Request information as to reasons for non-receipt of remittances by Mrs Thomson.

Mr. Robertson W. Read

CA tells me that he, heard from the Post. by the last mail that Mr. Thomson is now at Nairobi and is arranging for regular remittances to be sent to his Bank. The £27.5.8 advanced by CA to Mr. Thomson on 8 August (see on letter of 31 July or 27/8/14) has been received from Mr. Thomson by the bank and a further £27.5.8. has been sent to the Bank. This sum would I suppose have been received from the Bank by the last mail, just after this letter was written. I hope we had better get CA done on this letter officially, and before replying to the letter.

We beg to refer you to your letter of 21st August last, on the subject of remittances by Mr. J. Hastings Thomson, District Commissioner East Africa Provinces, to Mrs. Hastings Thomson, to the effect that a further communication to the latter would be addressed to us as soon as practicable. We were so happy that matters had reached a satisfactory state but have again heard from Mrs. Hastings Thomson that she has not received the promised remittances from her husband, who is now in Egypt. She understands from Mr. Thomson that he has done his best to supply her regularly with money and has asked Hood Quarters to pay in money to bankers. We much regret to put you to further trouble in the matter but we trust it will now be possible to secure that Mrs. Thomson should receive as early as practicable whatever funds may be due forthcoming from her husband's remittances or allowances.

It would be an obligation if you could kindly inform us whether any shortcoming may be the result of general unavailability or lack of communicating facilities owing to the war, or whether it arises from the lack of necessary authority or advice from Mr. Thomson.
