States that Capt Whalley wishes to take leave from about the middle of May & proposes to approve his substitution appointment with effect from 12 May next & extend provisional appointment until that date.

It is as soon as Capt Whalley returns on the substitution appointment the E.A. Contribution (including allowances) will be half of £1000 instead of half of £852 E. The Sudan authorities make up the difference between £852 E and £1000 in addition to their half share of the basic salary.

The F.O. proposal seems reasonable - indeed as they point out there is a case for deferring the substitution appl. from the end of the 2 years agreement. It is however contrary to the usual practice in the Colonial Service which the format of Kenya at Lt 18222/32 assumes will be followed. F.O. evidently hope that we will agree without reference only but as Capt Whalley's involvement is not really affected (i.e. he gets £1000 in any case) and as the Sudan was in calculation on the guarantee contribution & the cost of a relief I feel disposed to refer the matter to the Governors of K and S pending further copies of 25-26: 18222/32. It has been agreed that East African leave and passage regulations should apply to the subalterns' applt vide 46 & 17092/31 and 23 & 18 222/32. Kenya has since broken away from the Standard conditions but there seems no reason to apply the Kenya revised conditions to this post seeing that Kenya contributes only 1/4 of the cost. I understand that Uganda has not put forward any proposals for modification of the leave and passage rules.

The Kenya local expenditure advisory Ctte has not commented on this post save to recommend the retention of the leave and travelling allow. at the present rates. (para 27 para 92 (1)(b) of the Report).

I inform F.O. of concurrence in the draft and send a copy to the former of Kenya and Uganda notifying them accordingly and explaining that having regard to the nature of the applt. it was not considered possible or equitable to apply the Kenya revised conditions to this post.

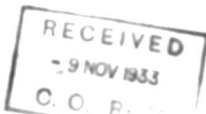

I am directed by Secretary Sir John Simon to state, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that His Majesty's Minister at Addis Ababa considers that, on the expiry of Captain Whalley's present leave of absence, Captain Whalley should visit Addis Ababa so that he may seek an audience with the Emperor to discuss frontier difficulties in his district. If this visit is sanctioned, Captain Whalley will go to Addis Ababa via Khartoum and will then return to Khartoum on his way to Maji. It is understood that this would be the most satisfactory route.

Dear Mr. Freston,

You asked me on the telephone this morning about the £E.44.400 m/ms. drawn by Captain Whalley as his "Assisted Passage Allowance".

The rule under the Sudan Government is that an official proceeding on leave is entitled to transport at Government expense to an Egyptian port. In addition to this he is entitled to an Assisted Passage Allowance which is intended to assist him to pay for his passage from the Egyptian port to England. This Assisted Passage Allowance is £E.22,500 m/ms. both ways, that is, £E.22,500 from Egypt to England and again a similar £E.22,500 from England back to Egypt.

If an official does not take leave in any year, when he proceeds on leave in the subsequent year he is entitled to draw an Assisted Passage Allowance of £E.40 for the passage from Egypt to England and again another £E.40 for the return from England to Egypt.

Captain Whalley did not take leave last year and therefore was entitled to draw the £E.40 for the journey from the Egyptian port to England and he will be entitled on his return to draw another £E.40 for the journey from England to Egypt.

The additional £E.4,400 m/ms. is to cover the cost of his passage from Port Sudan to an Egyptian port, as he is entitled to that anyhow, apart from the Assisted Passage Allowance.

I hope this makes clear the point which was in doubt.

I have the honour to refer to your despatch No. 143 of April 20th, 1955, enclosing a copy of Foreign Office despatch No. 64 dated 10th April, 1955, to Sir Sidney Barton relative to Captain Whalley's terms of appointment and leave of absence.

2. Captain Whalley travelled through the Sudan en route for leave and left Port Sudan for England on August 6th. I attach for convenience of reference a separate note of his itinerary.

3. As there appeared to be some discrepancy, in respect of the operation of the East African Leave and Passage Regulations, as between Kenya and Uganda, it was thought best, in order to facilitate his journey and avoid delay, to apply the regulations of the Sudan Government to Captain Whalley, and he has accordingly been granted free transport from Kampala to Port Sudan and an assisted passage allowance of L.S. 44-100/6 in respect of his homeward journey. It is proposed that similar privileges should be accorded to him in respect of his return journey, and that the necessary adjustments should be effected by the Government concerned after his return to Kaji. In pursuance of this proposal Captain Whalley has authorization to draw L.S. 44-100/6

With reference to Colonial Office letter 16222/32 of January 5th regarding His Majesty's Consul at Kajji, I am directed by Secretary Sir John Simon to state, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that it has now been ascertained that Captain Whalley wishes to take leave of absence from about the middle of May.

2. With regard to the date from which Captain Whalley's substantive appointment as His Majesty's Consul at Kajji should run, Sir John Simon considers that it would be very logical that the new appointment should date from the day after the provisional appointment expired - i.e. from November 1st last. He feels, moreover, that it would be inequitable to prolong unduly the existing arrangements under which the Sudan Government are paying more than their normal share of His Majesty's Consul's salary. Sir John Simon observes, however, that in paragraph

1 (a) of Kenya despatch No. 94 of July 25th Sir John Simon assumes that the revised arrangements will be introduced only on the date on which Captain Whalley leaves for Kajji on the expiry of his leave. At the time when that despatch was written Captain Whalley was expected to take his leave on about November 1st, so that the liability of the Governments of Kenya and Uganda for the increased amount would have begun on about May 15th next. As Sir John Simon feels that any attempt to persuade the Governments of Kenya and Uganda to accept the increased liability from an earlier date might still further
