to individuals. Moreover, apart from the question of hardship gratuities and special compensation to retrenched officials must to a large extent cancel out immediate saving on personal emoluments. I should greatly prefer therefore some expedient which would spread the necessary sacrifice over as wide a field as possible so as to lighten the burden of individuals.

I would press strongly upon you the desirability of re-instituting an income tax as an emergency measure, even if it were only possible for it to be effectively collected from Government officials. Indeed I think that the imposition of such a tax is probably desirable in any case in order to strengthen the budget position. Another possibility which you will no doubt discuss with the Governors of Uganda and Tanganyika is a further increase in customs duties.

7. I appreciate that you are reluctant to undertake important or radical measures until the report of the special Financial Commissioner has been made. But even if suitable man can be found and can get to work shortly, his report could hardly be ready before next year if it is to be really comprehensive. I feel that the present emergency will not brook so long a delay and that measures of a temporary character must be introduced to deal with the immediate situation. Such measures being avowedly temporary and liable to alteration or abolition in a few months' time should not be too critically examined from the standpoint of absolute equity. The fundamental points are that they should be broadly sound, administratively not too difficult, and should yield immediate or early results.

to) to meet future contingencies. There is still a possibility of unforeseen expenditure, and of a further fall in revenue during this year below estimates. Every possible effort should therefore be made to avoid recourse to these re-allocations and budget should if possible be balanced by increased revenue or decreased expenditure during the current year. If this is not possible I must ask that the Estimates for 1932 should show in addition to the surplus of 250,000 for which you estimate a further surplus equivalent to the sum taken from balances this year.

4. There are no signs that the present depression is passing or will pass in the near future. All the indices point to its continuance, and no more optimistic hypothesis is justified by the known facts, or supported by the trend of informed opinion here. I do not know whether the estimates of 1932 revenue have been prepared on this basis. If not I must request that they should be immediately revised. I am sorry to have to make these requests so shortly before your budget session but I feel that they are the minimum which financial prudence dictates.

5. I must also repeat that any assistance from the Imperial Exchequer is wholly out of the question and you will of course realise that to meet a deficit by borrowing would be extremely undesirable.

6. It is for you to decide the means by which revenue may be increased or expenditure lowered, and I do not wish unduly to fetter your discretion. At the same time I feel uneasy at the prospect of wholesale terminations of appointments of existing staff, with the inevitable consequence of hardship

TELEGRAM from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor of Kenya.

(Sent 5.20 p.m. 8th August, 1931)

No. 241. Confidential.

Your telegram No. 215. I have been greatly disturbed to learn that you now expect a deficit for 1931 of some £75,000 even after every possible allowance has been made for unreciprocated savings. I hope that contribution of £10,000 may now be forthcoming from Sudan for defence of Turkana, but this will still leave a deficit of £65,000.

2. Possible means by which this could be met have been discussed with Treasury and I shall if necessary be prepared to approve the following reallocations of Surplus Balances:-

- A. Allocation for unallocated stores to be reduced to £95,000.
- B. Allocation of £44,000 for housing schemes to be transferred to loan.
- C. Allocation for advances to Local Authorities to be reduced to £10,000.
- D. Allocation for maize subsidy to be reduced to £82,000.

I should not, however, feel justified in approving the reduction of working capital to £60,000 as is apparently contemplated by the Treasurer (see Appendix 2 to his memorandum enclosed in your despatch of the 23rd May, Confidential No. 23).

3. These reallocations would enable deficit on current year to be met and leave a margin of about £23,700 according to latest figure of balances. To leave the budget balanced by this means would, however, be a doubtful and dangerous expedient since it would exhaust every possible reserve and would leave absolutely no margin (apart from the £23,700 just

- 3. My plan has been to admit that a deficit in 1931 is unavoidable and to budget for a surplus next year and to seize every opportunity from 1932 onwards of effecting economies until ~~the~~ our expenditure has a safe level and one which will enable accumulation of adequate surplus balance.
- 4. I have already considered the question of Income Tax and of increased Customs Duties and I have been advised that the former is impracticable as an emergency measure and that the latter would have a deplorable effect upon trade generally.
- 5. My own view is that it would be bad policy to mutilate the 1932 Budget to the extent you suggest as I am confident that the measure of economy ~~the~~ reflected in the 1932 Budget will reduce our expenditure to an economic level and that the Colony will thus be able to survive the depression even if recovery is delayed. The possibility of assistance from the Imperial Exchequer has not been and is not contemplated.
- 6. I trust that you will agree to proposal in paragraph 2 above and I can assure you that prudence is being exercised.

TELEGRAM from the Governor ^{of} Kenya, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

IMMEDIATE. No. 254 Confidential. Your telegram No. 241 Confidential.

Estimates are now in print and ready for presentation to the Council on the 18th August. The measures you press us could receive consideration in Select Committee but if that is done Select Committee will in effect become an Economic and Finance Committee as in 1922 with all that that implies.

2. The latest information indicates that the deficit on 1931 will be approximately £110,000. Reference Appendix 2 to the Treasurer's memorandum in my despatch of the 23rd May (Confidential) No. 73 allowing £100,000 for working cash reserve and transfer of £44,000 to loan with other adjustments referred to in your telegram but ~~IX~~ ignoring £10,000 from Sudan the unreserved surplus will amount to £88,700 from which however must be deducted £21,000 earmarked for recoverable famine relief expenditure making unreserved surplus £68,700.

Deducting this sum from anticipated deficit of £110,000 there will be a deficit of £41,300 on surplus balance account at the end of 1931. This will not cause any embarrassment as I am satisfied that margin on working cash reserve and unallocated stores will more than cover the Colony's cash requirements. I have budgetted for a surplus in 1932 of £52,000 which will restore surplus balance to £462,700 and ~~IX~~ thus allow a free surplus of £20,700. In the circumstances would you be prepared to agree to amount expended from revenue on capital works of a permanent nature during the last five years amounting to approximately £200,000 being transferred to Loan Account and a corresponding refund to revenue being invested as a surplus reserve fund and so reconstituting financial position. I understand that there are precedents for this course. This would give an invested surplus of £200,000 plus a free surplus of £20,700 in addition to appropriated items surplus balance account.

done in such a direction until a definite need arose. That need has not arisen in Kenya apparently since Kenya considers that they can at present cover the Colony's cash requirements. At the moment, as regards Kenya, it seems undesirable to attempt to cover up the seriousness of the position by any such device.

As regards the 1932, the Secretary of State said that the present estimates should be immediately revised unless they had been prepared on the basis of the continuance of the present depression. He also said that if the 1931 budget could not be balanced by revenue and increased expenditure the estimates for 1932 should show in addition to the surplus of £60,000 a further surplus equivalent to the sum taken from balances in respect of 1931. The Governor considers, however, that it would be undesirable to mutilate the present estimates, and that if this were done the Select Committee would in effect become an economic finance committee. i.e., it would really take upon itself the function of the proposed Financial Commissioner. Sir John Campbell thought that this risk might be avoided by arranging that the proposed alteration should emanate from the Government; but ~~from this point of view~~ there seems to be substance in the Governor's objection, and ~~from that point of view~~ it would seem more desirable that the Select Committee should consider the Estimates as put before them, any further re-construction of the budget being considered by the Financial Commissioner. If he is appointed shortly there should be time for this before the end of the year as the Estimates are being taken early.

In this connection reference should be made to the fact that all travelling allowances (except the actual cost of lodging in cases where staying in hotel, club, etc.) have been suspended, with the agreement of the Council of the Local European Civil Servants Association, which, however, expressed the hope that the Government would consider alternative measures of a more equitable nature, such as income tax. Civil Servants ^{have therefore} ~~however~~, in this respect already made special contribution.

The Governor's telegram includes a proposal that sums expended from revenue on permanent capital works during the last five years amounting to approximately £200,000 should be transferred to loan account, and be invested as a surplus reserve fund to re-constitute the financial position. As regards precedents, it is believed that there is one in the case of the Malay States where large sums had been spent from current revenue on capital works which would normally be met from loan. But the position in Kenya is different since there has been rather a tendency to charge to loan works which should more properly perhaps have been met from revenue. We have no details as to the nature of the works referred to, though particulars might be ascertained from the accounts of the last five years. Nor does the Governor suggest what items should be omitted from the approved loan services as a setoff. The Governor should be asked for these details, but ^{the} on question of principle it seems undesirable to go in for anything in the nature of window-dressing. A similar point has come up in Tanganyika where it was decided that nothing should be

In considering this matter one must assume that all possible reduction of services are being made, and as regards retrenchments of staff, recognise that further retrenchments at this time of the year would not produce savings during the year. The only effective measure of immediate value that suggests itself is a cut in salaries, with which the Secretary of State has not hitherto been disposed to agree. MEMORANDUM.

On points of detail it may be noted:-

(a) In his previous telegram of the 18th July the Governor foreshadowed a deficit on the 1931 revenue of £114,149 against which might be set possible savings amounting to £40,000, provided no further unforeseen expenditure had to be incurred. It now appears from the latest information that the deficit in 1931 is put at £110,000, i.e., either savings will not materialise, or additional expenditure has to be incurred.

(b) It is probable that the £10,000 from the Sudan will accrue this year.

(c) The £20,000 earmarked for famine relief, which was not taken into account in the calculation in the telegram No. 1, is in respect of the suspense account which was opened as the result of the locusts invasion. That amount was approved in the Secretary of State's telegram of the 13th June.

2. The problem falls under two heads :-

- (a) The position in 1931, and
- (b) The Budget for 1932.

As regards 1931, the Secretary of State laid down in his telegram of the 8th August that every possible effort should be made to avoid recourse to re-allocations of existing surplus balances, and the Budget should if possible be balanced by increased revenue or decreased expenditure during the current year.

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General Department:

Proposals are on foot for the introduction of Income Tax Ordinances in Kenya and Uganda. Both Dependencies have already had the circular despatches of the 28th December, 1922, 30th December, 1922 and the 17th February, 1925, about the Model Income Tax Ordinance. They have also been furnished with copies of miscellaneous despatches of the 9th October, 1926 (14131/26 Gen) and the 7th January, 1931 (71163/30 Gen.) which suggest further amendments to the model Ordinance, and with a copy of the despatch from Nyasaland of the 3rd February, 1926, containing two Judgments on income tax cases passed in the High Court in Nyasaland.

It is now desired to send them any further information which may be of use to them, either in drafting the Ordinance or in operating it after it has been passed. For this purpose Mr. Chamberlain after an exhaustive search has unearthed the General papers a list of which is attached. I should be glad if you would arrange for 7 copies of each of these papers to be made. They should be put up in order of date. ^(in separate sets) Four copies will be sent to Kenya and three to Uganda.

Of the circular despatches mentioned copies need only be put up if they have not already gone to Kenya and Uganda.

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12. The foregoing considerations, coupled with the unlikelihood of any substantial increase in the Colony's revenue until world conditions improve and until the basis of production broadens, show the necessity of bringing recurrent expenditure to a figure considerably lower than that recorded for 1930 and indicate that in all probability recurrent expenditure must be held down without annual increases, for some years to come.

13. As was to be expected in the conditions recently and still prevailing, credit has been leaguing the Colony at a rather alarming rate. During the last 27 months the East African Currency Board has been called upon to redeem twenty-two million East African shillings from Kenya alone. The Board has, in consequence, been forced to increase its rate for drafts on London from 1 per cent to 1½ per cent (the maximum permissible under its regulations) but I doubt if this increase alone will serve to stem the outward flow until conditions improve.

exports of domestic produce would be in the neighbourhood of 2550,000 per annum at most. The other factors named have therefore a most important bearing on the revenue returns and contributed in no small measure to the Customs revenue of 2815,288 received in 1930, low though it was in comparison with the 1929 figure of 2949,725.

11. From the above considerations it seems abundantly clear that substantial annual increases in the Colony's revenue cannot be relied upon in the near future as they have been relied upon in the past. Furthermore, I hold the view that on the present basis of production, Government expenditure as a whole is on too lavish a scale. We have been borne on the crest of a wave of prosperity; different standards are necessary if security and stability are to be achieved under which, without dislocation of services, we can carry ^{on} through the trough. The past policy of expansion of services has led to an annual increase, from 1927, to 1930, of approximately £160,000 in the provision made for recurrent services in Annual Estimates. Immediate revenue prospects not only make it impossible to contemplate a continuance of such expansion, but also indicate that that expansion has been carried to a level which the revenue is unable to support and contraction has become inevitable. Actual revenue in 1930 totalled £3,241,600; actual recurrent expenditure totalled £3,114,912, giving a margin in favour of revenue of £126,688 if non-recurrent expenditure could be altogether avoided. It is, however, unlikely that this will be possible and it must be remembered that loan charges will increase in 1932 owing to the larger borrowings covered by the 1930 loans, and to the necessity for making annual sinking fund contributions in respect of the 1928 loan, while in 1934 a further increase will have to be met covering sinking fund payments on the 1930 loan.

place during the past ten years, both by private enterprise and by means of loan monies for Transport and Colonial services, has had a marked effect on the importation of goods. The completion of certain important Railway, Port and other works in the Colony, coupled with the discouragement given to private enterprise by unfavorable climatic conditions, unstable political circumstances, and the dwindling profits attaching to agriculture in all parts of the world, must lead to a decline in Customs revenue and may be regarded as responsible for the fall in Customs revenue recorded in 1930. Government and Railway expenditure from loan funds has come to a virtual standstill and no substantial programme similar to that of the past ten years is in sight. This factor alone will tend to diminish Customs returns. Renewed activity by private enterprise may be expected to follow a revival in world prices, but for so long as the present depression remains and the local land market is comparatively inactive, a lower level of Customs revenue must be anticipated. It may be taken as certain that "peak" revenues are obtainable only when development in all forms is proceeding actively and the setback suffered by the Colony during the last two years may therefore adversely affect the Colony's revenue for some time to come.

10. I have referred to those factors of development and the entrepot and carrying trade because they must be regarded as occasioning the marked disparity between imports and exports. For 1930, the exports of domestic produce from Kenya were valued at 23,422,571, the highest figure recorded in the Colony's history. On the Customs tariff in force during the past three years, the ratio of Customs revenue to the value of trade imports is approximately 16 per cent, so that on the basis of that tariff the return to the Colony's revenue in respect of goods imported to the value of the full

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Estimates which, though in part allocated, in those Estimates to capital works, are in fact available to meet loan charges, because they do not entail any permanent commitment".

8. This margin, as shown in Sanctioned Estimates from 1926 to 1931, has been as follows:-

((1) The margin shown in the Draft Estimates for 1929 was £279,963 (13.2 per cent) but this was decreased by 275,230 mainly as a result of recommendations made by the Select Committee for additions to the Colony's recurrent expenditure. In my opinion the circumstances of the Colony require that a substantial margin should, if possible, be maintained between the estimates of revenue and estimated recurrent expenditure, on the lines of the policy enunciated in 1928.

9. In the third place, the annually increasing returns from Customs duties recorded from 1921 to 1929 have tended to create a feeling of security unrelated to the circumstances of the Colony as reflected in the balance of trade. As shown in Trade Reports for many years past, the value of trade imports into Kenya has greatly exceeded the value of domestic exports. Owing to its geographical situation and the development of commercial businesses and transportation services, Kenya is able to look forward with confidence to the importation of dutiable articles in excess of the value which the export of its domestic produce alone would appear to justify, and the development which has taken

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stances prevented this and in both 1929 and 1930 there would, in fact, have been a deficit on the working of the year even if no expenditure against surplus balances had been authorised. The low level to which the Colony's surplus balances have now been reduced leaves little margin to withstand a continuance of the set-back in local conditions and it is, in my opinion, essential not only that surplus balances should be restored as rapidly as possible, but that they should be placed on the firm basis of an invested Reserve Fund of substantial amount, no part of which should be realised and spent except in the direct emergency for equilibration of Budgets.

6. In the second place, now as in 1921, it has proved difficult to distinguish in advance normal from abnormal years. Revenue estimates are prepared so far in advance of the year to which they relate that they are at the mercy of causes unknown or unrecognized at the time of compilation. This disability is inherent in a country whose ~~sore~~ industry is dependent on price and climatic factors entirely outside its own control and a large part of whose revenue takes the form of a tax on consumption by means of customs duties. Climatic conditions cannot be foretold for the following year, and the general trend of world prices is almost equally obscure; yet both these factors materially affect the Colony's revenue.

7. Emphasis was laid on the necessity for increasing the margin to be maintained between revenue and recurrent expenditure when the Budgets for 1928 and 1929 were presented to the Legislative Council. In the 1929 Budget Memorandum the following statement appears:-

"Government regards the maintenance of a substantial margin between revenue and recurrent expenditure as a vital factor in the Colony's financial policy. The credit of the Colony on the London market depends in no small measure on its capacity to show that there are balances on annual

expenditure should be insistent. Annual Estimates regularly reflected increases in staff; loan monies were used to erect new buildings and improve communications; and a scale of Government expenditure was established which for its continuance presupposed an annually increasing revenue.

4. It is easy to be wise after the event, and it is no part of my present intention to criticize the decisions upon which the Colony embarked on an ever-increasing development of services. My remarks are intended solely towards avoiding certain pitfalls for the future as a result of the lessons obtainable from previous years, and these lessons appear to me to fall into three categories.

5. In the first place, it has been recognized during 1930 that the Colony's liquid reserve is too low. The Budget Memorandum on 1931 Estimates recorded Government's opinion "that the dictates of financial prudence make it necessary to build up the Colony's balances to a much more substantial figure". Expenditure against the Colony's surplus balances was approved deliberately in 1928, when, out of an ascertained total excess of assets over liabilities of £693,260 as at the end of 1927, a sum of £102,780 was set aside for certain works to be undertaken and again, in 1929, expenditure totalling £105,537 was contemplated against surplus balances in the Estimates for 1930 as finally approved. These inroads into surplus balances would not have been of great moment if the rapid expansion of Colonial surplusses evidenced over a number of years had been maintained. The average excess of revenue over expenditure from 1924 to 1928 was £214,030 per annum and if this had continued in 1929 and 1930 the authorised expenditure on much-needed capital works could have been undertaken against surplus balances, while at the same time substantial sums were accruing to those balances. A succession of adverse circum-

2. It will be seen that the proposal is to tax in the first instance incomes of £300 per annum and upwards only, until such time as the system of administration has been developed to a point which will render it practicable to extend the operation of the Ordinance to incomes below £300. The first step contemplated by this Government is the enactment of an Income Tax (Returns) Ordinance on the lines of the Nyasaland Ordinance No. 2 of 1921.

3. Your Government will no doubt agree that the present system obtaining in the East African Territories of direct taxation by means of a flat rate Poll Tax is illogical and inequitable, and that measures should, if possible be taken to replace this unsatisfactory and antiquated system by a system under which each individual will be taxed in proportion to his capacity to pay. It is, of course, represented that the latter system is in fact attained in our respective territories by means of the customs tariff but this Government is unable to accept this contention as wholly true. It would be necessary, for instance, to show, before a customs tariff could be accepted as a satisfactory substitution for income tax, that in all sections of the community the wealth of the individual is evenly reflected in his standard of living, and that the profits of individuals and companies engaged in business other than wholesale and retail

Government revenue. If an alteration in the system, as apart from an addition to taxation, were to be contemplated in this Colony, a full enquiry would be necessary into the whole system of taxation and its incidence.

10. I am strongly opposed to the re-introduction of an income tax measure in Kenya except as the result of full enquiry on the whole system of taxation in this Colony or as a means of meeting the circumstances referred to in the first part of paragraph 4 above. I see no reason to suppose that the arguments adduced against this form of taxation in 1920 and 1921, which led to its repeal in 1922, are not as strong now as they were then. I agree with the view then expressed that an income tax should not be imposed except in countries where there is an abundance of capital available for industrial and commercial enterprise and where, in consequence the incidence of such a tax can be arranged so as not to retard the production of wealth.

9. In 1921 freedom from Treaty restrictions in regard to customs duties was obtained and higher import duties were imposed. The Budget for 1922 was balanced on the assumption that both the higher customs duties and the income tax would bring substantial sums to revenue. In May, 1922, the Income Tax Ordinance was repealed because, on information supplied as to its operation on the 1921 assessment, the tax was considered unfair in its incidence; it was found to leave untouched a large proportion of the non-native population, and it was held that a very large portion of the tax was actually paid out of capital imported into Kenya which should properly be used in development. A short note of actual collections and the cost of collections is attached to this memorandum.

10. The loss on the estimate of revenue for 1922 which would follow the repeal of the tax amounted to £103,000 and increased customs duties were levied devised so as to secure equivalent revenue by increasing indirect taxation mainly falling on non-natives. These higher duties were imposed mainly on wines, spirits, tobacco and motor cars and, except in the case of motor cars and accessories, they remain embodied in the present tariff. Any suggestion for imposing an income tax must, therefore, inevitably lead to strong pressure for a reduction in the customs tariff.

11. The form which taxation should take is not a matter which can be pronounced upon without full enquiry and I should be going beyond the subject of the letter if I were to deal with this question now. I would, however, observe that times of economic depression are not times in which the imposition of additional taxes is likely to lead to full returns not only because the new taxes are apt to be resisted but also because the reduced spending power of the population resulting from the new taxation, restricts consumption in other directions and this is felt in other sources of

the fiscal system) than it was before the income tax was introduced. And to obtain a reasonable balance in a fiscal system income tax should be accompanied by both land tax and poll tax.

7. I am unable to admit that taxation in force in Nyassaland has any bearing on the Kenya problem. In this Colony we are attempting to grapple with problems which may be similar in many ways to those encountered in Nyassaland, but trade, revenue, and political conditions are clearly dissimilar. The Nyassaland population for 1929 is given at 1,936 Europeans, 1,117 Asiatics and 1,356,945 natives; the Nyassaland revenue for that year was only £372,508 and the imports £770,855. Local experience must carry greater weight in dealing with Kenya policies than experience in Nyassaland.

8. An Income Tax Ordinance was introduced in Kenya in 1920. The reasons for the introduction were the urgency of finding further sources of revenue to meet the rapid increase in Government expenditure which followed the War and which was automatically accentuated by the currency conversion, and the prohibition, which rested on Kenya at that time by Treaty, against increasing customs duties and so obtaining additional revenue by indirect taxation. On the one hand there was the pressing need for new revenue to meet totally exceptional conditions; on the other hand the Government's hands were tied by Treaty in regard to the form the new revenue should take. Neither of those factors is in operation to-day. There has been no automatic increase in Government expenditure such as was occasioned by the currency conversion, and the only restriction placed on the rates at which import duties are imposed (apart from considerations arising out of the Customs union) is the fear that by increasing the duties consumption will decrease and the revenue fall.

4. I am prepared to agree with that part of paragraph 4 of Mr. Scott's letter which records the view that, if temporary cuts or permanent reductions in existing salaries become necessary, that result could most equitably be attained for the existing staff by the introduction of an income tax. As applied to Kenya conditions, however, I regard this much more as an argument which is likely to prevent a decision to reduce the salaries of existing staff in Kenya (as apart from an Empire-wide movement) than as a valid argument in favour of introducing an income tax.

5. I do not altogether agree with the hypothesis in paragraph 3 of Mr. Scott's letter. In my opinion, direct taxation by means of a flat rate poll tax is not illogical and, in view of the power to grant exemption, is not in all respects inequitable. Each member of the community should, if he is able to do so, contribute something towards the cost of protection of his person and property and a poll tax ensures that he does so. Admittedly a poll tax, except in the case of remissions, is not based upon "capacity to pay" but, for better or worse, the principle has been adopted in Kenya (after much deliberation and after other methods have been tried and have failed), of obtaining revenue from the non-native population by taxing consumption rather than earnings. Apart from poll taxes, therefore, non-native taxation is taxation on expenditure, not on income, and this system is held to give the greatest benefit to the community as a whole in a Colony where capital is required for development.

6. I hold the view also, that if an income tax is introduced in a country of mixed race, with markedly different standards of living, a poll tax becomes even more necessary (if any balance at all is to be maintained in the

I have made no such study of economic and financial conditions in Uganda as would enable me to form any opinion as to the effect of imposing an income tax on the individual members of the population who earn incomes of £300 per annum and upwards. I observe, however, that "it is appreciated that during times of economic depression such as the present the bulk of the proceeds of the tax would be derived from official incomes".

2. I have endeavoured to obtain from the Conference Statistician details of the official and unofficial adult male population in Uganda, but these are not yet available from the recent census returns. My impression, however, gained from examining official records, is that a comparatively high percentage of the European population in Uganda is composed of Government servants and, if this is so, a great part of the revenue from an income tax is assured before the difficulty of collection begins. The tax should, therefore, bring in revenue which compares very favourably with the cost of collection, and this probable result does not, at first sight, appear to be confined to periods of economic depression in so far as Uganda is concerned.

3. In Kenya, conditions are different. Officials account for but 20 per cent of the European male population of twenty years old and upward - the figures obtained from the Statistician show 5,697 unofficials and 1,460 officials - and the problem of assessment and collection of an income tax is thereby greatly increased.

FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1930.

In submitting my Annual Financial Report for 1930, I have certain comments to make on the financial position of the Colony. I have not incorporated these in the body of my Report, which deals solely with the financial working of the year 1930.

2. During the two year period, 1929 and 1930, the Colony's expenditure has exceeded its revenue by £368,605 and reliance has had to be placed on available surplus balances to make advances to the maize industry and to cereal growers and to finance a temporary scheme of short-term agricultural credits. Liquid balances have now been reduced to a dangerously low figure and the end of the world-wide trade depression is not yet in sight. These circumstances lead me forcibly to the conclusion that for some time to come the Colony's expenditure must be restricted within much narrower limits than in recent years and the rapid rate at which services have been extended must, at least temporarily, come to an end.

3. The annual growth of the Colony's revenue from 1928 to 1929 indicates a period of prosperity and development during which it was inevitable that the demand for new services and new forms of Government

8. We have several times been informed that assistance from the Imperial exchequer is wholly out of the question, and on that point I would like to assure you that no thought of appealing for a grant in aid has yet entered the head of any official here.

9. It is true that our estimates of revenue for the current year have proved to be over-optimistic, but I imagine that that has been the case with most Colonies, and we really have been doing our best to produce a Budget for next year which will not be disappointing. A heavy loss on the current year is, I am afraid, unavoidable.

10. We get a little confused at times by what appears to us the varying views of the Colonial Office. One day we get instructions that retrenchments must be carried out, on another that retrenchments are to be avoided, if possible. I fear that one can't make omelettes without breaking eggs.

11. In case it may be of interest to you I enclose also a copy of a memorandum I addressed to the Colonial Secretary when forwarding the Treasury Annual Report for 1950. The memorandum gives a survey in general terms of the position as I see it. This letter and the papers attached are of course forwarded quite informally and unofficially.

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4. As regards the estimates of revenue for next year, I believe that all the items, except customs revenue, are a reasonable anticipation of what we are likely actually to collect under existing conditions. I confess that I had some doubt as to the estimates of customs revenue, and Walsh was sent for from Mombasa to Nairobi to discuss the matter. In the face of various groups of figures which I presented to him he is still emphatically of opinion that his estimates of customs revenue for next year are reasonable, and they have therefore been accepted.

We are alive to our dangers and difficulties and if further curtailment of expenditure prove necessary this, I am sure, can and will be effected.

I have suggested, and the Governor has verbally agreed, that we should have a three years' plan, during which time no expansion of services and no single addition to staff should be made; and moreover that we should continually strive still further to reduce expenditure on that now estimated for 1952.

collect next year, showing a surplus of over £80,000, we
should not have done so badly.
