PASSAGES FOR PROTECTORATES FORCES  
TO GREAT BRITAIN, IRELAND AND INDIA

Special privilege granted by W.O. of free passages to all members of Indian Expeditionary Force in the country. General Commanding considers privilege should be extended to include all Protectorate forces. Requests that sanction may be given accordingly.

Mr. B. Kenly Sir G. Fiddes  
We have already decided that free passages sh<sup>d</sup> be granted in the case of local forces when a man is invalided. (3303 and 5015)

We should also naturally grant a free passage when a man is ordered home for military reasons (cf. recent case of Capt. Woodman when he was wanted for service in France)

There remains the question as to whether free passages sh<sup>d</sup> be granted to members of the local forces at the end of the war upon disbandment. To promise this w<sup>d</sup> be an attraction to the men and I think that if they have enlisted "for three years or for duration of the war" it w<sup>d</sup> be only fair to grant them the

enlisted for 3 years or for the  
duration of the war] provided  
that it applies for the passage  
within 3 months of disbandment.
