I am tel. on 8329 re further

raised it to £80,000, & this cannot
be accounted for on the new loan basis.

discrepancy due to the amount of £60,000.

4. With regard to the
allocation of military
expenditure, I am to take
this opportunity to
remove the misconception

can be made from W.O. funds

Indian forces; to exist
with regard to the extent of
the liability of Reparation to
funds. Apart from the
fact that the funds have

been agreed with the Treasury
at this original £378,000 +
£1,082,000 on which we
settled on an Bk. of 28/4/45.

Soldia include, in addition
to Indian forces, one British
battalion, the following
arrangements have been made by the Army Council
as a prospect for strengthening
the forces in the Protectorate
with a view to offensive
operations against German
East Africa:—

(a) A Rhodesian Contingent

is now on its way to the Protectorate.

(b) It is proposed to form a
battalion of natives or
frontiersmen in this country
for service in East Africa.

(c) It is intended to recruit
600 more men for the R.A.R.,
officers & men, etc., being
sent from home.

5. With regard to (a) & (b), no
suggestion has been made,
or could be admitted, that
the cost should be borne
by Protectorate funds. With
regard to (c), the Government's
concurrence to the proposal
of the G.O.C. was expressly given.

On understanding that
the 1st should bear all
charges as well as the expenses
of the operations, he telegraphed
to the head of the General
Staff who are responsible
for the place with the
despatch of officers and
stores, Mr. Harcourt agreed
that the measure might
be ~~postponed~~ effected
without waiting for a
decision on the question
