Lord Moyne's Enquiry

Major Fosbrooke-Hobbes called this morning
(a day earlier than expected) and left with me the
following papers:-

- (1) Lord Moyne's Report (in duplicate)-
- (2) Sir Joseph Byrne's Personal and Confidential
letter to the Secretary of State of the 7th
of May.

Major Fosbrooke-Hobbes made the following
points in the course of his conversation:-

- (i) The urgency of publication.

He told him that we should arrange to get
the duplicate of the Report to the Printing Department
today, so that the work of printing might be set in
hand forthwith. He was anxious to know how soon
publication could be effected. The Report is a bulky
one with numerous appendices, and I said that I
thought ten days or a fortnight would be the earliest
possible limit of time. I gathered also that Lord
Moyne and Major Fosbrooke-Hobbes would wish to read
the proofs and check the statistics in the appendices
rather carefully:

- (ii) The title of the Report.

This has been left blank, as Lord Moyne
would like our advice on this point.

- (iii) Communication to the press in East Africa.

Major Fosbrooke-Hobbes said that Lord Moyne
would like to let the four leading papers in Kenya
have

have an authoritative summary of the main recommendations in the Report in advance of publication. He hopes to arrive for this in the following way:-

He would send out by air mail 8 or 9 days before the date of publication summaries to the Editors of the East African Standard, the Times of East Africa, the Mombasa Times and the Kenya Daily Mail, with instructions that the material was not to be released until receipt of a cable from Lord Moyne authorising publication.

(1) As regards immediate action, I think that Major Fesbrook Hobbes would like to see Mr. Allen and have a general talk with him tomorrow. He suggested 11.30, but I could not get Mr. Allen as he was engaged on the telephone when I tried to get through to him. (Major Fesbrook Hobbes' telephone numbers are Ascot 210 or the Conservative Research Department, Whitehall 6834.)

(2) You will remember that Lord Moyne, in his letter to the Secretary of State of the 28th of April, of which I gave Mr. Allen a copy, suggested an early meeting with Sir P. Cunliffe-Lister and Sir S. Wilson. On instructions given me by the Secretary of State before he left last week, I am sending on today to him the draft of a letter in reply, to be sent to Lord Moyne at 10 Grosvenor Place, saying that Sir Philip and Sir

Sir Samuel will be delighted to lunch with him, and suggesting Wednesday, the 25th May. I will also send on to the Secretary of State today one copy of the Report and Sir Joseph Byrne's letter, so that he may have an opportunity of studying them before he meets Lord Moyne.

Mr. Freeston

Here is a copy of the letter I wrote to Lord Moyne last night at your suggestion. He telephoned this morning to say that of course he attached no importance to the size of the type in which the concluding chapter of his Report is to be printed, though he thought it a pity that readers should have to wade through the bulk of the Report before they could find the summary of recommendations.

Lord Moyne said that he had a letter from the Secretary of State this morning (doubtless the one I drafted here the other day and sent to the S. of S. at Swinton, Masham). It has now been arranged definitely that Lord Moyne should see the Secretary of State with Sir Samuel Wilson, on Wednesday. Lord Moyne said that Major Fosbroke Hobbs is coming to see Sir S. Wilson tomorrow, one of the suggestions the former is going to make is that, in order to help the Governor as much as possible, we should try to send out by itself, prints of the main Report excluding all, or nearly all, the appendices, and so save a week's time in ^{mail} printing. I said that we would consider this suggestion. Would you advise Sir S. Wilson on the point before he sees Major Fosbroke Hobbs?

The latter part of the above Time Table is based on the assumption that authority for printing off the copies for publication cannot be given till the Cabinet has seen the advance (i.e. proof) copies. Eight days have been allowed for Cabinet consideration.

But I read the S. of S's minute as meaning that the final printing can be proceeded with and that it is only publication that must await reference to the Cabinet. If so, publication might be arranged a week earlier, but this, of course, is dependent on whether the reference to the Cabinet is for consideration or merely for information.

Under present arrangements advanced copies of Lord Moyne's Report will reach Nairobi on Wednesday, the 13th June, and will be released to the Press, etc. on Monday June 16th. This interval of 3 days was thought advisable to provide against any delay due to breakdown of the aeroplane which might occur before the copies reached Kenya.

Lord Moyne has now ~~found~~ through Major Fosbrooke-Hobbs that great advantages would be derived from advancing the date of publication to Friday, June the 17th. The London newspapers would be able to give publicity to the Report on the Saturday instead of the following Tuesday and the existence of the Report could be taken into account on the Friday in connection with arranging the business of the House of Commons for the following

Lord Elyne, I understand, attaches very considerable importance to putting forward the date in the manner suggested.

Mr. Decrett's staff has been consulted and agreed that in some ways Friday would be the better day for release. The risk that the arrangements for simultaneous publication would be upset by failure of the aeroplane to arrive in accordance with schedule can be guarded against by asking the Governor of Kenya to telegraph as soon as the packages have been received.

If the date is advanced it will mean that the gap of 4 days which must in any case elapse before the report reached India will be increased to 7 days; this, however, is not very material.

My dear Wilson,

I am looking forward very much to seeing you at lunch on Wednesday at 1.15.

Meanwhile I am wondering whether there is anything to be done with the Stationery Office to enable the Kenya consignment of reports to catch the aeroplane on the morning of the 8th June instead of having to wait until the 15th as is now suggested. I understand that the galley proofs of the Report are to be ready to-morrow and of the Appendices on Saturday and that four days after their return they can get them bound up as book proofs. Assuming that they start on this on Monday, the 30th, they ought therefore to have the book proofs by Friday.

The Stationery Office say that after the book proofs have been passed they need ten days to bind up for publication.

In view of the short time before the end of the Session and Byrne's great anxiety to get things settled as soon as possible, I am wondering whether you could induce the Stationery Office to bind up thirty or forty of the uncorrected book proofs for dispatch to Kenya by the plane leaving on the morning of the 8th June. While this consignment was on its way there would be plenty

of time for them to get through with their ordinary
arrangements for the home issue for simultaneous
publication about the 17th of June.
