The Estimates for 1915, as submitted to the
Legislative Council, provided for a surplus of
revenue over expenditure amounting to £2,522.
Elected Members violently attacked Government on
the grounds that the revenue figures had been
deliberately manipulated in order to present a
balanced budget without any drastic reduction in
expenditure. On the 3/11/15 the Estimates
were referred to the Standing Finance Committee.
The Committee held seven meetings, but after the
fourth meeting the three European Elected Members
on the Committee withdrew from further deliberations
as they considered that no useful purpose would be
served by their continuing to sit on the Committee
unless Government would accept as a principle that
the expenditure estimates should be reduced by
£100,000.

The recommendations of the majority of the
Committee provided for a surplus of revenue over
expenditure of £15,907. The Elected Members

submitted a minority report in which they stated, inter alia, that their views would be met if a Committee were appointed with terms of reference instructing them to reduce expenditure by £100,000 at least.

The report of the majority of the Committee was adopted by the Legislative Council on the 21st of December and its recommendations are shown in the estimates as passed by the Council. The Governor subsequently offered to appoint a Select Committee of the Legislature to "make recommendations to the Legislature for measures of economy which, if adopted, will result in a net reduction amounting to not less than £100,000 in the net annual expenditure of the Colony". The motion was passed unanimously by the Legislative Council.

The 1933 budget provided for a deficit of £176,095. During that year revenue exceeded the estimate and savings were effected with the result that the ^{actual} ~~annual~~ deficit was £46,539. For 1934 the Governor budgeted for a surplus of £10,932. The revised estimates of revenue and expenditure for 1934 anticipated a deficit on the year of £54,536.

The actual excess of assets over liabilities on the 31st December, 1933, was £205,495. On the basis of the revised estimate for 1934 that amount was reduced to £150,959 on the 31st of December, 1934. If the 1935 estimates are realized the estimated excess of assets over liabilities on the 31st of December, 1935, will be £166,860.

No provision is made for any payment in respect of the Native Settlement Fund in 1935. It has been agreed that the operation of the Fund may be deferred until 1936.

It will be remembered that Lord Moyac recommended that the Settlement Fund should be financed by the grant of 50 per cent. of six years' average yield of active hut and poll tax or any future ^{taxes} ~~taxes~~. Half the average of active hut and poll tax receipts over a period of six years ending the 31st of December, 1933, is £274,261. The total estimate to be spent on native services in 1935 is, however, £267,723.  to Kenya on the subject of the permanently
 crippling item on the expenditure side - the
 Public Debt Service. No final decision has
 yet been reached on the Loan Conversion
 proposals, but the outlook is not hopeful, and
 clearly we can wait no longer - the O.A.C. is
 pressing for a reply and any loan relief that
 might prove practical could scarcely become
 effective before 1936.

It is, of course, true that £218,000 of
 the Public Debt Charge is reimbursed by the Kenya-
 Uganda Railway, but the money comes ultimately from
 the Kenya and Uganda producers' pocket; and any
 reduction of the Railway's overhead burdens (whether
 loan charges or renewals contributions, as regards
 which we are still uncertain) would ultimately be
 available for reducing rates and so adding to the
 taxable capacity of the Colony.

As Mr. Crossin points out, the figure of
 Reducible Expenditure approximates very closely to
 that propounded by the Expenditure Advisory Committee
 in 1932. Nevertheless the Governor has so far
 yielded to the clamour of the European Unofficials
 as to appoint a committee whose unenviable duty it
 will be to reduce this £1,554,000 by £100,000.

The printed Estimates envisage the reduction
 of surplus balances on the 31st December 1934 to
 £159,959; the balance sheet on page 123 shows that
 the assets include the **Cereal Loans** (£118,000) which
 are generally regarded as irrecoverable, and the
Agricultural Advances (£110,000) a great deal of
 which will have to be written off. On this showing,
 Kenya would already be bankrupt; it is therefore not
 without satisfaction that one learns that, as a result
 of the revised calculation of the 1934 working a
 truer estimate of the surplus balances at the
 beginning of the year seems to be £209,000.

Taken as a whole these Estimates are a
 humdrum performance. There is no substantial change
 on either side of the accounts. Further economi-
 cizing has partially offset the automatic increases
 under

under certain heads of expenditure; and on the receipts side (apart from the disappearance of the Package Tax) the same revenue framework is expected to produce a little more than last year. The Governor's proposals for introducing direct taxation on a scientific basis in 1936 have been under separate consideration.

As regards details, I have nothing to add to the appended memorandum. Papers about the Overseas Scholarship Scheme are being sent on separately.

As is to be expected in times like the present there is nothing calling for particular comment in the Kenya Estimates and I accordingly agree with the action proposed.

I think it as well, however, to call attention to the attitude of the European Elected Members as evinced to some extent in their Minority Report. During the debates on the "budget" they accused the Colonial Secretary and the Heads of Departments of deliberately falsifying their revenue estimates in order to make things balance. It was easy, of course, for Mr. Wade to demonstrate that this was not the case and then Lord Francis Scott says that he was dissatisfied with Mr. Wade's speeches. If one looks at the Minority Report the impression given is that they have simply gone through the revenue estimates lopping off in a careless

careless manner an odd 2500 here or 21,000 there. The Govt. estimate may be optimistic but the Elected Members have no justification for saying that it is exaggerated nor can I see any reason why they should be right and the Govt. wrong in their estimates.

The view put forward by the minority is that revenue estimates should be framed on a really conservative basis and expenditure kept within those limits, and they argue that a nett figure of £2,000,000 is the most that can be expected. I think the nett figure means revenue not including reimbursements in aid from the Railway and so on, which go out again in payment of interest on loans.

There is everything to be said for the principle enunciated by the Elected Members, which indeed, is the ordinary principle to be followed in bad times, i.e. first find out what money you can get and then keep your expenditure inside it if you can. But the circumstances of the Govt. do not allow for following out this principle properly. When times were good Kenya got itself loaded up with all sorts of commitments and cannot get rid of them so easily when times are bad. Also all the proposals for improvement of things which are put forward from time to time involve increased Govt. expenditure on the plea that it will be reproductive.

If times are good you can just settle what expenditure government and then make the amount cover it.

The Elected Members state that expenditure ought to be reduced by at least £100,000 and when they were asked for detailed suggestions as to how it could be done they declined to answer but said that a committee ought to be appointed with orders to reduce expenditure by £100,000. This, of course, is ridiculous. It is quite easy to talk about reducing expenditure

expenditure by any given amount and it is quite easy to do it if they are prepared to go without certain amenities and continue to go without them. I, for example, could propose a reduction of not less than £25,000 straight off, that being the amount which Govt. provides for the ineffective education of a small proportion of the European children. If, however, I were to get up in Kenya and say so my life would not be worth a very long purchase.

Since the despatch was written the returns for 1934 now show considerable improvement but the Unofficials are still grabbing the Govt. as will be seen from the wording of the "Times" message which is attached to this paper as No. 1.

Mr. Hosking, the Commissioner of Mines, tells me that about 2400,000 has been spent during the past 12 months in the mining areas and that the most promising concerns will start production of gold by October next. If they can begin steady production it should do a lot to help Kenya's finances, though, as I have repeatedly said, the revenue derived from the gold mining will be indirect in the shape of general prosperity and not direct.

The economic facts are only too plain. The Colony is burdened with excessive indebtedness, and unless and until the value of its products expands considerably there will be perpetual financial difficulties. This would not be so bad if it were not for the political difficulty of dealing with a community which is apparently thoroughly imbued with the doctrine so assiduously propagated in this country that all Government expenditure is wasted and can be reduced without anybody being a penny the worse.

Discussion between the Secretary of State
and Sir Joseph Byrne on July 30th., 1935.

Taxation.

Sir Joseph Byrne pressed for a statement by the Secretary of State that there was no ground for reducing taxation and that a reserve must be built up; the present arrangements weighed quite unfairly on the officials who were now seeing salary levies removed all round them, and it was necessary that the levy should be immediately removed in Kenya also. He hoped that this statement should make it clear that a proper system of taxation must be aimed at for 1937, so as to lead up to the introduction of Income Tax in that year. He considered the overwhelming body of unofficial opinion would really be in favour of Income Tax as being the best distribution of the burden and as bringing in companies as well as individuals.

I mentioned that the despatch^{of} the estimates had gone some distance in stating that there was no possibility of varying the present basis of taxation until it could be replaced by a sounder system, securing not only a balanced budget but a surplus which would form the nucleus of a reserve. This despatch is to be shown to the Secretary of State.

Such projects include small increases in establishments, e.g. African clerks, items of extraordinary expenditure, certain increases in salaries etc.,. I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Flood's letter of the 25th April (38008/35) enclosing a copy of a despatch from the Governor of Kenya forwarding the Colony's estimate of revenue and expenditure for 1935 together with accompanying memoranda, and I am now to request you to convey to Secretary Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister the following reply.

2. My Lords note that the latest forecast of the outturn for 1934 indicates a gross revenue of £3,180,501 and expenditure of £3,176,565, thus showing a surplus on the year of £3,936 in place of the heavy deficit previously anticipated. If this revised estimate is confirmed when the annual accounts are finally closed, it will result in an increase in the surplus balances at the close of 1934 to £209,431.

4. While My Lords are glad to note that the outcome of the year 1954 is more favourable than was at one time anticipated, the position remains an anxious one, the more so as the realisation of the revenue estimates appears to depend upon favourable rainfall, freedom from locusts and the maintenance of economic revival, and must, therefore, be regarded as somewhat uncertain. The insecurity of the position is increased by the low level to which the accumulated surplus has fallen. Indeed, it appears from the statement of Assets and Liabilities as at the 31st December, 1955, that but for the existence of unexpected

loan

loan balances amounting to £794,594, there would be a considerable cash deficiency. My Lords have on more than one occasion urged the importance of rebuilding the accumulated surplus up to £1,000,000, and They do not doubt that the Secretary of State has this objective constantly in mind.

5. In these circumstances, while My Lords appreciate the efforts that have been made to reduce expenditure, the time has not yet come when those efforts can be relaxed. They are glad, therefore, to note that a Committee has been appointed to examine the possibility of further economies, and They would be glad to be informed in due course of the action proposed as a result. They also note that the Governor proposes to discuss, during his forthcoming visit to London this summer, what changes are desirable and practicable in the general basis of taxation. My Lords assume that no net sacrifice of revenue is contemplated.

6. In conclusion I am to state that My Lords

The Budget was debated in the Legislative Council on the 27th to 30th November, and was, on the latter date, referred by resolution to the Standing Finance Committee, consisting of the Colonial Secretary, (Chairman), the Treasurer, the Chief Native Commissioner, three European Elected Members, one Indian Elected Member, and one Nominated Unofficial Member representing Native Interests. The Report of the majority of that Committee was adopted by the Legislative Council on the 21st December, and its recommendations

are reflected in the Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the year 1955, which are enclosed.

5. I propose in this despatch to confine myself to a review of the Estimates themselves, and I will address you separately on the points raised by Unofficial Members in debate.

6. At an early stage in the preparation of the Budget, it became evident that great difficulty would be experienced in balancing without any further curtailment of services, and consequent retrenchment of personnel. Provision had to be made on the expenditure side for Sinking Fund Contributions for a full year in respect of the 1950 £3,400,000 loan. This amounted to an additional £17,000, part of which, if it is true, is reimbursed by the Bangs and Uganda Railways and Harbours Administration. Further, as you are aware from my despatch No. 254 of 11th December, 1954, supplementary expenditure has had to be incurred on a large scale in recent years on account of Pensions and Gratuities, and I therefore deemed it necessary to increase the appropriation by as much as £26,500 in order to obviate, as far as possible, the likelihood of a supplementary appropriation during 1955. Provision for £9,100 had to be made on account of the Provident Funds in connection with the European and Asian Local Civil Services which you have already approved in principle. In fine, "irreducible" expenditure was increased by £57,601, as shown in the table on page 5 of the Memorandum on the Draft Estimates.

7. At the same time, the necessity for

balancing

balancing the budget was obvious, and the only manner in which this could be done was by effecting further economies in ordinary recurrent expenditure. You are fully aware of the substantial reductions which have been made during recent years; their effect has been to render it impossible to reduce expenditure further to any material extent without the cessation or curtailment of services which are, in my view, essential to the well-being of the community.

6. I instructed the Official Members of the Standing Finance Committee to examine, item by item, the figures submitted by each Head of Department, and the Estimates, as presented to Legislative Council, represent the result of their scrutiny. You will observe from page 3 of the Memorandum that, despite certain necessary increases, they succeeded in effecting a net reduction in "reducible" expenditure of £15,942. Subsequent examination by the Standing Finance Committee enabled a further reduction of £282 to be made.

7. It was thus possible to reduce estimated expenditure, to less than what was, in my opinion, a reasonable estimate of revenue, and the Draft Estimates, as presented to Legislative Council, reflected the following figures :-

REVENUE ESTIMATES.

8. You will observe that the majority of the Standing Finance Committee recommended certain increases in the Revenue Estimates, amounting in the aggregate to £15,106, although the European Elected Members considered that the estimated revenue in respect of Customs and Native Hut and Poll Tax was unlikely to be realised. I shall discuss these items in greater detail below.

Head I. Customs and Excise.

9. The estimated revenue from Customs in 1955 is £650,000, while the revised Estimate in respect of 1954 amounts to £600,000. Owing to abnormal transfers of stocks from Kenya houses to Uganda, Kenya has not yet reaped benefit, to any material extent, from the specific duties imposed by the Customs Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, 1953, and I am advised that the effects of that Ordinance are not likely to be delayed much longer. Further, these specific duties have been recently increased by the Customs Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, 1954, and the benefit of this revision should be apparent in the near future.

10. In the second place, I am advised by the Director of Agriculture that the indications are that, from the meteorological and climatic point of view, 1955 will be a normal year, and, on the assumption that the Colony remains free from locusts, a substantial increase in the value of exports of agricultural produce, particularly of native produce,

may be anticipated. Any such increase, even without a rise in world prices, must result in an increase in purchasing power, which would react favourably on Customs Revenue.

11. Thirdly, as you are aware, gold-mining is developing in a satisfactory manner, and I am advised that, provided there is no unforeseen fall in the price of gold, substantial expansion of the industry will take place during 1965. The enactment of the Native Lands Trust (Amendment) Ordinance, 1964, will remove the embargo on mining leases, and there is no doubt that, with increased security of tenure, the mining companies will be producing more gold and affording more employment during 1965 than during 1964. Already, the statistics of the number of natives in employment is showing a tendency to rise.

12. Taking these and other factors into account, I and my advisers are satisfied that the Estimates in respect of Customs Revenue are not only sound, but conservative, and I trust that they will be materially exceeded.

13. The Estimates in respect of Excise and Sundries are based on actual receipts during 1964, and call for no comment.

Head II. Licences, Duties, Taxes, etc.

14. Item B. Stamp Duties, various revenue purposes

Considerably more revenue is being received on account of the duties levied on transfers of mining titles. Further, an amendment to the Stamp Ordinance increasing the duties leviable on certain documents has been passed by the Legislative Council, and will be forwarded shortly for signification of His Majesty's pleasure.

pleasure. In all the circumstances, the Commissioner of Lands considers that the figure of £55,000 is conservative.

15. Hut and Poll Tax (Native)

You will see from paragraphs 9 and 10 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee that the European Elected Members considered that this item has been over-estimated, and that it should be reduced to a sum varying between £550,000 and £542,979. The estimate is based on figures supplied by District Officers and scrutinized by Provincial Commissioners and the Chief Native Commissioner, and in my opinion, these Officers are in the best position to judge the yield which may be expected. I had no option but to accept their advice, and I have every reason to believe that, if 1955 is comparatively free from drought and locusts, the Estimate will be realised.

16. It is appropriate to mention here that a proposal was made, during the course of the debate on the Estimates, that the rate of taxation should be reduced. I recognise that the present rate is probably the source of some hardship, but when I am satisfied that a definite hardship exists, it is my custom in accordance with the powers conferred by the Ordinance to reduce the rate in the particular area affected. I feel that any all-round reduction is to be deprecated at the present time, because it would necessitate a corresponding reduction in native services. Although, in accordance with your telegram No. 217 of 10th September, 1954, no provision is made for the establishment of the Native Betterment Fund, it will be seen from paragraph 16 of the

25269/34

Memorandum that the amount proposed to be spent on Native Services approximates to the Moyne figure. In my opinion, it would be impossible to justify any curtailment of those services. They are necessary to the welfare of the natives and to the development of their Reserves; they alone form the justification for the preservation of Native Hut and Poll Tax at its present figure; and without substantial revenue from taxation they cannot be preserved. I can, however, assure you that the position in each Native Reserve will be carefully watched during the course of the year, and where, in my view, a reduction in the rate of tax is necessary, that reduction will be made.

17. Item 12 - Non-Native Poll Tax. £66,000.

You will recollect that this tax was introduced, as an alternative to Income Tax, during 1933, and that in your despatch No. 597 of 7th June, 1934, you directed that it, as well as certain other taxes, should be given a full and fair trial. I shall address you shortly on the subject of the working of these taxes, but I may say that £66,000 represents approximately the amount which the Non-Native Poll Tax will yield during 1934.

18. Item 14 - Estate Duty. £12,000.

The Revised Estimate for 1934 is £19,000, and I have reason to believe that substantial sums will accrue from this source during the early months of 1934.

19. Item 16 - Trader's and Professional Licences.

On page 8 of my despatch No. 707 Reserved, of

No:

2009/30

the

the 29th December, 1953, I explained why the figure of £40,000 was inserted under this item in the 1954 Estimates and subsequently I pointed out that that figure had to be reduced to £35,000. The Ordinance was full of flaws, and in September 1954, I appointed a representative Committee to examine it in the light of experience gained. As the original estimate of £70,000 made by the majority of the Alternative Proposals Committee had had to be ~~reduced~~ down to a sum of £35,000, I felt that the opportunity should be taken to adjust the rates so that a yield more commensurate with the figure mentioned at the time the tax was introduced should be obtained. Having taken the advice of my Executive Council, I accordingly called the Chairman of the Committee to be informed that Government would wish for revenue approximating to £80,000 in a full year. The 1955 Estimate is based on the amending legislation introduced as a result of the Committee's deliberations. Copies of the new Ordinance will shortly be forwarded for significance of His Majesty's pleasure, and I will take that opportunity of addressing you more fully on the matter.

20. Item 20 - Petrol Tax. £87,000.

The increase in this item is due rather to the fact that the yield has this year been underestimated, than to increased consumption next year. Actual receipts during the 12 months from July 1953 to June 1954 have exceeded £80,000. The probability is that, with increased mining developments, considerably more petrol will be consumed during 1955, and, if this is the case the estimate should be materially exceeded.

21. Item 17. - Cotton Tax. £4,000.

The increase of £5,100 is accounted for in part by the fact that in certain districts the rate of tax has been increased from 1 cent to 2 cents per pound, in order to conform with the rate prevailing in Uganda.

22. Item 18 - Package Tax.

I very much regret the necessity for sacrificing this source of revenue, the yield from which would have been of assistance in helping to restore the Colony's attenuated, and, indeed, in a sense non-existent, surplus balances, but its abolition in the adjoining territories left me no option. I am advised that its unilateral retention would have caused the permanent ruin of our entre-pot trade, which, especially in Mombasa, is of substantial dimensions.

23. Head III. Fees and Payments for Specific Services.

The various estimates under this Head are based, for the most part, on actual receipts during 1964. There is, however, one notable exception. I refer to "Item 20 - Agricultural Produce, etc. Fees, £5,500", which is based on the Director of Agriculture's estimate of exports of agricultural produce. Should these exports not materialise, expenditure under Head III "Agricultural Department - Grading and Inspection (Imports and Exports)" would be less than envisaged in the Estimates.

Head IV. Posts and Telegrams.

24. It will be seen that a non-recurrent increase is anticipated from the sale of stamps to dealers and collectors. This is accounted for by the new stamp issues which you have already approved.

Head V. Earnings of Government Departments.

25. Item 2. Prison Industries. £11,000.

Considerable

Considerable overcrowding has obtained in the prisons of the Colony recently, and no signs of any reduction are apparent. As stated in the Memorandum, the average number of prisoners in excess of the total accommodation of the Colony during the first six months of 1964 amounted to 1,106, and you will realise that action has to be taken to deal with this situation. The most suitable solution seems to be the construction of a farm camp near Ngong, which will enable extra foodstuffs to be grown, so reducing the expenditure on account of food. In the vicinity of the proposed site there is a considerable quantity of stone available, and I have arranged that it shall be quarried by prisoners, and used in the construction of the Central Offices, which you have approved in previous correspondence. If the project is sanctioned, there will be a reimbursement from Loan Funds to Prison Industries in payment for the stone. I trust that this arrangement, which should not only lead to economy in the cost of construction of the Central Offices, but to the solution of the overcrowding problem, will meet with your approval. You will observe that a considerable increase in expenditure under Head LIV has proved necessary.

Head II. Reimbursements.

26. Item 20. Mombasa Municipality in respect of 20,000 Pounds.

Owing to the financial position of the Mombasa Municipality, it was necessary, in 1964, to remit one half the interest on the Mombasa Town

Planning

Planning and Improvement Schemes Loans, although provision for the full sum appeared as a reimbursement in Estimates. The financial circumstances of the Board have not improved in the interval, and I am satisfied that it is again necessary to waive these charges.

27. Item 48. Loan in respect of Public Works Department Staff.

In this connection I would refer to your telegram No. 516 of 14th October, 1951, and to paragraph 52 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee. I trust that, in the circumstances, you will accord your sanction to the proposal that ^{the} salary of the Architect and one Assistant Engineer, together with half the salary of the Quantity Surveyor should be reimbursed from loan funds, on the understanding that the position will again be reviewed towards the end of 1955.

28. I do not think the remaining Heads and Items of Revenue call for any comment other than that contained in the Report of the Standing Finance Committee.

EXPENDITURE ESTIMATES.

Head II. Administration.

29. Item 7. District Officers. £65,641.

The total number of District Officers on the strength at the end of 1954 will be 99. This will be increased by 11 when the recently appointed cadets arrive during July or August of next year, but at least 4 retirements will take place during 1955, so that, in the absence of further casualties, the strength at the end of 1955 will amount to 106, which is the number shown in the printed Estimates.

50. You will observe that I have transferred the item "Labour Officer" from "General Staff" to "Labour Section", in order that the estimates in respect of that section may accurately reflect the cost thereof.

51. Paragraph 40 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee recommends that representations should be made to you regarding the cost of training selected candidates for the Administration. I shall address you separately on this subject at a later date.

52. The Estimates in respect of the Labour Section reflect the reorganisation which has already received your sanction.

53. An adjustment has been made between the Rift Valley Province and the Northern Frontier District, by which the Samburu area has, for administrative purposes, been transferred from the latter to the former. As you are aware, there has been some unrest among the Samburu tribe, and I am of opinion that the district can be more closely administered if it is included in the Rift Valley Province. Consequently, expenditure in that Province shows an increase, while in the Northern Frontier District there is a corresponding reduction.

COAST PROVINCE.

54. Item 119. Chiefs and Headmen.

It is proposed to appoint nine Headmen for work in Mombasa. I am satisfied that these appointments are necessary both to the well-being of the natives and to the proper collection of revenue.

55. Salute Refractory.

In accordance with the recommendations of

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the Committee on Juvenile Crime and Kabete Reformatory, copies of which were forwarded under cover of the Colonial Secretary's Note No.D.26/8/5/15 of 24th April, 1954, provision for the Reformatory, which has been reorganised, and is now known as an "Approved School" in accordance with the phraseology of the Juveniles Ordinance, 1954, has been transferred to the Prisons Head of Estimates. This Government has accepted the Report of the Committee, whose recommendations seem to offer the most satisfactory method of dealing with the problems created not only by youthful criminals, but also by the existence of considerable numbers of detribalised native children, especially in the towns.

Agricultural Department.

56. Items 4 - 6. Clerks.

A reduction of two clerks has been effected as an economy measure on the recommendation of the Director.

57. Item 51. Grant to Imperial College of Tropical Agriculture, Trinidad.

Provision of £250 has been inserted in accordance with the undertaking given in my despatch No.406 of 17th August, 1954.

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58. Item 52. Contribution to Imperial Agricultural Bureau, Barbados.

Increased provision has been made as proposed in your despatch Circular of 20th January, 1954.

59. Item 53. Entomologists.

One post has been abolished for reasons of economy.

40. Item 115. Animal Husbandry Officer.

This post is being abolished consequent on the termination of the appointment of the present holder, which will take effect in January, 1956.

41. Item 116. Assistant Agricultural Officers.

Provision is being made for two new appointments, one for Kitui District, and one for Digo District. The increased revenue from the cotton tax, in my view, justifies these extra services, and I think that the increased production which may be expected consequent on the closer supervision afforded, will render this expenditure an investment, profitable both to the natives concerned and to Government. In this connection, I may mention that the Economic Development Committee has recommended the appointment of several new Agricultural Officers, and I may have occasion to address you on the subject in the near future. The two new officers are, however, urgently required for work in the districts concerned, and in the circumstances, I shall be glad of telegraphic sanction to make local appointments.

Head IIIa. Agricultural Department Extraordinary.

42. Item 1. Livestock Research. SOU.

The contribution of this Government has been increased by £106 in accordance with my despatch No. 218 of 26th April, 1954.

Head IV. Audit Department.

43. Items 8 and 9.

It is proposed to fill the Special Grade Post of Head Clerk and to reduce the number of ordinary posts by one.

Head V. Guest Agency.

44. Item 4. African Clerks.

47

One Senior Asian Clerk has been retired and replaced by a junior, and, in the circumstances I have considered it necessary that the approved establishment of African Clerks should be increased by one. It will be noted that, despite this increase expenditure on the clerical staff in this department shows a net decrease of £110.

Head VII. Customs.

45. Items 3, 4 and 6.

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In my despatch No.355 of the 12th July, 1964,

I informed you that the Commissioner of Customs had made urgent representations for the strengthening of the European Staff of his department, and in consequence you approved one post of Collector being taken out of abeyance and an officer appointed from home, vide your telegram No.273 of the 16th November. After full consideration, I am satisfied that it is necessary to take a second post of Collector out of abeyance and to appoint a European Accounts Clerk. The full effect of the moratorium on leave is now being felt, and the department has suffered much through ill-health. The possibility of filling the Collector post by the promotion of one of the Examining Officers (item 9) is being investigated. Despite these additional appointments, it will be seen that, due to an increase in the estimated reimbursement from Uganda there is a net reduction in estimated net expenditure on Kenya account of £448.

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Head VIII. Education Department.

46. Item 8. Chief Inspector of Schools.

You have already approved this post being filled in your telegram No. 191 of 10th August, 1904.

47. Item 18. Colony's share of cost of Advisory Committee to Colonial Office.

This item has been reduced from £278 to £159 in accordance with your Circular despatch of the 26th October,

48. Item 19. Education Officers.

Provision has been made for an extra mistress at the European Schools at Eldoret and Brooderstrom. These extra appointments have been necessitated by the number of pupils attending the Schools.

49. Item 20. Overseas Scholarships Scheme, £100.

This item will be made the subject of a separate despatch.

50. Item 22. Native Staff.

It is proposed to engage two new learner mistresses, one for Eldoret and one for Little, as it has been found that the existing staff at those centres cannot cope effectively with the volume of work.

51. Item 24. Grants to Private Boarding, etc.

Additional funds are required to meet the cost of assistance at Brooderstrom, Hamarill, and Nanyuki. It is found more convenient and economical to arrange private boarding for pupils at these places than to erect boarding quarters. The boarding fees paid are credited to revenue.

52. Item 40. Education Officers.

You will notice a reduction of four in respect of the number of Education Officers engaged in

Indian and Goan Education. This reduction, which is in respect of the Allidina Visram High School, Mombasa, was recommended by the former Director of Education, Mr. Scott, who did not consider that it would militate against reasonable efficiency.

83. Item 63. Technical Instructors.

These Instructors were formerly known as "Leading Artisans", but I consider that the designation "Technical Instructors" is more in consonance with the work which they perform. It is intended to secure as much uniformity as possible in the titles of similar posts, and in a subsequent paragraph of this despatch I shall ask for your approval of a similar change in connection with certain posts in the Prisons Department.

84. Item 64. Grants-in-Aid to Missions.

The provision formerly made for Grants-in-Aid towards Jesuit Teachers' salaries has been included in this Item, which thus shows a net increase of £700. I am satisfied that this increase is absolutely necessary if the work of teaching Africans is to go on effectively.

Head II. Forests.

85. Items 7 and 9.

One Assistant Forester has been transferred to the clerical staff. The officer concerned has many years service, and his work is in fact entirely clerical. As an Assistant Forester, the maximum salary which he could enjoy would be £540 per annum, whereas as a first-grade clerk he can draw up to £500. The establishment of Assistant Foresters has accordingly been reduced by

one and that of Clerks similarly increased.

56. Items 11 and 12.

It is with some regret that I agreed to substantial reductions in the provision for Reafforestation and Nurseries, but, as stated on page 14 of the Memorandum, I felt that the financial position of the Colony demanded the utmost economy which could be made without jeopardising the preservation of the Colony's assets.

Head I. Game.

57. Item 4. Clerks.

A reduction of one has been made on the grounds of economy, on the understanding that a temporary relief will be provided when either of the remaining two clerks proceeds on vacation leave.

58. Item 14. Expenses of Game and Vermin Control, 1934.

During the past two years, drought conditions have been tending to force game to encroach more and more on cultivated land, especially in native areas, and sometimes had to be given, by way of supplementary estimates, for the Game Warden to expend additional funds on its control. Such expenditure is counter-balanced by the revenue emanating from the sale of trophies obtained. In the circumstances, it seemed desirable to place a small sum at the Game Warden's disposal to use either for engaging hunters or for the purchase of ammunition, traps, etc., at his discretion.

59. Head II. Government Analyst's Laboratory.

You have already, in your telegram No. 808 of the 20th November, 1934, approved of this department

being

being shown as a separate Head of Estimates.

60. Head XII. Interest and Unfunded Debt.

I am advised that this designation is more appropriate than "Interest", the title by which this Head has hitherto been known.

61. Items 4 and 5.

I would invite your particular attention to the note on page 16 of the Memorandum. You will appreciate that it would be out of the question for this Government to make provision for the payment, in 1955, of arrears of contributions amounting to as much as £25,000, while retaining a balanced budget, and in the circumstances, I am advised that the proposal reflected in the Estimates is the most suitable way of dealing with the problem. Should the cash required to meet withdrawals not be fully covered by the contributions received by the Funds from Government and from the contributors, it is proposed that any deficiency should be made up by an advance from Government against the next instalment of the balance of arrears. I trust that, in the circumstances, the proposal will meet with your approval.

Head XIII. Judicial Department.

Item 2. Puisne Judges.

62. Although the Bushe Report on the Administration of Justice recommended the appointment of an extra Puisne Judge, I feel that financial considerations preclude giving effect to that recommendation during 1955. It will be considered in connection with the draft estimates for 1956.

Head XIV. Legal Department.

55. Item 4, Chief Clerk.

The post of Grade A Clerk has been abolished, and the holder promoted to a new post of Chief Clerk on a slightly longer salary scale. The officer concerned has acquired a considerable degree of skill in legal clerical work. The creation of the post, and the promotion thereto of the officer in question, is strongly recommended by the Attorney General and by his predecessor. I would, however, like to emphasize that the post is not being created simply for the officer; the fact is that, with the development of the Land Revenue and of the Mining Industry, the number of legal documents to be drafted is becoming gradually more formidable, the Attorney General feels that a senior clerical post, carrying a reasonable salary is essential to the efficient working of his office, and I endorse his opinion.

Head IV. Local Government Lands and Settlement.

56. In accordance with the proposal approved in your telegram No. 423 received of the 8th June, 1954, the Mining and Geological Division has been separated from the Department of Local Government Lands and Settlement and appears separately under Head III of the Estimates.

57. Items 28 - 31.

The presentation of the post of Principal Registrar of Titles is to leave pending retirement pending a decision as to his successor, concerning which you will be addressed and by the Estimate will be framed on the assumption that one of the registrars of Titles will be promoted to the post held by him and the other will be put into abeyance and the European post will be taken out of abeyance. The net reduction in expenditure effected by this adjustment amounts to £270, and I am satisfied that in all the circumstances

Head XIV. Legal Department.65. Item 4. Chief Clerk.

The post of Grade A Clerk has been abolished, and the holder promoted to a new post of Chief Clerk on a slightly longer salary scale. The officer concerned has acquired a considerable degree of skill in legal clerical work. The creation of the post, and the promotion thereto of the officer in question, is strongly recommended by the Attorney General and by his predecessor. I would, however, like to emphasize that the post is not being created simply for the officer; the fact is that, with the development of the Land Bank and of the Mining Industry, the number of legal documents to be drafted is becoming gradually more formidable, the Attorney General feels that a Senior Clerical Post, carrying a reasonable salary is essential to the efficient working of his office, and I endorse his opinion.

Head XV. Local Government Lands and Settlement.

66. In accordance with the proposal approved in your telegram No. 142 received of the 8th June, 1964, the Mining and Geological Division has been separated from the Department of Local Government Lands and Settlement, and appears separately under Head XIII of the Estimates.

66. Items 38 - 41.

The present holder of the post of Principal Registrar of Titles is on leave pending retirement. Pending a decision as to his successor, concerning which you will be addressed shortly, the Estimates have been framed on the assumption that one of the Registrars of Titles will be promoted, that the post held by that officer will be put into abeyance, and one European clerkship taken out of abeyance. The net reduction in expenditure effected by this adjustment amounts to £576, and I am satisfied that in all the circumstances

circumstances it is the most satisfactory adjustment of staff which is possible to effect without loss of efficiency.

Head XVI. Local Government Contributions to Local Authorities.

66. Item 7. Contribution to Mombasa Municipality in lieu of Rates.

The reduction of £1,015 in this Item may be ascribed to the derating of the site for the new Aerodrome at Shimani on Mombasa Island. This reduction is counter-balanced by a corresponding reduction in the reimbursement from the Railway Administration, Revenue Head XI, Item 25.

67. Item 10. Basic Road Grants to District Councils.

In view of the substantial reduction which has been made under Public Works Recurrent for the maintenance and improvement of roads and bridges, I have considered it equitable that a proportionate reduction should be made in Basic road grants to District Councils. The formula for reduction being the ratio borne by actual expenditure in 1933 to estimated expenditure in 1935. You will observe from paragraph 87 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee that objections to this grant have been received from the Trans Nzoia District Council. Should that body not agree to the reduced grant, it may be necessary to consider an amendment to the Local Government (District Councils) Ordinance, 1928, in which case I shall address you further at a later date.

68. Head XVII. Medical Department.

It will be observed that, as stated in the Memorandum, transfers to and from Native Services are numerous. This is accounted for by the fact that in

accordance with Appendix 7 of Lord Moyne's Report the cost of reliefs and leave pay are charged to Non-Native Services. I am assured by the Director of Medical Services that the adjustments made do not postulate any material change in the services rendered by the department, and accordingly I do not propose to refer in detail to the various transfers.

69. Items 5 - 7. Clerks.

As stated in the Memorandum one clerk has been transferred to the Central Revenue Office, as that Office has assumed responsibility for the collection of hospital fees. Leave movements have, however, necessitated the engagement of a Learner Grade Clerk in her place.

70. Items 9, 10, 87 and 92.

You will note that it is proposed to retrench two Asian Clerks, and to increase the total number of African Clerks by four, for the reason given on page 18 of the Memorandum.

71. Item 15.

The title of this post has been changed from "Junior Surgical Specialist" to "Surgical Specialist", in anticipation of your approval of the proposal I have made to you in a separate despatch.

72. Items 14, 77 and 78.

While the total number of officers actually serving during 1955 will be the same as during the present year, the title "Health Officer" has been abolished in conformity with the instructions contained in your Circular despatch of the 26th September, 1955.

75. Item 44. Malaria Overcrowd.

As explained on page 18 of the Memorandum, 11

is proposed to increase the salary of this officer from £500 to £560, pending absorption in the European Local Civil Service.

74. Item 86. Air Transport.

The explanation of this item will be found in paragraph 91 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee. It is in my opinion most desirable that all possible facilities should be afforded to persons who may be dangerously ill in outstations to obtain medical treatment, and in my view, the arrangement proposed will be of considerable benefit to all classes of the community.

75. Item 91. Compounders.

It is proposed in the interests of economy to retrench one Compounder during the course of 1955. As the officer concerned has many years' service no hardship should be caused by this retrenchment.

76. Item 95. Sanitary Overseers.

I am advised that the title of Male Nursing Orderly which formerly appeared in the Estimates, was a misnomer, and that the officer was in fact an overseer of sanitary work. I accordingly consider that the title should be changed to "Sanitary Overseer". One extra appointment has been made for work in the mining area. In this connection I would remind you that you have already approved the creation of this Local Civil Service post of Sanitary Overseer.

77. Item 117. Propaganda.

While I feel that more especially in the Native Reserves expenditure on propaganda is amply justified by results, at the same time the financial position of the country is such that, in my opinion, expenditure of this nature must be rigidly curtailed.

78. Head XVII a.

Item 1. X-Ray Plant at Native Hospital, Nairobi.

It will be seen from paragraphs 93 - 95 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee there is some difference of opinion as to whether this expenditure is justified, but the Director of Medical Services has assured me that it is his professional opinion that the provision of X-Ray facilities is most urgently necessary, and I accept his advice.

79. Head XVIII.

Military. Items 14, 16 and 17.

One Special Grade and one 1st Grade Asian Clerk are retiring on pension, and I propose to replace them by a Staff "P" Clerk (Grade A) (European), who, in the first instance, has been seconded from the Education Department. As the Clerk concerned is pensionable, provision has been made under Item 15 for £105 in respect of his pension contribution; a corresponding entry appears on the Revenue side under Head XI, Item 53.

80. Items 15, 31 and 40. Pension Contributions.

Provision under these Items has been increased in accordance with the new rates laid down in your Circular despatch of the 30th June, 1954.

81. Item 85.

The estimate in respect of the pay of the officers in the K.A.R. Reserve reflect a revision which you have already approved. This revision has been embodied in the King's African Rifles Reserve of Officers (Amendment) Ordinance, 1954, which passed its third reading at the recent session of the Legislative Council, and which will shortly be forwarded for signification of His Majesty's pleasure.

82. Items 99 et seq. Supply and Transport Corps.

I am not entirely satisfied that the Supply and Transport Corps is run on the most economical lines, and I may have occasion to address you separately on the organisation of the Corps at a later date.

83. Item 145 et seq. Defence Force.
You will observe from paragraphs 97 and 98 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee that these Estimates have been approved by the Central Defence Committee. I do not propose to refer to them in detail at this stage, except to invite your attention to the reason given on page 21 of the Memorandum on the Draft Estimates for the substantial reduction in the Training grant, namely the increased provision necessary for the K.R.N.V.R. concerning which correspondence has already passed.

Head XIX. Mining and Geological.

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84. You are aware from correspondence terminating with my telegram No.282 (Reserved) of the 17th December, that the organisation of this department as reflected in the estimates is purely provisional in character.

85. Item 1. Commissioner of Mines.

This is a new post and is at present filled by an Officer seconded from the Provincial Administration.

86. Item 2. Geologist and Mining Engineer.

The post of Geologist and Mining Engineer disappears, and is replaced by a new post of Technical Adviser. An appointment has not yet been made, and the provision viz. £1,100 may have to be revised at a later date.

87. Item 6. Inspector of Mines.

Of the three posts which were provided for in 1954 Estimates, only two have been filled, the

third being intended to enable an officer well qualified in machinery inspection to be engaged. The Commissioner is satisfied, however, that such inspection would not provide whole time work for one officer, and that arrangements can be made for all necessary inspection to be performed at regular intervals either by an officer loaned by the Railway Administration or by a suitably qualified private individual. In consequence one post has been abolished - saving £600, and a new item "Fees for Machinery Inspection, £200," has been inserted in the Estimates.

88. Head XX. Miscellaneous Services.

The main decreases under this Head are in respect of Item 24, "Refunds of Revenue", the reduction in which has been enabled by revised methods of accounting, and Item 25, "Commissions, etc., on Remittances", provision for which was overestimated in the 1954 Estimates.

89. Item 11. Grant to Imperial Institute.

A sum of £800 has been inserted in the Estimates consequent on the decision that the Institute should continue in its present form, despite the cessation of the contribution formerly made by the Empire Marketing Board.

90. Head XXI. Miscellaneous Services Extraordinary.

Item 5. Celebration of the 25th Anniversary of His Majesty's Accession.

Provision of £200 is made for this purpose. I regret that the Colony's finances do not warrant a more generous vote. Local celebrations will be financed mainly by local subscriptions.

91. Head XXI. Pensions and Gratuities.

Items 1 and 2.

As I have mentioned in a previous paragraph of this despatch, the provision for Pensions and Commuted Pensions shows a substantial increase. You will see from Appendix B to the Estimates that a sum of £14,587 has been inserted on account of Pensions and Gratuities which may be granted during 1955, and I trust that that amount will be sufficient.

92. Item 4.

I have already explained in paragraph 81 above the procedure which it is proposed to adopt in respect of payment of arrears of Government Contributions to the Provident Funds. The contributions due by Government in 1955 have been tentatively assessed at £8,400, and a sum of £750 has been added to cover the cost of administration. This latter figure is of course purely provisional, and is based on the cost of the Fund operated by the Railways and Harbours Administration.

93. Head XXII. Police.

Item 5. Officer in charge Stores and Accounts.

The supervision of the stores and accounts work in this department was formerly entrusted to one of the Superintendents, who has now retired. Subsequently a Senior Assistant Treasurer was seconded for the work, and it is proposed now permanently to transfer the officer concerned to the Police, and to reduce the number of Assistant Superintendents by one. The proposal has the support both of the Treasurer and of the Commissioner of Police, and the creation of the new post will, I hope, meet with your approval.

94. Items 7 and 8.

You have already in your telegram No. 107

of 23rd April, 1954, approved of the engagement of two Assistant Inspectors for work in the Mining area and in the Rift Valley Province. The additional Inspector, for whom provision is made, is required for Finger Print Work. You have informed me in your despatch No. 924 of 6th November, 1954, that it will be necessary to appoint an officer on a scale of salary similar to that enjoyed by officers of the rank of Chief Inspector. As, however, the appointee is not likely to sail until some time after the beginning of the year, I trust that the financial provision made will prove adequate.

95. Items 25 - 27.

You will observe that there is a net reduction of one in the number of African Police Constables, and you will find the explanation of this reduction on page 23 of the Memorandum on the Draft Estimates.

I should explain that it had been intended to provide for pensions for African Police, but in this connection reference is invited to my despatch No. 611 of the 26th November, 1954. In the circumstances and in order partially to compensate the African ranks of the Force, I consider the proposed regrading outlined in the Memorandum is reasonable. The actual numbers in each rank will, of course, vary from time to time without any increase in the total personnel, unless such an increase is specifically authorised.

96. Item 28. Clerks.

The title "Chief Clerk", which appeared in the 1954 Estimates was a misnomer, the officer in question actually being a Grade A Clerk. This has now been rectified. One Clerk has been dismissed,

and

and it is not proposed to replace him.

97. Head XXIII. Post Office and Telegraphs.

Items 19 - 22. Chief Electrical Mechanician, etc.

A regrading of the staff is here proposed. I cannot do better than quote from a letter from the Post-master General, in which he states :-

"My proposal is that this staff should be regraded as follows :-

- 1. Workshop Superintendent (Kenya) - £540 x 20 x £600.
- 2. Assistant Workshop Superintendents
(1 Uganda and 1 Tanganyika) £500 x 20 x £540.
- 2 Electrical Mechanicians (as at present). £372 - £500.

Kenya is not affected at the moment as the present Chief Electrical Mechanician is on the maximum of his scale and is a relatively young man. When, however, it comes to appoint a new Chief Electrical Mechanician, the scale will commence at £540 instead of, say, £520 as, if a local man were appointed, he would normally be more than 3 years on the maximum of the Electrical Mechanician grade, viz., £500, and would be appointed on the first incremental point. The duty of a Chief Electrical Mechanician would justify a commencing scale of pay of £540. It is understood that the re-arrangement will only take place if the Uganda and Tanganyika Governments agree to it so far as they are concerned.

The Governments of Uganda and Tanganyika

Territory have agreed to the proposal, and I trust it will receive your sanction.

98. Head XXIV. Printing and Stationery.

Item 7. Linotype Operators.

One Operator has been transferred to Tanganyika Territory, and, in the interests of economy, his post has been abolished, and an increase of one made in the number of Assistant Linotype Operators, a European apprentice being promoted.

99. Item 14. Compositors.

An increase in the volume of work at the Government Press has rendered it necessary to make two additional temporary appointments.

The two European and one of the two Asian Apprentices

Apprentices, provision for whom appeared in the Composing Section in the 1954 Estimates, have completed their training and now appear under Item 19 "European Machinist" Item 8 "Assistant Linotype Operator", and Item 20 "Machinists", respectively.

100. Items 20 and 21.

One new post of Machinist and one new post of Machine Apprentice are shown. These appointments have proved unavoidable.

101. Item 26.

The number of Native Assistants and Apprentices in the Bookbinding Section has been increased by two for a similar reason.

Despite the additional appointments for which provision has been made in the 1955 Estimates, it will be seen that, taking Personal Emoluments in this department as a whole, there has been a net decrease of £319.

102. Head XIV. Prisons.

When discussing Revenue Head V, Item II Prison Industries in paragraph 25 of this despatch, I informed you that the institution of a Prison Farm Camp at Ngong was considered the most practicable method of dealing with the problem created by the overcrowding in the prisons. This camp has necessitated an increase of 2 Chief Officers and 27 African Warders. Further, pressure of work at the Nairobi Prison has rendered the appointment of an additional Chief Officer necessary. These changes have caused increases under Items 6, ¹⁶ and ².

103. Item 7. Technical Instructors.

It is considered that the title "Technical Instructor", is more convenient for officers such as the Carpentry and Masonry Instructors and the Master

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Tailor. This designation appears in Sessional Paper No 1 of 1934, setting out the proposed terms and conditions for the European Local Civil Service. I trust that these changes in designation will meet with your approval.

104. Item 8. Temporary Matron.

This appointment has proved necessary on account of the imprisonment of a female European, whose term expires in September, 1935. A Matron is therefore necessary for 8 months of next year.

105. Item 12. Staff Sergeant Warders.

The explanation of the change in designation from "Native Chief Warders" to "Staff Sergeant Warders", will be found on page 27 of the Memorandum on the Draft Estimates.

106. Items 21, 22 and 23.

The posts of African School Master, Master Tailor (Asian), and Master Carpenter (Asian), have been abolished for the reasons given in paragraphs 118, 121 and 122 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee. I am satisfied that these retrenchments will cause little hardship to the personnel concerned, and will not materially impair the efficiency of the department.

107. Items 40 et seq. Approved Schools.

These Estimates reflect approximately the provision suggested in the Report of the Committee on Juvenile Crime and Kabete Reformatory. It has, however, been possible to keep one post of Assistant in abeyance, but this holding in abeyance must be regarded as tentative pending experience of the working of the new organisation.

108. Item 44. Leave Pay to Retracted Officers.

Provision is made in this Item for leave pay to the former Superintendent of the Kabete Reformatory, and the two Technical Instructors, provision for whom appeared

appeared in 1964 under the Administration head. It is proposed that the Clerk and Store-keeper shall be absorbed into the new organisation.

Head XVII. Public Works Department.

109. Items 6, 8 and 9.

I have referred in paragraph 87 of this Report to the proposal that the whole salary of one Assistant Engineer and the Architect, together with half the salary of the Quantity Surveyor, should be reimbursed from local funds during 1965.

110. Item 11, Surveyors.

One Surveyor will proceed on leave pending retirement during the course of 1965, and it is proposed to put into abeyance the vacancy thus created.

Item 12, Transport Officer.

It was found during the absence on leave of the substantive holder of the post, that Transport work could be efficiently carried out by the Director and the store staff, and in consequence the Director of Public Works is no longer prepared to recommend the ~~the~~ ^{the} ~~the~~ ^{the} Transport Officer should appear in the Estimates. It is proposed that the retirement of the present holder, who is pensionable, and who has completed over 20 years service, should effect from the 31 July 1965.

Item 13, Senior Carpenter.

The Carpenter has been recruited from the Service, and it is proposed to put into abeyance the vacancy thus created.

Item 14, Clerk.

With the absorption of the Transport branch

into the Stores branch, two clerks, for whom provision formerly appeared under Item 45B, have been transferred to this Item.

114. Items 25 and 79.

For the reason given in paragraph 131 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee, half the salary of the Timber Seasoning Operator has been transferred to Item 25.

Head XXVIII.

Public Works Recurrent.

115. Items 1 - 10, Maintenance and Improvement of Roads and Bridges.

You will recollect that a drastic reduction in this vote was made in 1934, in order that the Budget of that year might be balanced. Financial considerations have precluded any increase in 1935.

116. Item 5, Rents of Offices, etc.

The reason for substantial reduction in this vote is explained on page 29 of the Memorandum on Draft Estimates.

Head XXXI.

Secretariat, Legislative Council and Native Affairs.

117. Provision under this Head substantially reflects the reorganisation which received your approval in connection with the Estimates for 1934. Though financial provision is now made for 12 European and 8 Asian Clerks, as against 9 European and 11 Asian, in 1934, this adjustment has been made in the light of experience gained in the actual working of the organisation, and the net result is, as explained on page 30 of the Memorandum, a saving on Clerical Staff amounting to £195.

Head XXXII.

Statistical Department.

118. The Estimates of expenditure under this Head have been slightly recast, in order to show separately expenditure on the various sections. It has been necessary to increase the number of Asian Clerks in the Native Registration and Finger Print Section by two, and in the Registration of Domestic Servants Section by one, learners being appointed. The reason for these increases is that the Estimates for 1954, which reflected a reorganisation of the department, did not make any provision for reliefs necessitated by leave movements.

119. Item 5. African Clerks and Learners.

The reduction of five is accounted for by the fact that supernumeraries were formerly included in this Item. Their number varies from time to time and they are not graded, and it was accordingly considered desirable to show in column 5 the number of graded African Clerks only.

120. Items 19 and 20.

The explanation of the appointments of these officers will be found on page 50 of the Memorandum, while on page 51 the reasons for the removal of the Machine Operator and the Mechanic, Statistical Machinery from the Personal Emoluments sub-head of the Statistical Section are set out.

Head XXXIII.

Trade and Information Office.

121. Item 1.

The contribution payable by this Government has been increased from £1,150 to £1,186 in accordance

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with the proposal for normal increments set out in your despatch No. 855 of 16th October, 1934.

122. Item 4. Clerical Assistance.

This item has been inserted for the reason given in paragraph 143 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee.

Head XXXIV. Treasury.

123. Item 13.

Provision for this allowance at the rate of £50 per annum has been inserted in the Estimates, following the receipt of a despatch from you on the subject of duty allowances generally.

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124. Items 26 and 27.

The explanation of the increase of four clerks in the Central Revenue Office will be found on page 52 of the Memorandum. You will observe from paragraph 146 of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee that this Office is fulfilling its purpose of reducing the number of revenue defaulters.

Head XXXV.

Public Works Department Extraordinary.

125. The various items for which provision is made in this Head represent only those works which are most urgently necessary, bearing in mind the state of the Colony's finances. Explanations will be found on pages 52 and 53 of the Memorandum, and in paragraphs 147 et seq of the Report of the Standing Finance Committee.

Head XXXVI.

Colonial Development Fund.

126, Item 4, Colonial Agricultural Scholarship Scheme.

The sum of £869 has been inserted in this item
in accordance with your despatch No. 966 of the 9th November,
1954.

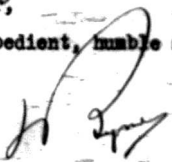

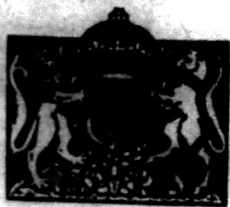

REVENUE.**

The Draft Revenue Estimates for 1935 have been framed on strictly conservative lines. Of the new taxation measures which were introduced during 1933, it is proposed to drop the Tax on Imported Packages, a form of taxation which is admitted on all sides to be unscientific and generally unmanufactory.

EXPENDITURE.

In compiling the Expenditure Estimates for 1935, Government has been faced with the necessity for making provision for the following unavoidable increases in gross expenditure—

Increase on account of Pensions and Gratuations	£37,500
Increase on account of Public Debt Funded	£17,000
Increase on account of Interest and Unfunded Debt	£5,500
Total	£59,500

As against this increase the estimated expenditures and expenditures in excess of the above heads have decreased by £280.

In compiling the 1935 Budget therefore Government has been able with the assistance of making provision for an unavoidable increase in net expenditure of £34,000.

Reference to 1934 of the Draft Estimates shows that notwithstanding the unavoidable increase above the net increase in net expenditure—straight is £49,500.

It thus appears the necessity of providing for certain expenditure and incurring the unavoidable increase referred to above there has been a further net reduction in net expenditure of £30,000.

In preparing the Estimates of Expenditure every effort has been made to reduce them to the lowest possible figures. This has proved to be a matter of no small difficulty as the 1934 Estimates had been drastically reduced in comparison with 1933 and offset increases in 1934, viz in the Public Debt have proved inevitable. The figures recommended by the Expenditure Estimates Commission have once again been used as a guide, and where it has been possible the Estimates have been reduced materially below the figures recommended by that Commission as a temporary loan for commensurate efficiency.

In the table printed below a comparison is made between the figures recommended by the Expenditure Estimates Commission as a basis of expenditure the Department Estimates for 1934, and the Draft Estimates for 1935. The Estimates for 1934 have been shown as they stand.

It will be observed that estimated expenditure on education services amounts to £ 1,245,770 which is £2,052 in excess of the Expenditure Advisory Commission's figure and shows a decrease of £27,942 as compared with the corresponding figure in the unamalgamated Estimates for 1934. In this connection it is pertinent to state that the Expenditure Advisory Commission did not recommend under the Colonial Revenue Office or under the other accounts under the Department of Native Affairs which, between themselves, total £ 1,245,770. The expenditure figure which is strictly comparable to the unamalgamated estimate is £ 1,217,700, i.e. a reduction of £ 28,070.

Taking into account the estimate for the year 1934 recommended by the Expenditure Advisory Commission is £ 1,217,700, and the amount for 1933 will be found from the detailed explanation under the various heads of the Department. This shows a more than covered by the income in the estimate of £ 1,217,700.

It will be seen that further maintenance of expenditure is less than provided for because the budget with a small surplus of £ 2,052, and the Department for 1934 have been set up on the following basis—

LOCAL CIVIL SERVICE.

15. The terms of service and salary scales in connection with the European Local Civil Service have been approved generally by the Legislative Council and the Secretary of State. Similarly, the proposed terms of service and salary scales in connection with the Asian Local Civil Service are under consideration, and will be presented to the Legislature shortly. The 1933 Estimates do not reflect any of these new terms and salary scales, for the reason that a large number of members of the existing staff have six months during which they may opt either to come into the Local Civil Service, or remain on agreement. Until it is known how each person concerned has opted, it is not possible to state with precision the effect of the inauguration of the Services. The Estimates have, therefore, been prepared on the same basis as in 1934.

As soon as the personnel of the Services is definitely known, Council will be fully apprised of the position, but it is not possible to give any figures at the moment. In general terms, however, the financial effect during 1935 will be an increase in Personal Emoluments, and a saving on account of Home Allowances.

NATIVE BETTERMENT FUNDS

16. It will be observed that, although the Estimates show separate provision for Native Services in respect of the Medical, Agricultural, Education and Public Works Departments, no provision is made for any payment in respect of the Native Betterment Fund. Although the inauguration of that Fund has been approved by the Secretary of State, he has agreed that, owing to the financial position of the Colony, the operation of the Fund may be deferred until 1936. The total estimated to be spent on Native Services on the basis recommended by Lord Moyne is approximately £ 260,720, while half the average Native Hut and Poll Tax Receipts over a period of six years ending on 31st December, 1933, is £ 277,311. (It will, however, be remembered that a Select Committee, whose Report has been laid on the table of the Legislative Council, has recommended certain modifications in Lord Moyne's proposals.)

The Commission has examined the Expenditure Advisory Committee's figure for 1935. This figure is correct as far as the balance in Item 22 is concerned.

A comparison is given of the Memorandum in the Draft Estimates for 1935 and the Commission's recommendations. The Commission will be beginning of the year, because their task is a privilege personal to them. Some of these officers have now returned while the draft is returning to the Commission. The total of these officers (Civil Clerk) will therefore disappear during 1935.

District Officers

The Memorandum in the Draft Estimates for 1934 contained the following:

The establishment of District Officers is shown in the Draft Estimates at 100 posts (22 officers). This figure will be reduced during 1934 to 100 as the retirement of four officers who are at present on the strength of the Administration. The total number of officers on the establishment at the end of 1934 will therefore be in accordance with the recommendations

of the Expenditure Advisory Committee, viz. 105 District Officers, plus five Senior District Commissioners and four Provincial Commissioners, or a total of 114 officers as envisaged in paragraph 174 of the Report.

In point of fact, owing to unforeseen casualties, the total number who will actually be on the strength on the 31st December, 1934, will be 109 only. Four more officers will retire during 1935 reducing the strength to 105, but the Secretary of State for the Colonies has, at the request of this Government, selected twelve new cadets, who may be expected to arrive during July or August, bringing the strength during the latter part of the year up to 117.

It will be appreciated that, whereas for the greater part of the year the number of Administrative Officers will be considerably less than that recommended by the Expenditure Advisory Committee to fill the approved establishment, there will be a small surplus towards the end of the year. As, however, there will be further casualties before another batch of cadets can arrive during 1936, the surplus will inevitably be absorbed. Moreover, since the Expenditure Advisory Committee reported, there have been the following additional calls on the Administrative staff:

(a) An officer is required for the new Bambari District in the Rift Valley Province.

(b) An officer has been seconded to the Mines Department as Commissioner of Mines.

(c) An officer has been specially detailed for duty as Warden of Mines.

Labour Officers

It is considered more appropriate to show these officers under the Labour Section in order that expenditure on that section may be reflected accurately.

The 1934 Estimates provided for 6 Cashiers and 130 Clerks, with six posts on absence, i.e. a total of 136 clerks actually serving. Provision for a total of 131 clerks appears in the Draft Estimates. The additional clerk is accounted for as follows:

Four clerks have been transferred from the District Commissioner's office, Nairobi, to the Central Revenue Office for Revenue purposes, while five clerks have become necessary elsewhere for the following reasons:

(a) One additional clerk has been found necessary at Kakamega on account of the increased work created by mining activities.

(b) The staff at Kisumu has been increased by one for a similar reason.

(c) The increase of work consequent on the closing down of Narayana station has rendered it essential to post a clerk to perform the duties of an assistant to the cashier at Nakuru.

(d) A substantial increase in court work and in the prison population at Kisumu has necessitated the appointment of an extra clerk to assist the existing staff and to take charge of the prison registers had occasion.

(e) It has been found that the African clerk at Embu has been unable to cope with the volume of work. He has therefore been retrained and replaced by an Asian. A corresponding decrease appears under Item 21.

These Special Grade posts (Cashiers) have been filled, with a corresponding reduction in the ordinary clerical staff.

Travelling Allowance at £40 p.a. to H.B.M.'s Consul for Southern Abyssinia

Item 18.

When travelling allowances were suspended in 1931, the relative item was omitted from the 1932 Estimates. The re-introduction of these allowances has necessitated the reinstatement of this item.

Item 25.

Tropical African Services Course.

The increase of £9,400 is due to the appointment of twelve new cadets as explained above.

Labour Section.

Principal Labour Inspector.

The former holder of the post, who was a Senior Medical Officer, has recently been invalided and the opportunity has been taken to review the organization. Full information on the care of labour from the medical and sanitary standpoint is now available, and it is therefore no longer regarded as necessary for the holder of the post to possess medical qualifications. In view of the need for economy, it is proposed not to fill the substantive post for the present, but to appoint one of the Labour Officers to act as Principal Labour Inspector, to pay him a duty allowance of £100 per annum while so acting, and at the same time to make a local appointment to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of the former Principal Labour Inspector.

It was subsequently found that there was a serious diminution in revenue obtained under the Native Liquor Ordinance. In 1934 the same native was re-engaged, his salary being paid from savings on other votes, and revenue immediately rose again.

- Contribution to Imperial Scheme for Agricultural Scholarships.**
This item has been transferred to Head XXXVI—Cultural Development Fund.
- Item 21 **Grant to Imperial College of Tropical Agriculture, Trinidad.**
This College is the centre for post graduate training in tropical agriculture for the whole Colonial Empire. The abolition of the Empire Marketing Board has necessitated new financial arrangements. As the supply of properly trained agricultural officers is entirely dependent on the efficient maintenance of the College it is considered that it has strong claims for financial support.
- Item 22 **Contribution to Imperial Agricultural Bureaux.**
An increase in Kenya's contribution is necessitated by the abolition of the Empire Marketing Board. In the opinion of the Director of Agriculture the work performed by the Bureaux is most valuable.
- Item 26 **Grant-in-aid to Sugar Industry.**
This payment is statutory under the Sugar Ordinance, 1934.
- Item 28 **Senior Entomologist.**
It is proposed to abolish the post when the present holder retires early in 1935.

- Entomologists.** Item 30
One post was kept in abeyance during 1934. This post is being abolished.

Item 5. **Collectors of Customs.**

It is proposed to fill the two posts which were in abeyance during 1934. The work of the Department has been materially increased by the imposition of E.A.M. duties and, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Customs, which is occupied by Government, the present staff is below the safety limit.

Accounts Clerk.

It is proposed to fill this new post by the appointment of a locally-engaged European. The internal audit check is at present inadequate, in that shortage of staff has meant abandoning the check of the documents in a ship's file in support of the "mustering" of the cargo manifested. In the Auditor's opinion, the loss occasioned by having an overworked and under-staffed Customs Department is greater by far than the saving due to retrenchment.

Clerks (Asian).

Junior Clerks (African).

Normal increments amount to £516, but it is proposed to effect economy by replacing four Asian clerks, who are retiring, by Africans.

Chief Inspector of Schools.

This post has been held in abeyance for two years and experience has shown that a burden is thrown on the Director which seriously hampers the efficiency of the Department. It has therefore been decided to fill the post during 1935.

Salary and Acting Allowances (Leave pay of Mr. H. S. Scott).

The new Director will have assumed charge before the termination of the leave accrued to Mr. Scott. It is therefore necessary to make separate provision for the latter's leave pay.

Local Transport and Travelling.

It is considered that the new Director must have the opportunity of touring the Colony effectively. As previous provision has been barely adequate, the Bill has been increased by £150.

European Education (Tuition).

Education Officers.

Provision is made for one additional mistress at Eldoret and one at Broderickton. In each case, the existing staff is insufficient effectively to cope with the work.

European Education (Boarding).

Matron, Dag.

Provision is made for one extra learner Matron at Eldoret and one at Kiabu. It has proved necessary to engage temporary assistance this year.

Oromo Scholarship Scheme.

Provision of £80 was inserted in the 1934 Estimates in consequence of the recommendation in paragraph 39 of the Report of the Select Committee. It has not been found possible to utilize these funds during 1934. Provision to the extent of £100 has been inserted in the 1935 Draft Estimates, in the hope that there may be two candidates able to benefit. In this event, two sums of £50 each may be required to enable them to enter a University in October, 1935.

Grants to Private Hostels, etc.

Additional funds are required to meet the cost of assistance at Broderickton, Buncross and Nanyuki.

AFRICAN EDUCATION.

Item 21. Education Officers.

The increase is due to the fact that in 1934 provision for three new appointments was made for half the year only.

Item 22. Technical Instructors.

These officers were formerly known as "Leading Artisans" but the designation "Technical Instructors" is considered more appropriate.

The apparent cost of fourteen officers at £300 per annum is £4,200. The extra provision is due to the fact that three officers will be on leave in December, 1934, and their salary debits in respect of that month are not anticipated to occur until January, 1935.

Item 23. Grants-in-aid to Natives.

The item "Grants-in-aid towards Junior Teachers' Salaries" has been incorporated in this item, which has been increased by £700. This increase is suggested to the effective education of Africans.

Item 1. Assistant Conservators of Forests.

The increase in this item is partly due to normal increments, and partly due to the fact that in 1932 a portion of one officer's salary was paid by the Colonial Development Fund.

Item 11. Reafforestation.

Item 12. Nurseries.

It will be observed that there has been a total reduction of £750 on these items. The effect of this reduction is that planting will be checked down in several areas mainly where work is being attempted, and will therefore not be so much a loss to the forested area as a loss of jobs. This reduction is comparable with the reduction in the Working Fund contributions in respect of the Colony's Loans and must be regarded as purely temporary and as having been made for purely financial reasons. It tends, therefore, resulting in increased cutting of timber and fuel in Forest Reserves, it is the intention of Government immediately to increase the planting programme.

Item 13. Contributions to Imperial Forestry Institute.

This has been reduced owing to reorganisation. The reduced quota has been agreed to for a period of five years, but it is probable that contributions to a capital fund will be received in due course.

Clerks.

The establishment has been reduced by one clerk on the understanding that provision for a temporary relief will be granted when either of the remaining clerks proceeds on leave.

Local Transport and Travelling.

During 1934 two officers were absent on leave, and provision was reduced accordingly. During 1935 the Department will be at full strength, and an increase in the vote is therefore necessary.

Expenses of Game and Vermin Control.

It is the view of Government that the policy of Game preservation which is being carried out creates a moral obligation to control the game thus preserved. It is proving increasingly necessary to take steps to reduce the numbers of animals in different areas from time to time, when damage is being done to private property. It has therefore been considered desirable to place a sum of money at the disposal of the Game Warden, that he may either engage extra-staff and pay their expenses, or make such other arrangements as may seem to him necessary, to deal with such situations as they arise. Any expenditure incurred will be more than covered by the sale of the resulting trophies.

HEAD XI—GOVERNMENT ANALYST'S LABORATORY.

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The Government Analyst's Laboratory was formerly shown under the Laboratory Division of the Medical Department, although in point of fact, the Analyst's work is entirely distinct from the normal activities of that department. It has therefore been decided, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, to show the Analyst's Laboratory as a separate department in 1935. The only extra expenditure involved is the salary of one African clerk whose £, 450. In respect of each of the other items, corresponding reductions appear in the Medical Department's Estimates.

It has been arranged that the Medical Department will lend a suitably qualified officer to act for the Government Analyst when the latter proceeds on leave in 1935. No extra expenditure will be involved.

Interest on Redemption Installments—Loan to Eldoret Municipal Board.

A loan of £21,871 was made to the Eldoret Municipal Board in 1933 to enable them to acquire the water supply, the loan being repayable by equal half-yearly instalments of interest and redemption spread over seventeen years. The half-yearly redemption instalments are fixed at £693 upon the hypothesis that they will accumulate at the rate of 3½ per cent compound interest during

the currency of the loan. For accounting reasons, it is desirable that redemption instalments and interest thereon at the rate of 5½ per cent per annum should be credited to a special supplementary sinking fund. The Colony's revenue is being credited with the amount actually earned on the investment of the instalments, and expenditure is being charged at the hypothetical rate of 5½ per cent upon the accumulations.

Item 4. *Interest and Redemption of Arrears of Contributions to Provident Funds.*

Item 5. *Interest due to Contributors to Provident Fund.*

The inauguration of the European and Asian Provident Funds at the beginning of 1935 will necessitate total payments tentatively assessed at £12,000 and £11,000 respectively in respect of arrears of Government contributions, which become statutorily payable in the case of certain officers on transfer to the Local Civil Service. It should be mentioned that it has not been possible closely to calculate the amounts involved which depend in each case upon the number of officers who opt to come into the Local Civil Service.

It is anticipated that the cash required to meet withdrawals will be fully covered by the contributions received from Government (Head XXI, Item 6) and from the officers themselves. That being so, it is considered that there is no objection to a token payment of £1,000 into each fund at the outset to start it; payment of the balance of arrears being liquidated at interest by instalments spread over a period of ten years. Item 6 represents one such instalment. Item 5 represents the interest on the estimated amounts standing to the credit of the two funds on December 31st, 1935, and is a statutory obligation.

Item 6. *Crown Counsel.*

The increase in this item is due in part to normal increments and in part to the fact that provision was made for one officer's salary for a portion only of the year 1934.

Item 4. *Chief Clerk.*

It is proposed to create a special post of "Chief Clerk" in this department, and to promote thereto the Grade A clerk. This officer has been in the department for a number of years, and has considerable experience in drafting legal documents. It will be observed that the total additional cost is £25. As, however, the officer in question would, in any case, have been entitled to an increment of £18, the net additional expenditure is £12 on account of his promotion to £11 only.

Law Expenses in Government Actions.

This was a purely "token" vote, and no expenditure can be incurred. Any expenditure which may become necessary would be a proper charge on Supplementary Estimates.

HEAD XV—LOCAL GOVERNMENT, LANDS AND SETTLEMENT.

This department, as reorganized in 1934, embraced the Mining and Geological Section, and it was explained to the Select Committee on the Draft Estimates for that year that Government had an open mind on the question of the formation of a separate Mines Department. During the course of the year it became evident that the rapid development of the industry was such as to warrant the creation of a separate department and steps were taken accordingly.

The present holder of the post of Principal Registrar of Titles is retiring during the year. It is proposed to put into abeyance the vacancy amongst the Registrars of Titles which will be created by the promotion of an officer to fill the Principal Registrar's post and to increase the number of European clerks by taking one post out of abeyance. The financial effect of these proposals is a net saving of £376.

Nairobi Municipality.

Contributions in respect of Public Health Staff.

The reduction of £202 is due to the fact that, in 1934, it was necessary to pay the salary of a relief Medical Officer of Health while the substantive holder of the post was absent on leave.

Mombasa Municipality.

Contribution in lieu of Rates.

The reduction of £1,015, which is counter-balanced by a similar reduction in revenue (Head XV, Item 26), is due to the derating of Shimanzi Aerodromes.

District Councils.

Basic Road Grants to District Councils.

The further reduction of £1,118 made in this vote has been agreed to by the District Councils concerned. The reduced figure bears the same ratio to the grants paid in 1932 as the "Public Works Recurrent—Maintenance and Improvement of Roads and Bridges" estimate for 1935 bears to the actual expenditure from that vote in 1933.

This decrease is not a true figure for, as explained above, a separate Government Analyst's Department has been created at a cost of £1,650. There is therefore a real increase of £115. Normal increments total £2,667, so that further economies to the extent of £2,552 have been effected. It will be observed that transfers to and from Native Services are numerous; those are not explained in detail, but are for the most part due to the fact that leave pay of all officers is charged to Non-Native Services. No material change in the services rendered by the Department is proposed.

Item 5-7

Clerks.

One clerk has been transferred to the Central Revenue Office, which has assumed responsibility for the collection of hospital fees. It is proposed to engage a learner grade clerk in her stead.

Item 6

Leave pay to Dr. A. D. Williams.

Dr. Williams, who was formerly Deputy Director of Medical Services, was in 1933 promoted to be Director of Medical Services, Nyasaland. As his services were urgently required there, he proceeded direct without taking the leave due to him. He is going on leave in 1935, and Kenya is liable for his leave pay in respect of leave earned in Kenya.

Items 7 & 8

Clerks (Asian).

Items 10 & 11

African Clerks.

A considerable number of Medical Officers in the field are entirely without clerical assistance, and much of their time is necessarily devoted to typing letters and preparing returns, work which could well be done by an African clerk, setting the Medical Officer free for his proper duties. It has been decided therefore to retrench two Asian clerks and replace them by four Africans. This proposal leads to increased efficiency combined with economy.

Item 13

District Surgeon.

£100 extra salary has been provided for the District Surgeon, Nakuru, for attendance at the local Government School. This is not a new item but was formerly paid for from Education Department votes, and has now been taken over by the Medical Department. Provision for £50 has also been inserted for a visiting Radiologist to superintend X-Ray work at the Native Hospital, Nairobi.

Item 14

Malaria Overseer.

This officer, who has hitherto been in receipt of a consolidated salary of £300 per annum, has carried out excellent work. He has had no increase of salary for some years. It is therefore proposed temporarily to put him on a salary of £300 per annum, pending consideration of the Local Civil Service, when his position will be further considered.

Item 16

Telephone.

The additional sum of £30 is required for the provision of a telephone for the Medical Officer, Meru, and for external extensions at the Nairobi and Kisumu Native Hospitals.

Item 18

Grants to Private Hospitals.

Owing to the Lady Grigg Nursing Association finding itself in financial difficulties, Government has guaranteed it against loss up to £300 in respect of the year 1934. It is hoped that this provision may not be required. The remaining £300 represents the grant formerly paid under "Medical Department Extraordinary" to the Nyasala Nursing Association.

Item 21

Compounders.

It is proposed to retrench one compounder during the course of 1935.

Item 22

Nursing Overseers.

It will be observed that the post of Male Nursing Orderly has been deleted. This designation was a misnomer, and the title "Nursing Overseer" is considered more commensurate with the work actually performed by the officer in question. It is proposed to engage a second officer for work in the

Kavirondo goldfields. In this connection, it is intended to replace as many as possible of the more expensive qualified Sanitary Inspectors, at present working in Native Reserves, by locally engaged Sanitary Overseers, as and when vacancies occur. The post of Sanitary Overseer will be included in the Local Civil Service.

Local Travelling.

Item 101.

An increase of this item has proved necessary, partly because it was previously inadequate and partly in order to provide for additional travelling in the mining areas.

Motor Transport.

Item 105.

Several of the departmental lorries are getting old and heavier expenditure on repairs is anticipated.

Medical and Surgical Stores and Equipment.

Item 116.

During the past year it has been impossible to meet certain demands made upon the Medical Stores; the sales of quinine continue to expand; equipment for thirty beds at Mathari Mental Hospital will be required; the demands of hospitals throughout the country are increasing as more use is being made of the facilities provided. Some part of this expenditure is recoverable by way of revenue.

Item 17.

The Staff "P" Clerk is a new appointee who is replacing one Special Grade Clerk and one First Grade Clerk who are now retiring. He is a pensionable European officer, seconded from the Education Department. A net reduction of £153 will be effected in 1935 by the acceptance of this proposal.

Items 15, 31, 40. **Pension Contributions.**

These were formerly shown as one item, which has been split up in order that the Expenditure Estimates in respect of each section may accurately reflect the expenditure on that section. The rates have been recently revised by the Army Council in an upward direction, in order to reflect the decrease in the current rate of interest on gilt-edged securities.

Item 28. **Signal Boys.**

In the 1934 Estimates all the twenty "boys" provided for under this item were shown as drawing Sh. 30 per month. Representations were made that a hardship existed in that a number of "boys" had completed over three years' service and were in effect fully trained signallers performing the same duties as privates at Sh. 30 per month, although they could not be absorbed into the establishment of privates because vacancies did not exist. It has therefore been decided, with the approval of the Secretary of State, to bring the wages paid to fully trained "boys" with over three years' service up to the same level as those of privates.

Item 54. **Interest and Maintenance of Military Buildings.**

Paragraph 25 of the Report of the Select Committee on the Draft Estimates for 1934 points out that "as a result of revision of the method of accounting for capital and maintenance costs of military buildings serving both Kenya and Uganda, it was necessary to make provision for interest and maintenance of military buildings." The Estimates provide for interest at 5 per cent on the cost of (a) the Brigade Commander's house; (b) the pay magazine; and (c) new latrines and bath-houses. The actual costs of (a) and (c) are being calculated and some slight modification of this item may subsequently prove necessary.

K.A.R. RESERVE.

Item 55. **Officers for one month.**

The Secretary of State has approved a downward revision of the rates of pay drawn by officers on the Reserve List, the object being to enable an increase in establishment without any increase in cost, and the legislation to give effect to this decision is in course of preparation. It is not yet possible to estimate with exactitude how many officers can be trained to 1935, but the total provision for the Reserve is the same as for 1934.

Items 143-146. **Personal Emoluments.**

There is a net decrease on personal emoluments of £225, due to the fact that during part of 1934 the Staff Officer was on a higher scale of salary, and also the fact that it was necessary to provide for an allowance to the officer acting as Staff Officer while the substantive holder of the post was absent on leave.

Training.

The defence of Mombasa is of the first importance, not only to Kenya but also to Uganda. A unit of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve has therefore been established at the port, and the Government of Uganda has agreed to bear one-third of the cost.

It is proposed to engage a Petty Officer Instructor at a cost of £400. As the financial position of the Colony will not permit of the K.D.F. Training grant being retained at its present figure and of the K.R.N.V.R. Estimates being increased, and as the Defence Force Training grant amounted to only £900 in 1933, it is considered reasonable in all the circumstances to reduce the K.D.F. Training grant by £300 to £1,500 as a partial offset against the increased cost of the K.R.N.V.R.

This change was approved by the Legislature when the schedule of additional expenditures not included in Schedule of Additional Provisions No. 2, 1934, was sanctioned.

Technical Adviser.

The Geologist and Mining Engineer (Mr. Murray-Hughes) has resigned, and in consequence of this resignation the Government has had the organization of the Department under review. In all the circumstances, it has been considered desirable that the Commissioner of Mines should continue, for the time being, to be an Administrative Officer, and that a fully qualified technical adviser should be appointed to advise him on the technical side. Provision for this technical adviser has been made accordingly, but it should be understood that the salary inserted (£1,500) is a purely tentative figure which is subject to alteration.

Special and Acting Allowances.

The increase of £90 is due to the fact that the Commissioner will proceed on leave during 1935, and an acting allowance will therefore be required for the officer taking his place.

Grant to East Africa and Uganda Natural History Society.

Item 11. **Grant to Imperial Institute.**
 The future of the Institute came under review when the Empire Marketing Board, which had made a substantial contribution towards its expenses, was abolished. Colonial Governments were asked if they would prefer to preserve the Institute in its present form, paying double their previous contributions, or whether they would prefer the scope of the Institute to be modified. After consultation with the Select Committee on the Estimates early in the year, this Government decided to press for the retention of the full services of the Institute. The other Colonial Governments concerned have also agreed, and in consequence provision in the Estimates has been increased by £300.

Item 12. **Guarantees in respect of Railway Branch Lines: Nanyuki Extension.**
 Owing to a change in the system of accounting, no loss on this branch line is anticipated during 1935.

Item 16. **Contribution to Inter-Territorial Languages Committee.**
 An increased contribution is being paid by the Government of Tanganyika Territory, and this Government's share is proportionately decreased.

Refunds of Wattle Bark Fees.
 New accounting arrangements obviate the necessity for this item. There is a corresponding decrease in the Revenue Estimates (Head III, Item 31).

HEAD XXa—MISCELLANEOUS SERVICES EXTRAORDINARY.

Item 1. **Contribution to McMillan Memorial and Rural Libraries.**
 This contribution has been reduced from £500 to £300 on account of the necessity for economy.

Item 4. **Fisheries Research.**
 A total sum of £250 is required to pay for the services of a research student to complete the work resulting from the fishery survey by Dr. Worthington and Mr. Graham. It is considered that this work will be of material value, and Uganda and Tanganyika have each agreed to pay a third share of the total cost, which is estimated at £250.

Item 5. **Celebration of 25th Anniversary of His Majesty's Accession.**
 The King has been graciously pleased to approve a recommendation of the Prime Minister that the twenty-fifth anniversary of His Majesty's accession to the throne, which falls on Monday, the 6th of May, 1935, shall be recognized in a fitting manner. The title "Silver Jubilee" has, with His Majesty's approval, been officially adopted for the year 1935. His Majesty desires that the celebrations shall be on a local basis, and that His Majesty's subjects shall wherever practicable have the opportunity of observing the occasion near their homes. It is His Majesty's express wish that the celebrations should be as simple as possible and that all undue expenditure should be avoided. A provisional figure of £300 has accordingly been inserted in the Draft Estimates.

The Expenditure Advisory Committee, in paragraph 316 of their report, estimated that the total increase in the Pensions vote would amount to £10,000 a year for four years. This has proved an under-estimate, and it has been found necessary to increase the provision by £20,200 in 1934 and by a further £28,500 in 1935.

Pensions and Gratuities. Item 3.

The sum of £14,987 is allowed for Pensions and Gratuities which may be granted during 1935. Actual requirements in previous years have varied from 28,000 to over 217,000. It is considered that the sum of £14,987 will be adequate for 1935.

Consolidated Pensions. Item 2.

This item has been increased by £7,000, the previous figure of £18,000 having proved inadequate. It is exceedingly difficult accurately to estimate commitments on this item.

Contributions to Provincial Funds and Cost of Administration. Item 4.

The inauguration of the European and Asian Local Civil Services Provincial Funds requires a Government contribution to be made to each fund based on the contribution paid by the Civil Servants concerned. A sum of 25,000 has been provided for this purpose, but this cannot be regarded as a firm estimate.

Officer in Charge and Accounts. Item 3.

A Senior Assistant Treasurer has been assigned to the Police to perform this work, which will formerly be carried out by one of the Superintendents, who has now retired. It is proposed to transfer this Treasury officer to the Police, the number of Assistant Superintendents being reduced by one. In addition, the vacated Treasury post is being put into abeyance.

Inspector. Item 1.

Assistant Inspectors (Second Grade). Item 2.

Three additional appointments are being made, viz. an Inspector for Finger Print Work, and Assistant Inspectors for the mining area and the Rift Valley Province.

First Grade African Constables. Item 25.

Second Grade African Constables. Item 26.

Third Grade African Constables. Item 27.

It will be observed that there is a net increase on the three items of 471. This is caused by three main factors—

- (a) A regrading by which a third grade constable automatically becomes second grade on completion of five years' satisfactory service, and a second grade becomes a first grade after one year's service;
- (b) Additional appointments of five constables consequent on the opening of the new administrative station at Nanyuki;
- (c) Transfer of six constables to the Port Police.

Arms and Equipment. Item 28.

Provision is included for the cost of fifty rifle barrels which are essential as an alternative to the purchase of new arms.

Maintenance and Upkeep of Motor Fleet. Item 29.

The provision in the 1934 Estimates was based on the cost of petrol purchased at that time. It is now purchased duty paid, and the cost is therefore greater although the increase is set off by corresponding increases. A number of the Police cars have been in use for over five years and have now run over 50,000 miles, and the cost of maintenance necessarily increases from year to year.

Item 64. *Telephones.*

Several additional telephones have become necessary. Further, increasing use is being made of trunk calls, a service which is of very great assistance in connection with police investigations.

Items 119-114. *Port Police.*

One first grade, two second grade, and three third grade constables have been transferred to the Port Police. Expenditure on this branch is reimbursed by the Railway Administration.

Item 1.

Verification and Overhaul of Indoor Standard Balances.

These balances have been in continuous use for a number of years, are inaccurate, and must either be sent to England for reconstruction and verification or else new balances must be purchased. It is proposed to replace the beams and shackles only, the pillars, slabs and trays being in good condition. The estimated cost of the essential new fittings, alterations, and certification is £40.

Item 2.

Purchase of Test Weights, £36.

There have recently been installed in the Colony ten weighbridges of a capacity from forty to sixty tons which require, in conformity with the provisions of the Weights and Measures Ordinance, to be verified annually by the inspector. The minimum quantity of weights necessary satisfactorily to check these weighbridges is twenty tons. The Railway Administration is in possession of seven-and-a-half tons, and it is proposed to purchase an additional twelve-and-a-half tons, half the cost to be defrayed by the Colony and half by the Railway Administration. It has been agreed with the General Manager that the whole twenty tons, when complete, shall be available for use both by the Colony and Railway Administration.

During the first six months of 1934, the average number of prisoners in excess of the total accommodation of the whole Colony was 1,105, and the situation caused by this excess has given Government much anxious thought. No signs of any easing of the situation have become evident. In all the circumstances, it is considered that the most satisfactory solution is the construction of a farm camp on Crown land near Ngong. The advantages of the scheme are as follows:—

- Approximately 500-600 of the surplus Prisons population will be concentrated in one camp;
- The employment afforded, namely, quarrying stone for the Public Works Department and growing foodstuffs will be revenue-earning, in that the quarried stone will, during 1935, be paid for from Loan Funds earmarked for the purpose of construction of the Central Offices, while the food grown will tend to reduce expenditure from the Prisoners' Food Vote;
- The site is situated conveniently for Administration purposes;
- The employment afforded will be ample for the number of convicts;
- The overcrowding problem has become so grave and urgent that it cannot now be solved by the establishment of small prison camps, which are, in any case, expensive to administer, and unsatisfactory for other than short-term prisoners.

It is hoped to obtain additional revenue to the extent of £9,000 during 1935 from the sale of quarried stone to the Public Works Department.

The capital cost of the farm, provision for which appears under "Head XXVa—Prisons Department Extraordinary" is £1,754. The total increase in prison expenditure in 1935 is therefore £9,732, which is offset by estimated additional revenue to the extent of £9,000 from the farm camp and £1,000 on account of general Prison Industries, the revenue from which was previously underestimated, so that the actual net cost of prisons has been reduced by an estimated amount of £268.

Sergeant Warders.

Item 18.

Experience has shown that the type of African who enlists in the Prisons Service is not, as a rule, fitted for promotion above the rank of Sergeant. It is therefore proposed to abolish the rank of Native Chief Warden, and substitute therefor the rank of Staff-Sergeant Warden at a lower rate of salary.

Master Tailor.

Item 24.

The salary of one Master Tailor while on leave pending retirement was paid in respect of five months during 1934.

Prisoners and Detainees Food.

Item 26.

The provision of £10,000 for 1934 is proving insufficient. New scales of rations are being brought into operation, and it is hoped to plant up the Prison Farm at Ngong during the long rains, so that the crops therefrom should be available during the latter half of the year. In all the circumstances, therefore, a figure of £10,000 is considered a reasonable estimate of requirements during 1935.

The factors which rendered it impossible to reduce the Draft Estimates of this Department to the Expenditure Advisory Committee's figure are set out in the Memorandum on the Draft Estimates for 1934.

They are briefly:—

(1) Normal increments have been in excess of those envisaged by the Committee;

(2) The Select Committee on the 1933 Estimates (para. 142) agreed that the combination of the posts of Director of Public Works and Superintending Engineer recommended by the Expenditure Advisory Committee was a matter which should be examined when one of the two posts fell vacant, and this recommendation was accepted;

(3) The building of the Central Offices still precludes the closing of the timber seasoning branch.

The form of the Estimates has been altered by the inclusion of the Government Transport branch in the Head Office organization, an arrangement which is calculated to make for increased efficiency and economy.

Item 6.

Assistant Engineers.

The increase of £371 is due partly to normal increments, and partly to the fact that one Assistant Engineer was paid from Loan during six months of 1934, while his whole salary will have to be met from revenue during 1935.

Item 15.

Apprentices and Learners.

It is proposed to put one post of Learner into abeyance, saving £60.

Item 25.

Foremen.

Item 26.

Temporary Works Staff.

Two posts of Foremen were shown in abeyance during 1934. This was a clerical error; actually, three posts were in abeyance. It is proposed to fill one of these posts in 1935, by appointing an officer paid from Temporary Works Staff, and show a corresponding reduction in the latter Bill. The net increase in the two items is £372; this is accounted for by normal increments.

Items 1 & 10. **Maintenance and Minor Improvement of Roads and Bridges.**

A decrease of £7,000 was made on these items in the Estimates for 1934, purely in the interests of economy. In the Memorandum on the Draft Estimates for that year it was pointed out that no further curtailment of

expenditure on maintenance and improvement of roads would be possible without seriously endangering the efficiency of the road system of the Colony. Financial considerations preclude any increase in this vote during 1935.

Rents of Offices and Houses and House Allowance in lieu of Quarters.

Item 3.

Actual expenditure in 1933 was £37,733. Since then, a number of officers have been appointed on consolidated salaries, and payments of House Allowance have in consequence been reduced. Further, a number of retrenchments of personnel have been made, the full effect of which is now being felt. In addition, the new Law Courts building will, it is hoped, be ready for occupation in May, 1935, and there will be a consequent saving in the rents of offices occupied by Departments which will move into the building.

In all the circumstances, and not taking into account the inauguration of the European and Asian Local Civil Services, £34,300 is considered a reasonable estimate of requirements during 1935.

Survivance, Upkeep and Repair of, for Government Bungalows and Offices.

Item 4.

The provision for 1934 is inadequate to meet the cost of repairs and replacements of furniture, most of which is old and dilapidated.

Loss and Depreciation of Unallocated Stores.

Item 5.

An increase of £600 has been made in this item in order to write down the book values of stores purchased when costs were high and to provide adequately for depreciation, thus indicating in the Colony's balance sheet the true value of the stock on hand.

Maintenance of Minor Water Supplies.

Item 12.

The increase of £400 is due to the necessity for alterations to the existing plant and for storage tanks in connection with the water supply at Chief Mukuma's location in Kyaukse District.

In the 1934 Estimates, three European and two Asian clerkships were in abeyance, i.e. there was financial provision for nine Europeans and eleven Asians. The Secretariat was reorganized at the beginning of 1934, and the following appeared in the Memorandum on the Draft Estimates:

"It is proposed, in due course, to examine the feasibility of modifying the clerical establishment in the new organization in the light of experience gained in the actual working of that organization."

As a result of experience gained provision is made for an establishment of twelve European and ten Asian Clerks with two of the latter posts in abeyance. The net result is a saving on clerical staff of £195.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

- Item 33. *Allowances, etc., to Unofficial Members of Executive and Legislative Councils.*
Actual expenditure in 1933 was £2,759. It is hoped that the substitution of the smaller Standing Finance Committee for the Select Committee on the Estimates will result in less expenditure from this vote. A figure of £2,500 is, in all the circumstances, considered reasonable.

These estimates have been slightly recast, in order to show the actual cost of the Native Registration and Finger Print, Statistical, and Registration of Domestic Servants sections separately.

- Item 1. *Chief Registrar of Natives.*

The work and responsibility of this officer has been materially increased, owing to the inclusion of the Finger Print Bureau, Statistical Section, and Registration of Domestic Servants under him. It is therefore proposed to extend his salary scale from £720 to £940. The officer formerly in charge of the Finger Print Bureau drew a salary of £840 per annum.

- Item 4. *Asian Clerks.*

When this department was reorganized in 1933, provision for leave movements was inadvertently omitted. It is therefore proposed to engage two Asian learners to act as reliefs.

- Item 5. *African Clerks, Learners, and Supernumeraries.*

The figure of forty-one clerks shown in the 1934 Estimates included supernumeraries, the number and pay of which vary from time to time. It is considered preferable to show the number of graded African clerks only.

- Item 18. *Purchase of Metal Containers.*

No metal containers have been purchased since 1931, as large stocks had been accumulated. These will be exhausted early in 1935. Annual requirements are approximately 60,000 and provision is made for the purchase of 50,000 at Cts. 44 each. The containers are made locally.

STATISTICAL SECTION.

- Item 19. *Asian key-punch officer.*
Item 20. *Asian clerk.*

No provision was made in the 1934 Estimates for the retention of these officers, but on further investigation it was found that the compilation of necessary statistics, such as migration statistics, could not be undertaken without their services. Their retention was therefore approved.

Machine Operator.

Action is being taken to make increased use of Hollerith machines in connection with Treasury accounts and, in consequence, this officer has been transferred to the Treasury Head of Estimates.

Machanic, Statistical Machinery.

This officer is not, properly speaking, a Civil Servant, but is an employee of the Hollerith Company, and Government pays a portion of his salary. His whole time is not at the disposal of Government. It is therefore considered preferable to charge his expenses to Item 22. "Rent and maintenance of Statistical Machinery."

Registration of Domestic Servants Section.

The estimates of this section have been framed on the assumption that the Ordinance will be applied to the Nairobi and Uasin Gishu Districts, both of which have asked for its application.

Asian Clerks.

Temporary Assistance.

Provision for one Asian Clerk (1st Grade) and for Temporary Assistance (2nd) was made in the 1934 Estimates. Experience has shown that at least two Asian clerks are necessary, but it is considered premature to fix a definite establishment. Accordingly a sum has again been inserted for Temporary Assistance.

Allowances to Local Authorities.

In connection with the operation of the Ordinance at Nakuru and Kitale, arrangements have been made that the local clerical work shall be carried out by the Local Authorities, who are reimbursed by Government in respect of their services in this connection.

The Select Committee on the Draft Estimates recommended certain increases, totalling £900 (paragraph 133 of the Report), but added that these increases should be regarded as non-occurring. This recommendation was approved by Legislative Council on the adoption of the Select Committee's Report, and the Draft Estimates for 1935 are reduced accordingly.

This item has been increased by £130 for the purchase of Hollerith cards in connection with the mechanisation scheme.

CENTRAL REVENUE OFFICE.

Item 25. *European clerks.*

This office has assumed responsibility for the collection of hospital fees, and one clerk has accordingly been transferred from the Medical Department.

Item 26. *Asian clerks.*

As explained in the note on Head II, Item 15, four clerks have been transferred from the District Commissioner's Office to the Central Revenue Office. One post has been abolished.

Buildings at Lodwar.

The buildings at Lodwar, which are of a temporary character, are in a condition of extreme dilapidation. The financial position of the Colony does not permit of steps being taken to replace them by more permanent structures all at once. It is therefore proposed to carry out the work over a period of years, and £500 has accordingly been inserted in Estimates in order to enable a start to be made during 1935.

WATER SUPPLIES AND DRAINAGE.

Kitui Water Supply.

A water supply at Kitui is a matter of urgency. Water is at present obtained from wells in the sandy bed of the Ralundu River and is most objectionable in quality. It is proposed to erect a gravity supply from a source some distance from the station, and to instal meters, at a total cost of £1,800. The item will therefore be revenue-producing and, in addition, will enable economy to be effected, in that the staff at present employed in carting water from the river can be discharged.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

Nairobi-Namanga Road.

The estimated total cost of reconstruction and improvement of the Nairobi-Namanga Road is £4,000. Provision of £1,000 was made in the Draft Estimates for 1933, but the financial position of the Colony rendered a reduction to £500 imperative during 1934. It is necessary to preserve the reduced figure of £500 during 1935.

Nanyuki-Isiolo Road.

The re-alignment of this road will reduce maintenance and eliminate the heavy grade of Punishment Hill.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Replacement of Mechanical Plant.

This year's provision (£1,000) is inadequate and the Department is consequently forced to keep on the road units the use and repair of which are not economical.

Furniture for New Buildings.

A sum of £100 is required for furniture for the new Law Courts building.

Item 2. *Town Plots, Roads and Drains.*

These funds are required for the widening of Station Road, Kisumu, and for general improvements in other townships.

Sullage Drains, Station Road, Kisumu.

Item 9.

The widening of Station Road, Kisumu, in accordance with the approved Town Planning scheme, postulates the construction of new drains, the cost of which work is estimated to be £600.

Minor Works.

Item 10.

The provision of £2,000 in 1934 has proved inadequate even for the most urgent and necessary requirements. It has in consequence been increased to £3,500, but of that sum £1,300 is earmarked for the following:—

- (a) £300 for the erection of an X-Ray room at the Native Civil Hospital, Nairobi;
- (b) £250 for construction and rebuilding of Detention Camps;
- (c) £200 for reconstructing the existing buildings at Eldama Ravine, in order that they may be used as an "Approved School" under the Juvenile Ordinance, 1934;
- (d) £450 for the erection of new temporary hospitals at Lokitanyi, Moyale, and Kipsanguria, where the existing buildings are almost unusable.

Colonial Veterinary Scholarship Scheme.

Item 1.

One-third of this expenditure is to be recovered from the Colonial Development Fund as a free grant. The objects of the scheme are to attract men with high scientific qualifications to veterinary work and to encourage men receiving training to develop fully the scientific side of their education. The full benefits of the scheme probably cannot be felt for some years.

Lise Slack Research Station, Nairobi.

Item 2.

A further free grant of £11,000 is being made from the Colonial Development Fund to enable the work on nutritional problems which has been carried on at Nairobi to be maintained and expanded.

Tsetse Fly Control.

Item 3.

This sum represents the third instalment of a free grant of £6,100 for the purpose of carrying out tsetse fly control measures in certain areas.

Colonial Agricultural Scholarship Scheme.

Item 4.

Provision for this scheme was formerly made under Head III, Agricultural Department, and the scheme was assisted financially by His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom. It has now been decided that that assistance shall be given from the Colonial Development Fund and provision is transferred accordingly to this Head of Estimates.

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Report of the Standing Finance Committee on the Draft Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the Year 1935

By Motion of the Legislative Council on the 30th November 1934 the Draft Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the year 1935 were referred to the Standing Finance Committee for consideration and report.

2 We have held in all seven meetings and have taken evidence from two Members of the Legislative Council. Our first four meetings were attended by all members of the Committee, but subsequent meetings were not attended by the European Elected Members Lord Francis Scott, Mr. Conway Harvey and Major Cavendish Bentinck who for reasons detailed below withdrew from the Committee's deliberations.

3 We first addressed ourselves to the task of making a detailed examination of the Revenue Estimates in the light of actual collections during the first nine months of the present year and such other information as was available. European Elected Members were not satisfied that there was a reasonable probability that the Estimates of Revenue under Customs and Native Hut and 4th and 5th Tax would be fully realized and were not prepared to support the continuance of the Non-Native Landranged Foot Tax and other Revenue aids with the exception of a few items had been fully explained they expressed the general view that Government was anticipating some slight improvement in conditions whereas they felt that except for some developments conditions might be expected to become worse during 1935. They intimated their intention of preparing in a Minority Report revised Revenue Estimates which would approximate to the average annual collections during 1932 and 1933 and they further advised the Government that unless Government was prepared to agree to the principle of a reduction in expenditure of £100,000 they felt it would be a waste of time to go any further on the Committee. The Chairman explained that Government would be only too glad to reduce expenditure to any extent in the power of the State there were certain difficulties. In the first place the maintenance of the Kenya native taxation at the existing rates had been the prerogative of the Government and consequently the officials in those services would be inconvenienced. The total sum appearing in the Draft Estimates in payment of Native Services was slightly less than the Masomo figure and it would be difficult to justify curtailment of this sum. Secondly certain non-natives such as tax collectors and pensions could not be touched. Thirdly Government had inherited assets in good condition and was in the position of a trustee of public property. Expenditure on maintenance and operations would have to be avoided if these assets were not to be allowed to deteriorate or be exhausted. Fourthly there were serious cuts in the Administration, Police, Education and Pensions which were regarded as essential services. There remained non-essential services and certain general services such as Forests, Game and Fisheries which though not essential to security were some the less necessary to prosperity. Unless therefore Elected Members were prepared to indicate in what direction they as representatives of the non-native communities considered services should be curtailed Government could not accept the principle. Lord Francis Scott expressed the view that the Public Works Department might perhaps be abolished or at least run as a small supervisory department and also that the field activities of the Veterinary Branch of the Agricultural Department might be abandoned. He gave these as instances of major reductions which he believed would be found to be possible.

4 As, however Government was unable to accept the specific principle of a reduction in expenditure of £100,000 the three European Elected Members felt compelled to withdraw from the Committee, and stated that they would prepare a Minority Report. They were present during the

on the Draft Estimates of Revenue and
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examination of the following Expenditure Heads: Administration, Coast Agency, Customs, Forest, Game, Local Government, Lands, and Settlement, Local Government Contributions to Local Authorities, Mining and Geological, Prisons, Trade and Information Office, and Treasury. They were absent from the discussions on the remaining Heads.

Revenue Estimates

HEAD I.—CUSTOMS AND EXCISE.

5. The Commissioner of Customs informed the Committee that the Estimates of Revenue in respect of Customs were based largely on the crop forecast prepared by the Director of Agriculture. This crop forecast was exhaustively examined with the Acting Director, who informed the Committee that it was based on the assumption that, from the meteorological point of view, 1935 would be a normal year. The majority of the Committee agreed with the Acting Director's estimate of Agricultural Exports (as distinct from total Domestic Exports) to a value of £2,599,000 was sound, but the European Elected Members felt that so good a price as £50 per ton for coffee f.o.b. Kilindini was unduly optimistic, and they were doubtful if so many as 900,000 bags of maize would be available for export. The Committee did, however, unanimously agree that Agricultural Exports might reasonably be assessed at a value of not less than £2,000,000.

6. The estimates of Customs Revenue were then examined in detail. Lord Francis Scott, Mr. Conway Harvey, and Major Cavendish-Bentinck felt that they should be reduced by £19,000, or approximately 3 per cent, their opinion being based on the Revised Estimates for 1934, plus the additional revenue which they anticipated in consequence of the Customs Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and the delayed action of the Customs Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, 1933. Mr. Pandya expressed the view that past experience and the present trend of volume of business in Kenya did not justify optimism and if the estimate in respect of Native Hut and Poll Tax was realized, which according to circumstances explained to the Committee should be assumed as a possibility, the purchasing power of the natives would be depleted. In his opinion, therefore, the estimated amount of Customs Revenue was not likely to be realized, but he was not prepared to propose any alternative figure.

7. The Committee agreed that the Estimates of Revenue in respect of Excise and Sundries were sound.

HEAD II.—LICENCES, DUTIES, TAXES, ETC.

8. *Item 9—Stamp Duties, various revenue purposes.*—In the light of actual receipts during 1934, and in view of the probability of an amendment to the Ordinance, the Committee recommended that the estimated revenue from this source be increased from £53,000 to £55,000. Major Cavendish-Bentinck expressed his disagreement with this proposed increase.

9. *Item 11—Hut and Poll Tax (Natives), £562,979.*—The Committee understood that in a number of areas, which had been adversely affected by drought and other conditions, His Excellency had reduced the rate of tax to be paid. The Committee recognized that the present time was inopportune for any general all-round reduction; for such a reduction would entail the curtailment of Native Services, which curtailment, in the opinion of the Committee, would be undesirable.

10. Careful consideration was given to the amount which might reasonably be expected to accrue from this source of revenue, and the Committee was informed that the estimate was based on estimates submitted by each individual District Commissioner and scrutinized by the Provincial Commissioners and the Chief Native Commissioner. The view was expressed that these officers were in the best position to gauge the financial resources of

the various districts. After exhaustive discussion, the majority of the Committee recommended that the Estimates, as printed, which were based on the assumption that 1935 would be a normal year, should stand. The European Elected Members expressed doubts as to whether, in view of the diminishing resources of the native community, the estimate would be realized. They considered that the estimate should be reduced to a figure between £530,000 and £542,979.

11. *Item 12—Non-Native Poll Tax.*—All Elected Members reiterated their opinion, already expressed in debate, that the Graduated Non-Native Poll Tax should be abolished. The Committee, however, agreed that in the event of the tax being retained, the estimate of £96,000 was sound.

12. *Item 14—Estate Duty, £10,000.*—The Committee was informed that actual collections in 1933 had amounted to £19,510, while the final Revised Estimate for 1934 was £17,000. It was understood that substantial sums would accrue during the early part of 1935, and the Committee accordingly recommended that this item be increased from £10,000 to £12,000, the latter being regarded as a very conservative figure.

13. *Item 15—Traders and Professional Licences, £70,000.*—Some members of the Committee expressed the view that the figure of £70,000 would not be realized, while others considered that it was probably an underestimate. It was realized that actual receipts would depend on the final form of the new Ordinance. Mr. Pandya considered that the tax would impose an undesirable additional burden on the commercial community, who were already seriously overtaxed.

14. *Item 17—Cotton Tax, £2,000.*—The Committee understood that a revised scale of taxes was being proclaimed, which would enable the estimate to be increased from £2,000 to £4,000, and recommended accordingly. The Committee considered that additional services should be provided for the cotton producers.

15. *Item 21—Levy on Official Salaries, £46,500.*—In the opinion of Lord Francis Scott, this should not appear in the Revenue side of the Budget but should appear, department by department, as a saving in expenditure which in his view it was. The Committee realized there were two divergent opinions on the matter, one that the levy was in fact a tax and the second that it was a temporary "cut" in salaries, and understood that there were accounting difficulties in showing it on the expenditure side.

16. *Item 25—Lake Fishery Licences, £900.*—The Committee noted, with satisfaction, that the fisheries protection service of Lake Victoria was now entirely self-supporting.

17. The Committee considered that the Estimates of Revenue in respect of the remaining items under this Head were sound.

HEAD III.—FEES AND PAYMENTS FOR SPECIFIC SERVICES.

18. *Item 19—Boarding Fees for Indian Schools, £800.*—In the light of actual revenue received in during 1934, the Committee recommended that this item should remain at the same figure as in 1934, viz. £800.

19. *Item 23—Agricultural Produce, Grading, Conditioning and Cold Storage Fees, etc., £5,500.*—The Director of Agriculture informed the Committee that the realization of this estimate was contingent on his estimates for agricultural exports being attained. Should certain exports not materialize to the extent anticipated, there would be less revenue, but also less expenditure under Head III, Items 24 to 31.

20. *Item 26—Aircraft Housing and Landing Fees, £2,000.*—The Committee understood that estimated receipts during 1934 would amount to £2,750. With this figure in view, and taking into account the duplication of the Imperial Airways mail service during 1935, it was considered that the estimated revenue under this item should be increased from £2,000 to £2,000, and the Committee recommended accordingly.

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the various districts. After exhaustive discussion, the majority of the Committee recommended that the Estimates, as printed, which were based on the assumption that 1935 would be a normal year, should stand. The European Elected Members expressed doubts as to whether, in view of the diminishing resources of the native community, the estimate would be realized. They considered that the estimate should be reduced to a figure between £550,000 and £542,972.

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HEAD III—FEES AND PAYMENTS FOR SPECIFIC SERVICES.

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19. Item 24—Agricultural Produce, Grading, Conditioning and Cold Storage Fees, etc., £5,000.—The Director of Agriculture informed the Committee that the realization of this estimate was contingent on his estimates for agricultural exports being attained. Should certain exports not materialize to the extent anticipated, there would be less revenue, but also less expenditure under Head III, Items 26 to 31.

20. Item 26—Station Housing and Landing Fees, £2,000.—The Committee understood that estimated receipts during 1934 would amount to £2,750. With this figure in view, and taking into account the duplication of the Imperial Airways mail service during 1935, it was considered that the estimated revenue under this item should be increased from £2,000 to £2,500, and the Committee recommended accordingly.

21. Lord Francis Scott expressed the view that the high landing charges imposed by Imperial Airways, Ltd., in respect of the landing grounds at Juba and Malakal in the Sudan were proving a serious impediment to the development of air transport between East Africa and Egypt. The Committee understood that Government was taking steps to press for a reduction in these charges.

22. *Item 30—Fees for Geological Assays, £300.*—In the light of information supplied by the Commissioner of Mines, the Committee recommended that this item should be increased from £300 to £450.

23. In accordance with paragraph 91 of this Report the Committee recommended insertion of a new item, "Aeroplane Ambulance Fees, £75," under this Head.

24. The Committee was satisfied that the estimates in respect of the remaining items under this Head were sound.

HEAD IV.—POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS.

25. The Committee made no recommendations in respect of any of the items under this Head.

HEAD V.—EARNINGS OF GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

26. *Item 2—Prison Industries, £11,000.*—The Commissioner of Prisons informed the Committee that in his view the sum of £2,000 would be obtained without difficulty from the quarrying of stone to be used in building the new Central Offices, unless the decision, already taken, to construct those offices was reversed. Under the guidance of the European Master Tailor, considerably more revenue was being obtained, and he had no doubt that the estimate of £11,000 would be realized. Lord Francis Scott expressed regret that the reformatory reorganization would necessitate the cessation of the carpentry and building activities at Kibete.

27. *Item 20—Coast Ferries, £600.*—The Committee understood that tenders were being invited for 1935 on the basis of a considerably modified scale of ferry charges, which had been approved by Government since the preparation of the Draft Estimates. It was therefore reasonable to anticipate that the amount tendered would not reach the figure for 1934, and the Committee therefore considered that it would be prudent to reduce the estimate from £600 to £450.

HEAD VI.—REVENUE FROM GOVERNMENT PROPERTY AND ROYALTIES.

28. *Item 3 (b)—Mining Revenue—Fees, £8,000.*—On information furnished by the Commissioner of Mines, the Committee was satisfied that this item could be increased by £5,000 to £13,000.

HEAD VII.—SALE OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY.

29. *Item 5—Ivory and Confiscated Trophies, £10,000.*—The Game Warden explained to the Committee that the revenue from the first ivory sale during 1934 had amounted to £6,164, and the estimate of £10,000 in respect of the two sales during 1935 was therefore conservative.

HEAD IX.—FOREST DEPARTMENT REVENUE.

30. Mr. Conway Harvey informed the Committee that complaints had been received from representatives of the mining industry to the effect that the royalties payable on timber cut in Kakamega Forest Reserve were unduly high, and the suggestion had been proffered that the cost should be reduced to the actual cost of cutting the timber. The Conservator of Forests explained that the forest was not a Crown Forest, but that net profits were paid to the Local Native Council, and that that body was entitled to receive as much revenue as could reasonably be obtained. It was explained that royalties payable in respect of timber cut in this forest were slightly less than those obtaining in Crown Forests.

HEAD XI.—REIMBURSEMENTS.

31. Major Cavendish-Bontinck pointed out to the Committee that an increase of £4,130 over the Sanctioned Estimates for 1934, and of £14,134 over the Revised Estimates for the same year was anticipated, and enquired how this increase could be justified. He was informed that this Head consisted entirely of cross-entries and therefore did not affect the budgetary position, that the increase was largely accounted for by extra expenditure amounting to £9,853 on Posts and Telegraphs in Uganda and Tanganyika, by an additional reimbursement of £5,831 from the Kenya and Uganda Railway on account of Sinking Fund contributions in respect of the 1930 £3,400,000 Loan and by an increased reimbursement from Uganda of £1,980 in respect of the Customs Department Expenditure. It was explained that this was purely an accounting Head, and that an increase meant, not more money being taken out of the country, but less net expenditure being incurred.

32. *Item 45—Reimbursement from Loan on account of Public Works Department Staff, £1,080.*—The Committee noted that provision had been made for the reimbursement from Loan Funds of one-half the salary of the Architect, the Quantity Surveyor and the Draughtsman. The Director of Public Works pointed out that during the preparation of plans for, and the construction of, the Central Offices, one Assistant Engineer, the Architect and the Quantity Surveyor would be almost entirely engaged on Loan work. In addition a large proportion of the time of the Director of Public Works, the Superintending Engineer and the Chief Accountant, was spent on loan work, and no reimbursement was received. He considered it equitable that, during 1935, the whole of the salary of one Assistant Engineer and of the Architect, and half the salary of the Quantity Surveyor should be recovered from Loan. The Committee endorsed his view and recommended accordingly. It was understood that this decision, if approved, would enable Item 45 to be increased from £1,080 to £2,100.

33. The Committee understood that, as a consequence of the recommendation in paragraph 96 of this Report, Item 9 should be reduced by £100.

HEAD XIII.—COLONIAL DEVELOPMENT FUND

34. *Item 5—Colonial Agricultural Scholarship Scheme.*—In accordance with paragraph 123 of this Report the Committee recommended that this item be increased to £225.

Expenditure Estimates

35. The attitude of the European Elected Members to the Expenditure Estimates has been set out in paragraphs 2 and 4 above. Mr. Pandya, while agreeing that a substantial reduction in Government expenditure was most desirable, felt that it was difficult to frame concrete proposals.

36. Mr. Shumard-Dean, in evidence tendered to the Committee, urged the necessity for reducing expenditure in certain spending departments to approximately the level which obtained in 1925 and, by means of graphs, illustrated the rise which had since taken place. After full discussion, the majority of the Committee came to the conclusion that it would not be practicable to reduce expenditure in the manner desired, on account of the many additional commitments which had arisen since 1925. Mr. Pandya dissented and felt that expenditure should be reduced.

CLASSICAL STAFF.

37. Mr. Pandya expressed the opinion that the ratio of Special Grade posts to ordinary posts, in the case of the Asian clerical staff, does not provide adequate prospects of promotion, and is in fact less favourable than that which obtained in 1927. He was informed that the present ratios were decided after the most exhaustive consideration, and that Government was not prepared to reopen the matter.

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HEAD I.—HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

39. The Committee noted that the estimates of expenditure under this Head, showed a net reduction of £219.

HEAD II.—ADMINISTRATION.

39. *Item 3—Senior District Commissioners.*—Lord Francis Scott reminded the Committee that Elected Members had protested a year ago against the creation of these posts, while Government's arguments had been that they were considered necessary to provide Administrative Officers with reasonable prospects of promotion. As a member of Senior Officers had recently retired, he suggested that economy might be effected by diluting promotions. The Committee recommended that Government should consider the position, and consider the desirability of giving effect to Lord Francis Scott's proposal.

40. *Item 5—H.B.M. Coast for Southern Alps.*—A suggestion was made that it might prove possible to dispense with the services of this officer, but, after consideration, the Committee was of opinion that he was essential as a connecting link between the Kenya and Abyssinian Governments.

41. *Item 7—District Officers, £98,551.*—The Committee understood that only eleven new cadets had been appointed instead of the twelve who had originally been asked for and that one District Officer had died since the Draft Estimates had been prepared. The Committee therefore recommended that this item should be reduced by £710. It was also considered that both the present and the former salary scales should be shown in the final printed Estimates.

42. Lord Francis Scott pointed out to the Committee that it was, in his opinion, scandalous that this country should have to accept cadets from home when suitably qualified local candidates were available. Generally speaking, local youths were more fitted for the work than their overseas counterparts; for instance, they would usually have a good knowledge of Swahili. He admitted, however, that it was not possible at present to fill all vacancies with local candidates. The Chairman explained that selection did not depend merely on the possession of adequate qualifications, but on the possession of better qualifications than other candidates. It was a matter of competition.

43. *Item 22—Passages, £9,563.*—The Committee understood that this figure could be reduced by £30, and recommended accordingly.

44. *Item 25—African Tropical Services Course, £4,500.*—The Committee was informed that, in view of the non-appointment of one cadet, this item could be reduced from £4,500 to £3,600.

45. The view was expressed that it was desirable that the cost of the course should be a personal charge against the cadets concerned, for its being met from public funds was tantamount to the payment by Government of the expenses of the cadet's last year at a university. The Committee realized that, in certain cases, the applicants might not be in a position to pay their own expenses, and in that case it was felt that a possible course might be to advance the cost and recover it over a period of years. The Committee recommended that representations should be made to the Secretary of State in this sense.

46. *Item 26—Labour Officers.*—The Committee was informed by Lord Francis Scott that the opinion was held in certain quarters that a Labour Officer on the Coast was unnecessary. It was explained that the officer would not only be responsible for the Coast zone, but also for Taita District and the Masongoleni-Kilweini area, in which there were extensive large estates. It was also pointed out that there were serious difficulties in reducing the number of personnel engaged in labour inspection. After full consideration, the Committee was satisfied that the appointment was necessary. It was noted that a saving on the 1934 Estimates would be effected by the rearrangement.

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47. *Item 40—Passages, £40.*—The Committee understood that, as a result of unforeseen leave movements, it was necessary to increase this item to £284, and recommended accordingly.

48. *Item 140 et seq.—Northern Frontier Province.*—Mr. Hemsted was of the opinion that considerable economy could be effected by including the Marabit and Samburu Districts in the Rift Valley Province, and the Telemsager District in the Coast Province, the remainder of the Province being administered from Wajir by the Military with a Political Officer. Another suggestion was that Wajir should become the Administrative Headquarters and the King's African Rifles removed to Nanyuki, Nairobi, or elsewhere. Lord Francis Scott expressed the view that the possibility of developing the area through Lamu should not be overlooked.

49. After considerable discussion, Mr. Hemsted undertook to submit a memorandum on the matter and the Committee recommended that Government should give full consideration to his proposals.

HEAD IIa.—ADMINISTRATION EXTRAORDINARY.

50. *Item 1—Reconditioning of Kamasia Native Reserve, £800.*—The Committee understood that valuable work had been and was being done in regard to the reconditioning of eroded areas in the Kamasia Reserve, and recommended that a report on the work should be prepared and published, in order that the general public might have fuller information.

HEAD III.—AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT.

51. *Item 30—Veterinary Officers, £4,153.*—The Committee understood that it had become necessary to provide for a part-time Veterinary Officer for Nakuru during six months of 1935 and accordingly recommended that this item should be increased by £150.

52. *Item 35—Passages, £1,983.*—The Committee was informed that, owing to revised leave movements, this item could be reduced by £115 and so recommended.

53. *Item 134—Assistant Agricultural Officers, £1,309.*—The Committee considered that the increased revenue from cotton tax was such as to justify the appointment of an additional Assistant Agricultural Officer for cotton surveys, and accordingly recommended that this item be increased by £360 to enable an extra officer to be engaged.

54. *Item 140—Veterinary Inspector, £420.*—Mr. Pandya asked that the salary scale in respect of this post be extended from £420 to £500 as the present holder had proved himself to be an exceedingly valuable officer and was in fact carrying out work similar to that performed by a European Veterinary Officer. The Committee, while recognizing the ability of the officer in question, felt that the present state of the Colony's finances did not permit of the salaries of particular officers being increased solely on account of their efficiency and were consequently unable to recommend acceptance of Mr. Pandya's proposal.

HEAD IV.—AUDIT.

HEAD V.—COAST AGENCY.

HEAD VI.—CONFERENCE OF EAST AFRICAN GOVERNORS.

55. The Committee had no recommendations to make regarding any of the items under the above heads.

HEAD VII.—CUSTOMS.

56. The Commissioner of Customs explained that the proposed post of Accounts Clerk was not a new post, but replaced a post of Assistant Accountant which had been held in abeyance.

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57. It was explained to the Committee that, owing to leave movements and illness among the staff, it was regarded as essential that the three posts, two of Collector and one of Assistant Accountant, should be filled, and that, with these posts filled, the effective strength of the department would approximate to the same number as in 1933.

58. European Elected Members were not convinced of the necessity for filling these posts.

59. Lord Francis Scott mentioned that the Expenditure Advisory Committee had recommended a joint enquiry by representatives of Kenya and Uganda. He was informed that this recommendation had fallen through owing to the unwillingness of Uganda to agree. In fact, in subsequent correspondence, the Uganda Government had pressed for increased personnel, as, in its opinion, the department was inadequately staffed.

60. The Commissioner of Customs was prepared to agree, in view of the necessity for economy, that the Nairobi Bonded Warehouse might be closed, as it was not really essential to reasonable efficiency. In Lord Francis Scott's view, however, this economy would not be acceptable to the community, and it was accordingly decided not to recommend any action at the moment.

61. The Committee noted that, owing to an increase in the reimbursement from Uganda, net expenditure showed a reduction of £448, and, by a majority, the European Elected Members dissenting, recommended that the Draft Estimates, as printed, should stand.

HEAD VIII.—EDUCATION.

62. *Item 2—Chief Inspector of Schools, £1,000.*—Mr. Pandya was doubtful of the necessity for filling this post.

63. *Item 18—Colony's share of Cost of Advisory Committee to Colonial Office, £378.*—The Committee understood that this item could be reduced to £130, and recommended accordingly.

64. *Item 28—Overseas Scholarship Scheme, £100.*—Mr. Pandya asked that a token vote of £50 be inserted in Estimates to provide for a scheme for Asians, similar to that proposed for Europeans. The Chairman was of opinion that this raised a new issue of policy which would require careful consideration by Government before any decision could be taken.

65. *Item 43—Education Officers, £22,334.*—Dr. de Sousa, in evidence, informed the Committee that of the twenty-one "not graded" Education Officers, a number had not received increments for several years. The Chairman pointed out that their position would be fully considered on the inauguration of the Kenya Local Civil Service.

66. The Committee was informed that the reduction of four officers was in respect of the Alhadin Visram High School, Mombasa, and Mr. Pandya questioned the wisdom of this economy. The Chairman pointed out that, in the opinion of the former Director of Education, Mr. Scott, the reduction could be made without impairing efficiency.

67. *Item 59—Grants-in-Aid (Goan Education), £750.*—Dr. de Sousa informed the Committee that of the sum of £750, £250 was paid to two "mixed" schools, i.e. schools attended by pupils of all races. After discussion, the Committee recommended that this item be reduced to £500, and a new item, "Grants to Special Schools, £250", inserted in Estimates.

68. Dr. de Sousa pointed out that there was no definite academic qualification laid down for teachers in Indian Girls' Schools. The Committee, while realising that higher qualifications would postulate increased emoluments, asked the Director of Education to enquire into the matter.

69. Mr. Hemsted considered that some economy combined with efficiency might be obtained by amalgamating schools administered by the Agricultural and Veterinary Departments with those belonging to the Education Department. For instance, there was a Government African School at Kapabet while there was a Veterinary Training Centre a few miles away. He realised that it would not be possible to take action in connection with the 1935 Estimates, but asked that the matter should be examined. The Committee recommended that the Director of Education should in collaboration with the Director of Agriculture investigate the possibility of combining agricultural and educational activities in the manner indicated.

HEAD VIIIa.—EDUCATION DEPARTMENT EXTRAORDINARY.

70. *Item 2—Physical training equipment at Girls Secondary School, Nairobi, £50.*—Representations were made by Mr. Pandya and Dr. de Sousa that a sum of £50 should be voted for the purchase of similar equipment for the Indian Girls School at Mombasa. Some members were doubtful if any necessity for such equipment existed nor, indeed, was it known if suitable accommodation was available. After discussion, the Committee recommended that the Director of Education should go into the matter and, if he was satisfied that the need existed, submit proposals to Government.

HEAD IX.—FOREST DEPARTMENT.

71. *Item 11—Reforestation, £2,200.*—Lord Francis Scott questioned the wisdom of a drastic reduction in this vote. The Conservator of Forests explained to the Committee that, even with the depleted provision, a larger area would be planted than would be felled. The amount of timber cut had decreased with the trade depression, and in consequence less replanting was necessary.

72. Mr. Hemsted enquired if any action was being taken to plant trees in the desert and semi-desert parts of the Colony. The Committee was informed that any extensive experiments in these areas would be very expensive, but a start was being made on a small scale in Machakos District. The Committee recommended that the feasibility of extending this work should be borne in mind as and when the finances of the Colony permit of the necessary expenditure being incurred.

HEAD X.—GAME DEPARTMENT.

73. The Committee made no recommendations concerning any of the items under this Head.

HEAD XI.—GOVERNMENT ANALYST'S DEPARTMENT.

74. The Committee was informed that the main reason for the creation of a new department was the fact that the Government Analyst had little to do with the Medical Department and consequently it was undesirable that his activities should be controlled by the Director of Medical Services.

HEAD XII.—INTEREST AND UNFUNDED DEBT.

75. The Committee made no recommendations regarding any of the items under this Head.

HEAD XIII.—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

76. *Item 10—Clerk and Accountant, Supreme Court, £200.*—Mr. Pandya considered that the salary of the officer holding this post should be increased from £200 to £400 on account of his long service and excellent record. The Committee, for reasons similar to those stated in paragraph 54 above, felt unable to recommend this increase.

HEAD XIV.—LEGAL DEPARTMENT.

77. The Committee made no recommendation regarding any of the items under this Head.

HEAD I.—HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

38. The Committee noted that the estimates of expenditure under this Head, showed a net reduction of £819.

HEAD II.—ADMINISTRATION.

39. *Item 3—Senior District Commissioners.*—Lord Francis Scott reminded the Committee that Elected Members had protested a year ago against the creation of these posts, while Government's argument had been that they were considered necessary to provide Administrative Officers with reasonable prospects of promotion. As a number of Senior Officers had recently retired, he suggested that economy might be effected by delaying promotions. The Committee recommended that Government should examine the position, and consider the desirability of giving effect to Lord Francis Scott's proposal.

40. *Item 5—H.B.M. Consul for Southern Abyssinia.*—A suggestion was made that it might prove possible to dispense with the services of this officer, but, after consideration, the Committee was of opinion that he was essential as a connecting link between the Kenya and Abyssinian Governments.

41. *Item 7—District Officers, £66,351.*—The Committee understood that only eleven new cases had been appointed instead of the twelve who had originally been asked for and that one District Officer had died since the Draft Estimates had been prepared. The Committee therefore recommended that this item should be reduced by £710. It was also considered that both the present and the former salary scales should be shown in the final printed Estimates.

42. Lord Francis Scott pointed out to the Committee that it was, in his opinion, scandalous that this country should have to accept cadets from home when suitably qualified local candidates were available. Generally speaking, local youths were more fitted for the work than their overseas competitors; for instance, they would usually have a good knowledge of Swahili. He admitted, however, that it was not possible at present to fill all vacancies with local candidates. The Chairman explained that selection did not depend merely on the possession of adequate qualifications, but on the possession of better qualifications than other candidates. It was a matter of competition.

43. *Item 22—Passages, £9,683.*—The Committee understood that this figure could be reduced by £58, and recommended accordingly.

44. *Item 25—African Tropical Services Course, £4,000.*—The Committee was informed that, in view of the non-appointment of one cadet, this item could be reduced from £4,000 to £3,867.

45. The view was expressed that it was desirable that the cost of the course should be a personal charge against the cadets concerned, for its being met from public funds was tantamount to the payment by Government of the expenses of the cadet's last year at a university. The Committee realised that, in certain cases, the appointees might not be in a position to pay their own expenses, and in that case it was felt that a possible course might be to advance the cost and recover it over a period of years. The Committee recommended that representations should be made to the Secretary of State in this sense.

46. *Item 26—Labour Officers.*—The Committee was informed by Lord Francis Scott that the opinion was held in certain quarters that a Labour Officer on the Coast was unnecessary. It was explained that the officer would not only be responsible for the Coast area, but also for Taita District and the Masagaleni-Kibweni area, in which there were numerous large estates. It was also pointed out that there were serious objections to reducing the number of personnel engaged in labour inspection. After full consideration, the Committee was satisfied that the appointment was necessary. It was noted that a saving on the 1934 Estimates would be effected by the rearrangement.

47. *Item 40—Passages, £40.*—The Committee understood that, as a result of unforeseen leave movements, it was necessary to increase this item to £284, and recommended accordingly.

48. *Item 140 et seq.—Northern Frontier Province.*—Mr. Hemsted was of the opinion that considerable economy could be effected by including the Marabit and Samburu Districts in the Rift Valley Province, and the Telemanjer District in the Coast Province, the remainder of the Province being administered from Wajir by the Military with a Political Officer. Another suggestion was that Wajir should become the Administrative Headquarters and the King's African Rifles removed to Nanyuki, Nairobi, or elsewhere. Lord Francis Scott expressed the view that the possibility of developing the area through Laikipia should not be overlooked.

49. After considerable discussion, Mr. Hemsted undertook to submit a memorandum on the matter and the Committee recommended that Government should give full consideration to his proposals.

HEAD IIa.—ADMINISTRATION EXTRAORDINARY.

50. *Item 1—Reconditioning of Kamassa Naitigi Reserve, £600.*—The Committee understood that valuable work had been and was being done in regard to the reconditioning of eroded areas in the Kamassa Reserve, and recommended that a report on the work should be prepared and published, in order that the general public might have fuller information.

HEAD III.—AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT.

51. *Item 10—Veterinary Officers, £4,155.*—The Committee understood that it had become necessary to provide for a part-time Veterinary Officer for Nakuru during six months of 1933 and accordingly recommended that this item should be increased by £180.

52. *Item 35—Passages, £1,305.*—The Committee was informed that, owing to revised leave movements, this item could be reduced by £139 and so recommended.

53. *Item 124—Assistant Agricultural Officers, £1,205.*—The Committee considered that the increased revenue from cotton tax was such as to justify the appointment of an additional Assistant Agricultural Officer for cotton services, and accordingly recommended that this item be increased by £200 to enable an extra officer to be engaged.

54. *Item 145—Veterinary Inspector, £420.*—Mr. Peadar asked that the salary scale in respect of this post be extended from £420 to £500 as the present holder had proved himself to be an exceedingly valuable officer and was in fact carrying out work similar to that performed by a European Veterinary Officer. The Committee, while recognising the ability of the officer in question, felt that the present state of the Colony's finances did not permit of the salaries of particular officers being increased solely on account of their efficiency and were consequently unable to recommend acceptance of Mr. Peadar's proposal.

HEAD IV.—AUDIT.

HEAD V.—COAST AGENCY.

HEAD VI.—CONFERENCE OF EAST AFRICAN GOVERNORS.

55. The Committee had no recommendations to make regarding any of the items under the above heads.

HEAD VII.—CUSTOMS.

56. The Commissioner of Customs explained that the proposed post of Accounts Clerk was not a new post, but replaced a post of Assistant Accountant which had been held in abeyance.

57. It was explained to the Committee that, owing to leave movements and illness among the staff, it was regarded as essential that the three posts, two of Collector and one of Assistant Accountant, should be filled, and that, with these posts filled, the effective strength of the department would approximate to the same number as in 1933.

58. European Elected Members were not convinced of the necessity for filling these posts.

59. Lord Francis Scott mentioned that the Expenditure Advisory Committee had recommended a joint enquiry by representatives of Kenya and Uganda. He was informed that this recommendation had fallen through owing to the unwillingness of Uganda to agree. In fact, in subsequent correspondence, the Uganda Government had pressed for increased personnel, as, in its opinion, the department was inadequately staffed.

60. The Commissioner of Customs was prepared to agree, in view of the necessity for economy, that the Nairobi Bonded Warehouse might be closed, as it was not really essential to reasonable efficiency. In Lord Francis Scott's view, however, this economy would not be acceptable to the community, and it was accordingly decided not to recommend any action at the moment.

61. The Committee noted that, owing to an increase in the reimbursement from Uganda, net expenditure showed a reduction of £446, and, by a majority, the European Elected Members dissenting, recommended that the Draft Estimates, as printed, should stand.

HEAD VIII.—EDUCATION.

62. *Item 2—Chief Inspector of Schools, £1,000.*—Mr. Pandya was doubtful of the necessity for filling this post.

63. *Item 18—Colony's share of Cost of Advisory Committee to Colonial Office, £378.*—The Committee understood that this item could be reduced to £139, and recommended accordingly.

64. *Item 23—Overseas Scholarship Scheme, £100.*—Mr. Pandya asked that a token vote of £50 be inserted in Estimates to provide for a scheme for Asians, similar to that proposed for Europeans. The Chairman was of opinion that this raised a new issue of policy which would require careful consideration by Government before any decision could be taken.

65. *Item 43—Education Officers, £23,334.*—Dr. de Sousa, in evidence, informed the Committee that of the twenty-one "not graded" Education Officers, a number had not received increments for several years. The Chairman pointed out that their position would be fully considered on the inauguration of the Kenya Local Civil Service.

66. The Committee was informed that the reduction of four officers was in respect of the Alladina Visram High School, Mombasa, and Mr. Pandya questioned the wisdom of this economy. The Chairman pointed out that, in the opinion of the former Director of Education, Mr. Scott, the reduction could be made without impairing efficiency.

67. *Item 59—Grants-in-Aid (Goon Education), £750.*—Dr. de Sousa informed the Committee that of the sum of £750, £950 was paid in two "mixed" schools, i.e. schools attended by pupils of all races. After discussion, the Committee recommended that this item be reduced to £500, and a new item, "Grants to Special Schools, £250", inserted in Estimates.

68. Dr. de Sousa pointed out that there was no definite academic qualification laid down for teachers in Indian Girls' Schools. The Committee, while realizing that higher qualifications would postulate increased emoluments, asked the Director of Education to enquire into the matter.

69. Mr. Hemsted considered that some economy combined with efficiency might be obtained by amalgamating schools administered by the Agricultural and Veterinary Departments with those belonging to the Education Department. For instance, there was a Government African School at Kapapbet while there was a Veterinary Training Centre a few miles away. He realized that it would not be possible to take action in connection with the 1935 Estimates, but asked that the matter should be examined. The Committee recommended that the Director of Education should in collaboration with the Director of Agriculture investigate the possibility of combining agricultural and educational activities in the manner indicated.

HEAD VIII.—EDUCATION DEPARTMENT EXTRAORDINARY.

70. *Item 2—Physical training equipment at Girls Secondary School, Nairobi, £90.*—Representations were made by Mr. Pandya and Dr. de Sousa that a sum of £50 should be voted for the purchase of similar equipment for the Indian Girls School at Mombasa. Some members were doubtful if any necessity for such equipment existed there, indeed, was it known if suitable accommodation was available. After discussion, the Committee recommended that the Director of Education should go into the matter and, if he was satisfied that the need existed, submit proposals to Government.

HEAD IX.—FOREST DEPARTMENT.

71. *Item 11—Reforestation, £1,300.*—Lord Francis Scott questioned the wisdom of a drastic reduction in this vote. The Conservator of Forests explained to the Committee that, even with the depleted provision, a larger area would be planted than would be felled. The amount of timber cut had decreased with the trade depression, and in consequence less replanting was necessary.

72. Mr. Hemsted enquired if any action was being taken to plant trees in the desert and semi-desert parts of the Colony. The Committee was informed that any extensive experiments in these areas would be very expensive, but a start was being made on a small scale in Machakos District. The Committee recommended that the desirability of extending this work should be borne in mind as and when the finances of the Colony permit of the necessary expenditure being incurred.

HEAD X.—GAME DEPARTMENT.

73. The Committee made no recommendations concerning any of the items under this Head.

HEAD XI.—GOVERNMENT ANALYST'S DEPARTMENT.

74. The Committee was informed that the main reason for the creation of a new department was the fact that the Government Analyst had little to do with the Medical Department and consequently it was undesirable that his activities should be controlled by the Director of Medical Services.

HEAD XII.—INTEREST AND UNFUNDED DEBT.

75. The Committee made no recommendations regarding any of the items under this Head.

HEAD XIII.—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

76. *Item 10—Clerk and Accountant, Supreme Court, £300.*—Mr. Pandya considered that the salary of the officer holding this post should be increased from £200 to £400 on account of his long service and excellent record. The Committee, for reasons similar to those stated in paragraph 54 above, felt unable to recommend this increase.

HEAD XIV.—LEGAL DEPARTMENT.

77. The Committee made no recommendation regarding any of the items under this Head.

HEAD XV—LOCAL GOVERNMENT, LANDS AND SETTLEMENT.

78. *Item 2—Local Government Inspector, £920.*—The Committee recommended that, owing to a change in the holder of the post, the provision on this item should be reduced from £920 to £840.

79. *Item 21—Office Boys and Messengers, £249.*—The Commissioner for Local Government, Lands and Settlement informed the Committee that, as a result of reorganization, it was possible to reduce this item from £249 to £231, and the Committee recommended accordingly.

HEAD XVI—LOCAL GOVERNMENT CONTRIBUTIONS

80. *Items 5 and 11—Traffic Revenue.*—The Committee was informed that the proportion of the revenue from motor vehicle licences which was paid to the Municipalities of Nairobi and Mombasa was fixable by the Governor in Council. Before 1931 the rate had been two-thirds, but in that year it had been reduced to one-half for reasons of economy. Representations had been received from the Local Authorities concerned that the fraction should be restored to two-thirds, and the Committee recommended that the question should be considered as and when the financial position of the Colony permitted.

81. *Item 13—Basic Road Grants to District Councils, £31,070.*—It was understood that objections to the proposed reduction had been received from the Trans-Nzoia District Council.

HEAD XVII—MEDICAL DEPARTMENT

82. *Item 13—Junior Surgical Specialist, £1,000.* The Committee recommended that the title of this post be altered to Surgical Specialist.

83. *Item 14—Medical Officers, £28,008.*—The Committee understood that this item could be reduced from £28,008 to £7,708 and so recommended.

84. *Items 19, 20 and 21—Nursing Sisters.*—Dr de Sousa in evidence and Mr. Fandya informed the Committee that a grievance existed amongst the Indian community in that operations on Indian women were performed in the presence of adult male Africans. The Director of Medical Services explained that if this were to be rectified immediately it would be necessary to increase the staff of Nursing Sisters by one. However, there were a number of African women in training and they would in due course become available to assist at operations. The Committee, whilst sympathizing with the wish of the Indian community, felt that the present state of the Colony's finances did not permit of an increase in the staff of Nursing Sisters. Mr. Fandya considered that the appointment should be made.

A proposal by Mr. Fandya that £100 should be provided for temporary assistance at such operations was investigated by the Director of Medical Services and reported by him to be impracticable.

85. Dr. de Sousa represented that the time had come for engaging Asian women as Nursing Sisters. The view held by the majority of the Committee was, however, that the Colony's finances rendered it necessary to resist all proposals for extension or expansion of services and they were therefore unable to recommend acceptance of the proposal.

86. *Item 43—Laboratory Assistants, Learners and Junior Grade, £265.*—Dr. de Sousa represented to the Committee that no provision appeared for Asian Learners. The Chairman pointed out that for work in connection with Native Hospitals there were African Laboratory Assistants, and for European Hospitals there were European Laboratory Assistants, and that if and when an Asian Hospital was constructed no doubt Government would consider engaging Asian Laboratory Assistants.

87. *Item 52—Maintenance of Government Officials in Private Hospitals, £450.*—The Committee recommended that, for accounting reasons, the title of this item should be altered to "Maintenance of Government Officials and Others in Private Hospitals" and that it should be increased from £450 to £500 and that Item 69—Grants to Private Hospitals, should be correspondingly decreased.

88. *Item 68—Asian Assistant Surgeons.*—Dr. de Sousa pointed out that the salary scale for Asian Assistant Surgeons stopped at £425 whereas the scale in the case of the corresponding European appointments proceeded to £500 and asked that the Asian scale be extended to that figure. He was informed that the two European Assistant Surgeons had many years service and the probability was that when either retired his post would not be filled.

89. *Item 95—Sanitary Overseers, £600.* It was suggested by Dr. de Sousa that the field of choice might well be extended to permit Asians being appointed to these posts. The Director of Medical Services explained that while he agreed that the employment of Asian Sanitary Overseers was not undesirable, the two posts in respect of which provision appeared in the Estimates were for work in the mining area and he considered that, taking into account the special conditions in that area, Europeans were more suitable.

90. *Item 119—Medical Grants to Missions, £3,788.* The Committee recommended that this item be divided into two sub-items: (a) Stores, drugs etc. £310 and (b) Medical Grants £3,478. This recommendation was made in order that medical missions might obtain stores free of duty from the Medical Department as otherwise they would be compelled to purchase them privately and pay customs duty.

91. The Committee understood that an Air Company had imported an ambulance aeroplane and that they had offered to lease this aeroplane at the disposal of the Director of Medical Services for transport purposes in cases where medical treatment was in the Director's opinion urgently necessary in return for a payment by way of subsidy of £80 per annum and a mileage charge of 30 cents per mile. The Committee recommended that Government should negotiate an agreement with the Company on these lines and that the service should be made available to all classes of the community irrespective of race. The Committee further recommended that a new item, Air Transport, £271, be added to the expenditure estimates and that on the revenue side, under Head III, Fees and Payments for Special Services, a new item, Air-transport Ambulance Fees, £271, be inserted in the estimates.

92. Dr. de Sousa in evidence suggested that additional revenue might be found by diverting to general revenue the operation fees at present paid by private individuals to Government medical officers. It was explained that private practice and the right to charge fees for operations on private individuals were integral parts of the terms under which medical officers served and it would therefore be inadvisable to abolish the privilege.

HEAD XVIII—MEDICAL DEPARTMENT EXTRAORDINARY

93. *Item 1—X-ray Plant, Native Hospital, Nairobi, £10,000.*—Dr. de Sousa in evidence informed the Committee that X-ray work was at present being carried out satisfactorily by a private practitioner at a cost to Government of approximately £350 a year plus the cost of transporting patients from the hospital to the radiologist's residence and he therefore thought that the proposed expenditure for the erection of an X-ray room and the installation of X-ray plant at the Native Hospital, Nairobi, was unjustified. Further, if and when the new combined hospital in Nairobi was erected, a first-class X-ray plant would be necessary and £750 would not nearly cover the cost. The Director of Medical Services explained that with the installation of a new plant in the combined hospital, he proposed to transfer the plant for which provision was made in the 1935 Draft Estimates to Kisumu where it was required.

94. He pointed out that the total recurrent cost of the X-ray plant, including the honorarium paid to the visiting radiologist, would amount to approximately £340 per annum and therefore recurrent expenditure would be materially reduced by the installation of the plant.

95. After full consideration, the Committee, Mr. Pandya dissenting considered that the estimates should stand.

HEAD XVIII—MILITARY

96. *Item 81—Pensions Contributions, £113. Item 80, Pensions Contributions, £4,044.*—The Committee understood that these items could be reduced to £141 and £3,834 respectively and so recommended.

97. *Kenya Defence Force.*—The Committee understood that the Draft Estimates of the Kenya Defence Force had been examined by the Central Defence Committee who had advocated their deletion from the Draft Estimates and substitution thereof of revised estimates totalling the same figure, and that they had recommended these estimates for approval, subject to the concurrence of the Commandant who was expected to arrive in the Colony at an early date. These new estimates are recorded below:

98. The Committee felt that the Central Defence Committee was the proper body to advise on Defence Force matters and accordingly recommended approval of the above revised estimates.

HEAD XIX—MINING AND GEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT

99. *Item 3—Technical Adviser, £1,100.*—The Committee understood that the amount of £1,100 under this item was purely provisional. It was suggested that it might be desirable to make provision for a petrographer in addition to the Technical Adviser, but the majority of the Committee recommended that the appointment of the Technical Adviser should be awaited, as it might possibly be found unnecessary to appoint a petrographer. Major Cecil de Bontack felt that such an appointment was necessary.

100. *Item 6—Inspectors of Mines, £1,903.* The Commissioner of Mines informed the Committee that one of the three inspectors for whom provision was made was an officer to inspect machinery. While such inspection was essential, he considered that arrangements could be made for it to be carried out at regular intervals either by an officer of the Kenya and Uganda Railway Administration or by a suitably qualified private individual. The Committee endorsed this view, and recommended that Item 6 should be reduced to two Inspectors at a total cost of £1,803, and that a new item "Fees for Machinery Inspection, £200" should be inserted in the Estimates.

101. *Item 12—Local Travelling, £1,600.*—On representations from the Commissioner of Mines, the Committee recommended that this item should be increased to £1,700.

102. *Item 19—Equipment, etc., £300.*—Similarly, the Committee recommended that this item should be increased to £400, in order to enable additional equipment for survey purposes to be purchased.

103. The Committee recognized that, as this department was still in its infancy, the estimates were necessarily of a provisional character.

HEAD XX—MISCELLANEOUS SERVICES

104. *Item 6—Duplicating Machines Repairs, £75.*—The Committee recommended that the title of this item should be altered to "Duplicating Machines."

105. *Item 10—Grant to East Africa and Uganda Natural History Society, £300.*—The Committee considered a letter from the President of the Society asking that the decision of Government to reduce the grant paid to the Society by £300 should be reconsidered. After full consideration, the Committee felt that the item as reduced should stand.

HEAD XXI—MISCELLANEOUS EXTRAORDINARY

106. *Item 4—Cost of Fishery Research, £204.*—The Committee understood that this item could be reduced to £41 and so recommended.

HEAD XXII—PENSIONS AND GRATUITIES

107. The Committee made no recommendation under this Head.

HEAD XXIII—POLICE

108. *Item 35—Clerks, £1,157.*—The Committee was informed that one Clerk had been dismissed and that it was proposed not to replace him. The Committee accordingly recommended that this item be reduced by £256.

109. *Item 61—Travelling Allowances, £350.*—The Committee was informed that this item could be reduced by £30, and so recommended.

110. Mr. Pandya felt that efforts should be made to provide more adequate protection, whether by the Kenya or Tribal Police, for residents in trading centres. He stated that, in a number of places, the inhabitants clubbed together and engaged their own "vigilantes" a procedure which was, in his opinion, wrong in principle, inasmuch as it meant that they had to bear an extra burden themselves for such protection.

111. Consideration was given to the question of whether by increased rural telephone facilities, certain police outposts could not be abandoned with a consequent saving in expenditure. After discussion with the Acting Commissioner of Police the Committee agreed with his view that no further reduction of outposts was desirable.

112. The Committee was informed that the present crisis position gave no cause for anxiety, although there had been a slight increase in the number of petty thefts and in housebreaking.

HEAD XXIII—POST OFFICE AND TELEGRAPHS.

113. *Item 32—Telegraphic Learners at various rates.*—The Postmaster-General informed the Committee that the position of the present learners would be specially considered on the inauguration of the Asian Local Civil Service, and that the points at which they would enter the new scales would be carefully worked out.

114. *Item 50—Conveyance of Mails by Air, £12,000.*—The Committee raised the question of a reduction in the rate charged for Air Mail correspondence. The Postmaster-General pointed out that the Air Mail did not do more than pay its way, and any reduction in charges would in his opinion have an adverse effect on revenues.

HEAD XXIIIa—POST OFFICE AND TELEGRAPHS
EXTRAORDINARY.

115. *Item 1—Telephones and Telegraphic Extension and Improvements, £2,500.*—The Committee was advised that a telephone line to Kisii, although in itself desirable, would not be a paying proposition. In any case, raising the necessary funds for construction would be a matter of great difficulty.

HEAD XXIV—PRINTING AND STATIONERY.

116. The Committee made no recommendations under this Head.

HEAD XXV—PRISONS.

117. *Item 5—Assistant Superintendents, £1,577. Item 6—Chief Officers, £2,877.*—The Commissioner of Prisons informed the Committee that, since his return from leave, he had examined the expenditure estimates which had been prepared during his absence, and that he considered that certain reductions might be effected by means of reorganization. He proposed to reduce the numbers of Assistant Superintendents by one, with a corresponding increase in the number of Chief Officers, Item 5 being reduced to £1,523, and Item 6 increased to £3,123, the net reduction being £106. The Committee recommended acceptance of his proposals.

118. *Item 8—Master Tailor (European), £300. Item 34—Master Tailor (Asian), £212.*—The Committee understood that the European Master Tailor was stationed at Nairobi and the Asian at Mombasa. The Commissioner proposed to transfer the Mombasa tailoring activities to Nairobi and retrench the Asian Master Tailor, saving £106 in 1935 and £212 in subsequent years. In view of the enhanced responsibilities of the European Master Tailor, the Commissioner felt that he should be on the same Local Civil Service scale as the Carpenters and Masonry Instructors, and that he should enter it at the £360 point. The Committee, Mr. Pandya dissenting, recommended acceptance of the proposals, and noted that they would effect a net decrease in expenditure of £26 in 1935. It was understood that the officer to be retrenched was pensionable and had completed 35 years' service.

119. The Committee further recommended that Items 7 and 8 should be combined, and that the designation of the officers concerned should be altered to "Technical Instructors", in order that it might be brought into conformity with the designation proposed in Sessional Paper No. 1 of 1934, setting out the proposed terms and conditions for the European Local Civil Service.

120. *Item 15—Corporal Warders, £1,520. Item 16—Lance-Corporal Warders, £2,218. Item 17—Warders, £6,384.*—The Committee recommended that the number of Corporal and Lance-Corporal Warders should be reduced to 45 and 80 respectively, and the number of Warders increased to 292. It was understood that these changes involved a reduction in expenditure of £52.

121. *Item 22—African Schoolmaster, £48.*—The Committee was informed that, owing to the increased duties brought about by the rise in the Prison population, the warden staff had little time and less inclination for

attending classes out of hours, and the Commissioner felt that, owing to the long hours worked by the warders, compulsory attendance at such classes would be unfair. He therefore suggested that the services of the African Schoolmaster should be dispensed with, and the Committee endorsed his recommendation.

122. *Item 23—Master Carpenter, £204.*—The Committee, Mr. Pandya dissenting, recommended the retrenchment of this officer, with a saving of £102 in 1935 and £204 in subsequent years. It was understood that the work could be carried on reasonably efficiently by the two Instructors for whom provision had been made under Item 7.

123. *Item 26—Prisoners and Detainees Food, £10,000.*—The Commissioner informed the Committee that, since his return from leave, he had caused the position to be re-examined and it now transpired that actual expenditure during 1934 would amount to over £12,000. He was doubtful if it would be possible to plant up a substantial area of the Ngongu Farm in time for the long rains in 1935, and he saw no reason to envisage a substantial reduction in the prison population. He therefore felt that it would be dangerous to anticipate spending less than £12,000 in 1935. The Committee accepted his view, and recommended that Item 26 be increased accordingly from £10,000 to £12,000.

124. The Commissioner asked if it would be practicable as an economy measure, to defer opening the Class II Approved School at Eldama Ravine until 1935. The Committee understood that representations had been received from the Judiciary pointing out the unsatisfactory provision for dealing with juveniles, and were therefore unable to recommend acceptance of the proposal.

HEAD XXVa—PRISONS DEPARTMENT EXTRAORDINARY.

125. *Prison Farm Camp.*—The Committee realized that action must be taken to alleviate the overcrowding which obtained in the prisons of the Colony, and agreed that the farm camp scheme was probably the most satisfactory method of dealing with the situation.

126. Lord Francis Scott expressed the view that the cultivation of food-stuffs by prisoners for consumption in prisons competed with the producers of the country.

HEAD XXVI—PUBLIC DEBT FUNDED.

127. The Committee made no recommendations under this Head.

HEAD XXVII—PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

128. *Item 11—Surveyors, £1,300.*—The Committee was informed that the vacancy would arise during the course of 1935, and recommended that the post be put into abeyance, thereby saving £300.

129. *Item 12—Transport Officer, £700.*—The Director of Public Works considered that economy could be effected by the retirement of the present holder of the post, and by making departmental arrangements for the transport work to be carried out by the Stores Branch. The Committee recommended acceptance of the proposal, and understood that the officer concerned was pensionable and had over 20 years' service. On the assumption that he retired on 1st July 1935, a saving of £300 would accrue.

130. *Item 21—Senior Overseers, £1,150.*—The Committee was informed that one post had become vacant owing to the holder being invalided from the Service, and recommended that it be put into abeyance, thereby saving £240 during 1935.

131. *Item 21—Foreman, £11,300. Item 79—Trucker Seasoning Operator, £612.*—It was understood that the Trucker Seasoning Operator was not engaged on seasoning activities for more than half the year, and that for the remainder of the time he was to effect a foreman. The Committee therefore recommended that half his salary should be charged to Item 21.

132. The Director of Public Works informed the Committee that on examination of the Estimates since his return from leave, he found that reductions could be made in the following items:—

Item 34—Office Boys, etc.—Reduce by £78.

Item 35—Acting Allowances.—Reduce by £100.

Item 37—Travelling Allowances.—Reduce by £25.

Item 40—Conservancy and Water Rates.—Reduce by £77.

Item 43—Telephones.—Reduce by £35.

Item 57—General Maintenance and Improvement, etc.—Reduce by £25.

He also asked that *Item 53—Fitters, Permanent Skilled Labour, etc.* be increased by £30 and *Item 56—Local Transport and Travelling* by £25.

133. The Committee recommended that these adjustments be approved.

134. *Item 78-85—Central Workshops and Timber Seasoning Branch.*—The Committee noted that the Expenditure Advisory Committee, when advocating the abolition of this Branch, appeared not to have taken account of the fact that it was revenue-earning. In point of fact, up to and including 1933, it had earned profits exceeding £1,600. In 1934, there would probably be a deficit of approximately £400, but as against that £800 had been spent in liquidation of capital account. If the branch were closed down, Government would have to face the immediate necessity of writing off approximately £2,000 on Capital Account.

135. The Committee agreed that the obstacles in the way of getting out to contract work performed by the Central Workshops were considerable. In 1933, over 800 orders had been executed in the Workshops, and had tenders been invited in respect of these orders, specifications would have had to be computed in full detail, which would have been costly. After full consideration, the Committee recommended that this Branch should not be closed for the present.

HEAD XXVIII—PUBLIC WORKS RECURRENT.

136. *Items 1 and 10—Maintenance and Improvement of Roads and Bridges, £57,000.*—The Director of Public Works stated that any considerable reduction in this vote would undoubtedly necessitate the closing of certain roads to traffic, and the Committee accordingly recommended that the figures in Draft Estimates should stand.

137. It was explained that the actual cost of upkeep of roads and buildings had materially decreased since 1923. In that year, maintenance costs had been approximately £10 per mile of road, while the corresponding figure for 1934 was £5/10. In 1923, upkeep of buildings had cost approximately 2.8 per cent of their value, whereas in 1934 the figure was 0.74 per cent.

138. The Committee realized that it was impossible to define any given road as purely a native or purely a non-native service. The rough and ready definition adopted by the Director of Public Works was to class all roads, other than main trunk roads, in native reserves, as Native Services. This definition would, of course, include most of the roads in the Kavirondo mining area.

HEAD XXIX—REGISTRAR GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

HEAD XXX—RENT AND INTEREST TO H.H. THE SULTAN OF ZANZIBAR.

HEAD XXXI—SECRETARIAT, LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL AND NATIVE AFFAIRS.

HEAD XXXII—STATISTICAL DEPARTMENTS.

139. The Committee made no recommendations under any of these Heads.

HEAD XXXIII—TRADE AND INFORMATION OFFICE.

140. *Item 1—Contribution to Trade and Information Office, £1,173.*—The Committee by a majority recommended that this item be increased by £15 to £1,188 to make provision for increments to the Commissioner and his clerical staff. In this connection, it was understood that the reorganization of the office would come under review during 1935, as the lease of the present building terminated during the year, and the Committee recommended that the need for economy should be borne prominently in mind when any proposals for reorganization were being considered.

141. Lord Francis Scott was opposed to any increase in this item, as he doubted if Kenya obtained full value for her contribution.

142. *Item 3—Publicity and Expenses of Kenya Section, £1,650.*—The Committee was informed that, in the opinion of the Kenya Advisory Committee, this item would not permit sufficient expenditure on advertising and publicity, which were regarded as essential. After discussion, the Committee recommended that provision be increased by £350 to £2,000.

143. The Committee noted that, in consequence of the recommendation of the Select Committee on the 1934 Estimates, the item "Temporary Clerical Assistance, £350," had disappeared from the 1935 Draft Estimates. It was explained that this sum had been given to the Kenya Association (1932) to enable them to engage clerical staff. The Committee was of opinion that the work done by that Association in assisting tourists and potential settlers was most valuable, and recommended that a new item "Clerical Assistance, £350," be inserted in the Estimates.

144. Mr. Pandya was opposed to the principal of expenditure on this Head being charged to public funds, to which all communities contributed.

HEAD XXXIV—TREASURY.

145. The Committee understood that it was necessary to revive the item "Allowance to Secretary, Estate Duty Commissioners, £30," which appeared in 1932 and previous estimates but for which no provision was made in 1934, and recommended accordingly.

146. *Items 23-25—Central Revenue Office.*—The Committee noted, with satisfaction, that the Central Revenue Office was enabling a fuller collection of Licences, Duties, and Taxes to take place.

HEAD XXXV—PUBLIC WORKS EXTRAORDINARY.

147. *Item 1—Buildings at Lodole.*—In all the circumstances, the Committee agreed that the proposal to vote a small sum each year for the construction of permanent buildings was the most suitable method of dealing with the problem which had arisen on account of the unsuitable condition of the existing temporary buildings.

148. *Thika Water Supply.*—Mr. Pandya expressed regret that it had not been found possible to make financial provision for a new water supply at Thika. It was explained that the present supply was inadequate for the proper functioning of the township drains, and the Committee recommended that the urgent necessity for the construction of this water supply should be borne in mind.

149. *Government Indian School, Thika.*—Mr. Pandya was informed that, for financial reasons, it had not been possible to make provision for a new school building. It was understood from the Director of Public Works that the School Committee were in a position to meet the necessary capital expenditure, and the Committee recommended that the possibility of arriving at an agreement with the School Committee, whereby that body would erect a suitable building and lease it to Government, should be examined.

150. Dr. de Soete, in evidence, expressed regret that no provision had been made for the construction of a new elementary school building at Nairobi. He was informed that the matter was one for consideration in

connection with the question of Loan Expenditure, and that it would be borne in mind, in due course, as well as other even more urgently necessary projects, such as new boarding accommodation for the European Girls School, Nairobi.

151. *Kisumu Market*.—The Committee understood that the shops, covered stores and kitchens at the above market were in a dilapidated condition and, in the opinion of the Executive Engineer, were definitely unsafe. The Director of Public Works estimated the cost of a new building to be approximately £2,500, and the Committee recommended that the expenditure should be met by a reallocation of Loan Funds which, it is understood, are not now required for offices at Eldoret. It was understood that expenditure incurred in reconstructing this market would be immediately revenue earning.

HEAD XXXVI.—COLONIAL DEVELOPMENT FUND.

152. *Item 4—Colonial Agricultural Scholarship Scheme, £402*.—The Committee understood that a re-assessment of the contributions to be provided by the Governments participating in this scheme had recently been made and accordingly recommended that this item be increased to £600 and that the corresponding revenue item (Head XIII, Item 5) be increased to £225.

FINANCIAL EFFECT OF COMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATIONS.

153. The recommendations of the Committee recorded above show a net increase in gross Revenue of £13,105, and a net decrease in gross Expenditure of £225. If these recommendations are adopted, the sanctioned Estimates for 1935 will reflect the following figures:—

MINORITY REPORT

The Draft Estimates for 1935 were referred by the Legislative Council to the Standing Finance Committee for consideration and report. The Committee commenced its task by making an examination of the Revenue Estimates. The undersigned, however, felt that in order to ensure an adequate examination of, and an effective report on the Draft Estimates for 1935, due consideration must be given to the Colony's present financial position and to the history of the past few years. We contend that the problem is not merely one of balancing the Budget, showing on paper that revenue can be obtained to cover the proposed expenditure of Government, but that the far more important question has to be considered as to what amount under present day circumstances can be extracted from the inhabitants of the country for the purpose of maintaining the administrative machinery of Government without repercussions on the productive development of the country. In our opinion the net figure of £2,000,000 should be looked on as the maximum, based on the existing trade position of the Colony, to which we refer later.

During the course of our scrutiny of the Revenue Estimates, plausible, and in some cases almost convincing arguments were put forward by Government members of the Committee, or, in the course of their evidence, by Heads of Departments in support of the Revenue Estimates as presented. We, however, remembered that identical arguments have been put forward before a series of Select Committees on the Estimates during the past five years, but that, in spite of the yearly persistence of those whose business it has been to frame Revenue Estimates, such Estimates have not been realized and in consequence the country has now suffered from six consecutive deficits in her budgets.

During the course of the Committee's deliberations, we noticed that in many cases the arguments put forward in support of the revenue figures were based on such propositions as: (1) That the Colony would enjoy at least normal rates in 1935. (2) That the country would be free from locusts during 1935. (3) That world conditions would improve. (4) That there would be a very considerable increase in native production, much of which would be exported. (5) That the mining industry would develop rapidly and that a considerably increased quantity of gold would be exported. (6) That the proposed paper pulp industry would become established on a large scale in 1935. (7) That more revenue would be obtained from the recently increased Customs duties. (8) That more revenue would accrue by the increase in licence licences, stamp duties and other new or increased measures of taxation which have not as yet been passed by the Legislature. In our opinion Government paid but little regard to the all-important factor of price level, or to the decreased purchasing power of the whole community.

In view of the past history of the last few years, we contend that the time has now arrived when it has become the duty of the Standing Finance Committee to impose upon Government in the strongest possible terms the fact that henceforth it is imperative that Revenue Estimates should first be framed on a really conservative basis and within the limits of the country's capacity and that expenditure should then be curtailed so that it is kept strictly within those limits. We do not consider that any Estimates under present day circumstances which depend on the factors we have just men-tioned for their realization can be truthfully described as conservative. World conditions are such that we consider that Government has no right to budget optimistically. In view of this country's experiences during the last six years, we contend that Revenue Estimates can only be described as conservative or safe if based on actual average receipts during the last two

years, and reasonable adjustments are then made to that basis. By adopting this principle, when the tide does eventually turn Government would ensure ending that year with a surplus once again, which would enable a start to be made in restoring the cash position of the Colony and afford prospects of some slender resources for urgently necessary productive expenditure. It is in our opinion imperative that we ensure balanced budgets for the next few years in order that some small liquid reserve may again become available. Working on these lines, after carefully considering the evidence which was submitted to the Committee, we are of the opinion that reductions totalling some £75,000 should be made in certain specific items in Government's Estimates of Revenue for 1935, to which amount must be added the total estimated collection of the Non-Native Graduated Poll Tax, amounting to some £36,000, in view of the fact that Elected Members adhere to the contention that this tax was only imposed as a temporary measure in order to afford Government the necessary time in which to put its house in order, and that in consequence Elected Members are not prepared to agree to the renewal of this measure for 1935.

Government's original Estimates of Revenue for 1935 amount to £3,240,331 or £82,736 more than the Second Revised Estimates for actual revenue collection in 1934; £118,835 more than actual revenue receipts for 1933; £174,476 more than average collections over the years 1932 and 1933; and £454,262 more than the average revenue collections over the last four years, including the Revised Estimated Revenue figure for 1934.

We now note from the main report that the Revenue Estimates have been increased by £13,165, making the revised total of anticipated receipts for 1935, £3,253,496; or £96,641 more than the Second Revised Estimates for actual revenue collection in 1934; or £131,490 more than the actual revenue receipts for 1933; or £167,582 more than the average collections over the years 1932 and 1933, and £164,967 more than the average revenue collections over the last four years, including the Revised Estimated Revenue figure for 1934.

We consider that Estimates framed on these lines cannot be described as framed on a strictly conservative basis.

The specific items of Estimated Revenue which we consider inflated beyond the margin of safety are set out hereunder:

From the foregoing it will therefore be seen that we recommend a definite reduction in Revenue Estimates on specific items amounting to £109,729 which reduces the Standing Finance Committee's estimate of gross revenue amounting to £3,253,436 to £3,143,707. We would here stress that were our figures accepted, although £13,898 less than the Second Revised Estimates of Revenue for 1934 (which, incidentally, have already had to be written down no less than £41,378 below the original 1934 Estimates), it would nevertheless represent a figure which exceeds the actual collections for 1933 by £22,211; £77,862 more than the average collections for 1932 and 1933; and £54,648 more than the average collections of the last four years, including estimated 1934 Revenue and approximately £92,000 over the maximum net £2,000,000 figure which we suggest.

Moreover £36,000 Non-Native Graduated Poll Tax was collected last year, and if we make the necessary adjustment in view of the opposition to the reimposition of this tax in 1935 we should be estimating for a revenue of £15,917 more than it is estimated may, with luck, be collected during 1934. Taking into account these figures and the basis on which we maintain Revenue Estimates should be framed we consider that we have not been unduly pessimistic.

We naturally realize that it is always possible that a turn for the better may take place during 1935 and that Government Estimates of Revenue might be realized. We sincerely hope such may prove to be the case. Our appreciation of this unlikely contingency, however, in our opinion in no way detracts from the validity of our contention that we must budget for a surplus estimating on really conservative and safe figures. This we maintain we are doing. Government we consider is gambling on the future.

Leaving the revenue position for the moment and turning to the Budget as a whole, we append hereunder the actual revenue and expenditure of the Colony for the years 1929 to 1934:—

From the foregoing table it will be noted that, although steps have been taken by Government to reduce expenditure, such steps have not kept pace with the decline in price level and in the trade and revenue position of the Colony. Furthermore, included in the figures of actual expenditure are the amounts incurred in non-recurrent or extraordinary expenditure, in which, of course, the greatest reductions have taken place. In 1929 non-recurrent and extraordinary expenditure amounted to £517,398, which has been reduced until, in 1933, expenditure under this category only amounted to £78,303.

During the same period Kenya's Trade Imports have fallen from £6,640,402 in 1929, to £3,582,808 in 1933.

Kenya's Retained Trade Imports have fallen from £4,742,964 in 1929, to £1,936,167 in 1933.

Kenya's Domestic Exports have fallen from £3,266,838 in 1929, to probably below the £2,000,000 mark in 1934.

Coins and notes in circulation have fallen from £5,084,000 in the three territories to £3,827,000 by the end of 1933.

Meanwhile recurrent expenditure has risen from £2,806,226 in 1929, to £3,064,833 in 1933, to £3,216,953 in 1935.

The Secretary of State, when he visited this Colony last year, informed us that it would not be prudent or practicable for Kenya at the present time to raise a loan on the London market. He intimated, quite frankly, that the Colony was no longer credit-worthy. In view of the history of the past few years, we agree that, so long as the Colony adheres to the practice of budgeting on the lines it has adopted during the last five years there is some substance in his criticism. We consider that the figures (we have quoted in our minority report) clearly prove that the Colony's taxable reserves must largely be exhausted. People have been living on their capital for some years and the spending capacity of the country has been greatly reduced. We hold the opinion that new taxes cannot be imposed, and even if imposed, far from producing increased revenue, they might be found to have the opposite effect. On the contrary, we believe if anything, the proper way to deal with the situation is to lighten taxation. This does not only apply to the non-native communities, as we consider that at the present time and under existing conditions the native is taxed up to his full capacity if not beyond. Sir Phillip Cunliffe-Lister talked about specific proposals which could be proved to show a financial return. Several such proposals, we understand, been put forward by the Economic Development Committee, most of which proposals entail increased expenditure. How can such increased expenditure be incurred so long as the Government of Kenya work under a system of committing itself to expenditure (largely unproductive) up to the maximum limit of very optimistic estimates of revenue?

The cash position also is very serious and must not be lost sight of.

Taking, therefore, a broad outlook, we consider that we shall not become financially sound, nor can we hope to embark in the near future upon the too-long deferred programme of productive development unless we reduce our present overhead expenditure by at least £130,000, but we should go so far as to suggest by £180,000.

During the deliberations of the Committee we stressed the foregoing opinion. The Chairman asked for detailed suggestions as to how, in our opinion, such large reductions could be brought about. He further intimated that possibly His Excellency the Governor might consider appointing a Committee to enquire into the effects of any such suggestions during the course of 1935, and that such elimination of services or substitution of a more modest structure could be put into force at a later date. We consider that the position is too critical to permit of further delay. If a Committee were appointed with terms of reference instructing them to reduce expenditure by £180,000 at least that would probably meet with our views; but a Committee only instructed to enquire into the effects of such reductions would, as we know from experience, merely result in a report explaining that expenditure was prohibitive or that the suggested reductions would shatter the structure that has been built up with such care. We therefore ask whether Government would first accept the principle that such a reduction was imperative, and then without delay take steps to decide as to ways and means whereby such adequate reduction could be accomplished.

The Chairman was unable to accept this principle on behalf of Government. We therefore came to the conclusion that as a complete fundamental difference of opinion had arisen on a question of principle, no useful purpose would be served by our insisting to propose for a series of petty reductions or increases of expenditure, and we decided no longer to attend the meetings of the Standing Finance Committee so long as it was considering the Draft Expenditure Estimates for 1935.

As Members of the Standing Finance Committee, we were naturally prepared to put forward suggestions for effecting further drastic economies, only, however, tentatively, pending the acceptance of the principle that such considerable reductions in expenditure were absolutely essential. In broad terms our suggestions are—

1. That very considerable reductions could be made in the Public Works Department by confining, to a large extent, its activities to operations. This would probably entail making arrangements for work which

cannot be given out to contract and which would at present, in the ordinary course of events, be carried out by the Central Workshops and Timber Seasoning Branch, to be carried out by the Kenya and Uganda Railway; and handing over some of their accountancy work to the Treasury.

2. We consider that considerable reductions could be made in the total vote to the Agricultural Department and efficiency increased by various adjustments, notably in connection with veterinary field services.

3. We consider that further substantial economies could be effected by adopting Mr. Rupert Hemsted's scheme for the administration of the Northern Frontier Province and the military defence thereof.

4. As regards other Departments, we consider that a percentage cut on expenditure should be enforced. Such cuts would, of course, have to be variable as, in some Departments such as the Treasury and the Police, no reductions of this nature could be made.

5. We consider that renewed representations should be made to the Secretary of State for further consideration of the Colonial loan position. It is possible that he might, in collaboration with the Treasury in England, be induced to consider the conversion of current East African, or possibly of all current Colonial loans, into a consolidated Reserve loan, at current interest rate, carrying, however, the attraction of the Imperial Government guarantee, and possibly unencumbered by sinking fund proviso.

6. Should these measures not prove sufficient, it is suggested either that normal increments of pay of Civil Servants above a certain scale of salary might have to be temporarily held up, or that further levies on salaries upwards of £600 might have to be made.

We put forward the foregoing as being practical methods which might be adopted without seriously damaging the Government machine as a whole. The list, however, by no means exhausts possible lines of economy we have in mind.

We regret having been forced to follow the line we have, but, holding the views we do so strongly, we felt that it was impossible for us to associate ourselves in any way with the Estimates for 1955 as presented by Government. In our opinion, the views expressed in this Minority Report go to the very root of the question of solving the problem of the recovery of Kenya's financial position.

SUMMARY

Preface

The Estimates deal with gross expenditure, the authority of the Legislature being necessary to the expenditure of the total amount, whether or not part of it is met by reimbursements from other sources on whose behalf the expenditure is incurred.

Certain additions to both sides of the Kenya budget are also made for accounting purposes. The cost of services rendered by one Government department to another appear in some cases in the departmental Estimates of Expenditure and a similar amount is credited to Revenue.

The prefatory schedule shows that a sum of £1,079,759 appears for the above reason on both sides of the budget.
