:

A

- (1) Officials appointed on sterling salaries who take their leave in England will have their salaries ~~paid~~ ^{settled} by the Government and be paid ~~in sterling~~ (without the benefit of the exchange) through the Comptroller and Chief Cashier. Those who take their leave elsewhere will make their own arrangements with the local Treasury, as hitherto, for their salaries to be paid into a Bank in S. A. at Rs 15 to the £.
- (2) Officials who take their leave in S. A. will have their salaries ~~paid~~ ^{settled} at Rs 15 to the £.
- (3) Officials appointed on a rupee basis will, if they take their leave in England, receive the benefit of the exchange.
- (4) Those officials on sterling salaries, who have been allowed while on leave ^{in England} to have their pay at Rs 15 to the £ paid into an S. A. Bank & to obtain the benefit of the exchange, will not, I presume, be required to refund the value of the exchange thus obtained. I should be glad if the correctness of this statement might be confirmed.

Two further questions now arise, viz. —

a. What will be the position of an official who does not draw his leave-pay in England in full & will he be permitted to draw the balance on his return to India? Or will the position of his leave-pay be fixed at a different rate to that of his salary ^{drawn}?

b. In view of the present modification of the old ruling, will officials who have suffered a loss on exchange on having to draw leave-pay in England and then remit it back to India to meet commitments there be permitted to draw for such loss so that they may not be put in a worse position than others whose case may arise at a date subsequent to the modification?

I cannot apologise for writing at such length, but the points referred to cover some of the most important ones which have arisen since the war.

Is anything likely to be ventured on regarding the question of the status of deceased subjects of the Treaty Powers in the Sultan's Dominions?

It would, if I may say so, be more satis-
factory if the Government could obtain
revenue from such a source rather than by
looking for the salaries of its own servants
who they are or leave in England
