With reference to your Confidential despatch of the 6th of September and in continuation of my telegram no. 317 of the 15th instm, I have the honour to transmit herewith the following copies of correspondence regarding the alleged inadequacy of the nursing arrangements for the sick and wounded and the alleged mismanagement and neglect in the Government and Military hospitals:-

- (a) From the Principal Medical Officer, No. C/29/1915, dated October 15th.
- (b) From the Deputy Director of Medical Services, No. 79/9/M, dated October 30th.
- (c) From the Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General, No. 1210/8, dated December 5th.
- (d) From the Principal Medical Officer, Confidential, dated December 4th.
- (e) List 'B', referred to in (d) above. List 'A' referred to in the same letter is not enclosed as all details are included in list 'B'.

2. This information represents all that I have been able to obtain from the Military Medical

Copy of Memorandum from the Principal Medical Officer to the Deputy Director of Medical Services, dated 15th October, 1915, No. C/29/1915.

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There have been occasions when there was a lack of nurses but all those available and who offered their services were enrolled as also a number of probationers.

2. There is no doubt that with most matters having to be extemporised and often at very short notice facilities were wanting more particularly in the early months of the war and could only be met as the resources of the country would permit.

3. I can only give a flat denial to the charge that the nursing arrangements were shocking and that the authorities were hopelessly neglectful, in the absence of any specific charge.

As regards the existence of vermin at Kajjado, I can only say that I have never heard of this before and certainly never noted it on any of the occasions I have visited the Hospital there.

4. The nurse at Voi has never been reported for slackness but on the contrary her exceptional good work in carrying on single handed for a considerable time has been commended.

5. During the regime of the late Matron of the European Hospital, Nairobi, there was more than one complaint over the quantity and quality of the food. I may state that the dietary of the patients is that prescribed by the Medical Officer and it is ridiculous to suggest that seven course dinners are the order of the day. I have received no complaints

regarding dieting of patients from any other Hospital.

The paragraph about the 30 Doctors and plenty of girls of the shop girl type is not understood nor does the paragraph referring to the death of four soldiers seem to call for special comment.

6. A woman to organise nursing was a pet project of the late Matron of the European Hospital, Nairobi, who wished to be relieved of her duties there in order that she might have a free hand to run up and down the country inspecting, a project which was discussed with the D.D.M.S. and very firmly objected to for many various and obvious reasons.

7. You are aware of the distribution of the doctors and nurses and their movements are either directed by you or referred to you when changes are contemplated in so far as I am concerned.

You are also aware of the existing hospital accommodation, what it was when you took over, and how it has since been added to.

8. As regards vague and anonymous charges one is in a difficult position to guess what place or person may be referred to and with the best intention to do what is right, it is impossible to regard these contributions as helpful towards setting right the many imperfections which must and do exist.

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Copy of Memorandum from the Deputy Director of Medical Services, Nairobi, to the Deputy Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General, N o. 79/9/M dated 30th October 1915.

In forwarding the remarks of the P.M.O. Protectorate Force Hospitals, I thoroughly endorse all his remarks.

The statement about 30 I.M.S. doctors being at Nairobi is an untruth. There never have been even half this number on duty at any time in Nairobi.

In fact I look upon these statements as the outburst of a neurosthenic subject whose mental capacities had become unbalanced, due possibly to an admixture of the war with hostile conditions existing in these climatic regions.

MEMORANDUM.

In continuation of my No. 1210/7 dated 24th November 1915 and with reference to a verbal conversation with His Excellency the Governor, I am directed to enclose a copy of a letter received from the A.D.M.S. Protectorate Forces together with two returns marked "List A" and "List B" in which is laid down the equipment originally in existence, and how it has been augmented up to 1st November 1915 as far as the Hospitals are concerned.

As regards the equipment of the Military Hospitals which came from India, I would refer to "Field Service Manual, Medical", (pages 40 to 134) Appendices V to VIII, in which is laid down the complete equipment of all medical units, with the exception of the Combined General Hospital, the equipment for which is laid down in the separate printed pamphlet. The D.D.M.S. states that the full equipment authorised was brought out and is being maintained.

In answer to one other point mentioned by His Excellency the Governor, namely the number of I.M.S. doctors on duty in Nairobi, the number naturally varies according to the exigencies of the Service, but the average number is six on duty at one time.

I would ask that the "Field Service Manual, Medical", and "Scale of equipment for a Combined General Hospital" may be returned to me when His Excellency has done with them.

Equipment and material issued during hostilities.

Both lists show the essential items issued to hospitals doing military work.

A complete list of all instruments, drugs, dressings, furniture, appliances etc., has not been compiled entailing as it would do an amount of clerical labour which my limited staff is not capable of performing. It is believed, however, that the lists will give sufficient indication of the equipment provided for each need.

2. List (A) shows the issues to the various hospitals and dispensaries doing military work in the Protectorate during the period when I was D.M.S. (August-December 1914).

List (B) which includes the items enumerated in list (A) gives approximately the total issues that have passed through the Protectorate Medical Store either under the authority of the D.D.M.S. or myself as Principal Medical Officer, Protectorate Forces,

3. No scale of equipment for hospitals has been laid down in East Africa. The basis worked on has been that shown by ten years experience to be sufficient for the needs of the various hospitals and dispensaries.

Every effort has been made to conform to the Military scale. I would state, however, that judged from those included in the Indian Medical Manuals, the equipment of the East Africa Protectorate hospitals are short of no essentials, and possess in certain instances more up-to-date instruments and surgical appliances than are authorized in the books stated.

Drugs and
Dressings.

4. Dispensing required by the European hospitals at Mombasa, Nairobi and Kisumu has been, and is, undertaken at the Government Dispensaries, established at the Native Civil Hospitals. A liberal supply of drugs and dressings is maintained in these institutions; the stock being replenished as required by indent on the Headquarter Protectorate Medical Store. I am satisfied that this arrangement has met all requirements up to date.

The hospital taken over at Majiado included the dispensary established there; as also Voi. At both of these places was established in addition an Advanced Base Medical Store.

Emergency
Indents.

5. Owing to the protracted nature of the operations in East Africa, indents to a value of over £40,000 for drugs and general medical and surgical equipment in excess of the ordinary civil requirements have been submitted during that period.

An estimate of local purchases for equipment necessary

necessary for the increased accommodation of patients, transport for sick and wounded, etc., can only be stated as approximating £30,000.

6. The attached lists do not include issues from Ordnance, Supply and Transport, or A.D.M.S. Stores, Force B, or "Gifts" to hospitals.
