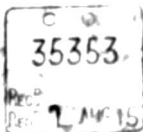

Sir:-

I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to state that, in the light of the information contained in your letter No. 32422/15 of the 17th instant, he has had under reconsideration the question whether the Governor of the British East Africa Protectorate should continue to refuse all applications for export licences received from the branch at Mombasa of the firm of Max Klein, a course in which he concurred when it was originally suggested in your letter No. 22228/15 of the 18th of May last.

While it would be solely a matter for the discretion of the Governor of the Protectorate to refuse to the firm in question or to any other British or foreign firm a license for the export of any article or commodity concerning the ultimate destination of which

which he had any suspicion, it appears to the Secretary of State that there is no legal ground for a summary refusal to grant any license for export to Messrs Klein at Mombasa.

The firm is, in this respect, in a different position from the branch of the firm established at Aden, inasmuch as no suspicion rests upon the servants of the Mombasa branch or, so far as Sir E. Grey is aware, on the business which they are presumably permitted to do. He is therefore of opinion that they should receive no less favourable treatment than, for instance, that which is accorded to alien firms in this country which are permitted by His Majesty's Government to continue their operations after having severed their relations with persons resident in enemy territory.

In submitting the above views for the consideration of Mr. Secretary Bonar Law I am to suggest that, if he sees no objection, the Governor of the Protectorate may

be instructed to take measures in accordance therewith.

Sir E. Grey would be glad to learn what action may finally be taken in the matter so as to be able to communicate the information to the United States Ambassador.
