My Lords, while appreciating the efforts which have been made by the Kenya Government to secure economies, cannot fail to be disturbed at the present state of the Colony's finances. The surplus balance appears to have been reduced during the past three years at an average rate of nearly £200,000 a year. The Estimates for 1932 provide for a favourable balance of nearly £50,000, but My Lords are apprehensive lest this should fail to be realised owing to a short fall in revenue or to the necessity for meeting unforeseen expenditure such as might be occasioned by a locust invasion.

My Lords are glad to note, therefore, that the Secretary of State proposes, when approving the Estimates, to emphasise the necessity for maintaining the utmost vigilance in seeking further economies and to remind the Governor that in the absence of an early revival in trade conditions the forecasts of revenue may prove to have been unduly sanguine. In these circumstances a

drastic

drastic reduction of expenditure and the suspension of certain existing services may be necessary in the course of the year and My Lords agree with the proposal to continue the running appreciation of the finances of Kenya in the light of the latest returns.

My Lords will be glad to be furnished in due course with a statement of the final outturn for the year 1931; and, to be kept informed of the position generally as it develops throughout the year.

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Allen's letter of the 30th January 1932 (17302A/31) transmitting the Kenya Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for 1932.

My Lords note that the revenue receipts for 1931 are now expected to be some £480,000 less than the original estimate and that actual expenditure is expected to be nearly £180,000 below the sanctioned estimate. On the basis of these figures it is estimated that there will be a deficit for 1931 of £227,000 instead of the favourable balance of £75,000 originally anticipated.

In reply, I am to request you to inform the Secretary of State that in these circumstances My Lords agree that there is no practicable alternative to postponing for a further year i.e. until the 31st December 1938, the date by which a surplus of not less than

In his telegram No. 328 of the 21st October 1931 the Governor referred to proposals to reduce certain contributions. The Secretary of State in his reply telegram No. 331 of the 3rd November 1931 stated that the question whether any economies were possible in respect of these contributions was being considered for the whole Colonial Empire and he stated that he would telegraph his decision as soon as it was reached. As however, a decision was not taken before the Estimates were passed no telegram was, in fact, sent.

It has been decided that no reduction in the contributions should be made in the case of the Imperial Institutes of Entomology and Mycology, and of the Imperial Agricultural Bureaux. Items 27, 29 and 33

I enclose, for your consideration, a memorandum prepared by my direction, dealing with certain details which have arisen during the examination of the Estimates, and I shall be glad to receive your observations in the course of any of these points which may call for comment.

11. There are of course various matters of importance on which I have not felt it necessary to comment as they fall within the scope of Lord Moyne's enquiry.

12. I desire to express my appreciation of the thorough manner in which the Estimates of Expenditure have been overhauled by Government as is indicated by the facts that the Select Committee after prolonged and searching criticism found little to suggest in the way of practical measures for securing

securing further economies. I trust in the future that it will be possible to expedite the work of the Committee in order to enable the Estimates to reach me not later than the 30th of November in each year in accordance with the request contained in the final paragraph of Lord Passfield's despatch No. 200 of the 6th of March, 1930.

6. In view of the uncertainty as to the prospects of an early revival in trade, which alone can rehabilitate the finances of Kenya, I desire to emphasise the importance of maintaining the utmost vigilance in effecting every possible economy which will not cripple the Colony's ultimate recovery.

As regards the Estimates of Revenue, there is the risk which I trust will not be realised, that the forecasts of revenue, particularly ⁴ that derived from customs duties, although framed with great care, may ~~not~~ prove to have been unduly sanguine. In the absence of any precise indication justifying the hope expressed in the 13th paragraph of your despatch under reply of an early industrial and commercial revival.

8. In regard to the Estimates of Expenditure in general, the possibility that it may be necessary to provide for additional expenditure

expenditure on account of the locust menace has also to be borne in mind. Events may compel your Government to undertake, at whatever sacrifice of efficiency, a drastic reconstruction of the budget in the course of the year. With this possibility in view, it will clearly be necessary as stated in my telegram to continue the running appreciation of the financial position in the light of the latest returns, and to formulate a programme, in successive stages, of further retrenchments in expenditure, which should be completed well in advance of the time when the enforcement of each stage may become inevitable.

9. I realise, however, that you fully recognise the importance of these considerations, and that you are already proceeding on these lines. I shall be glad to be furnished, as soon as the figures are available, with a statement

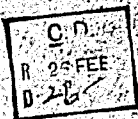
