The results are very interesting &  
I have analyzed them in greater detail  
on the attached sheet.

The points which emerge are  
these - (what)

1. Where the maize/farmers have  
repaid their advances, they ~~did it~~  
mostly in 1931 & 1932. They have not  
done much since.

3. Of cases still outstanding the  
coffee ~~are~~ farmers are in the  
majority at the good end of the  
scale & the maize farmers at  
the bad end.

2. Where the coffee farmers have  
repaid their advances they have  
done so at no particular time  
except that 1933 & 1935 were bad  
years. In 1935 it was only coffee  
farmers who repaid.

4. There is a rather surprisingly  
high proportion of failures by  
coffee farmers, but a study of  
individual cases show that they were  
mostly due to exceptional circumstances,  
e.g. personal failures or coffee disease.

The conclusions are not as clear  
as I had hoped, but on the whole  
they tend to support coffee against  
other crops.

Just to show the Govt. that we have  
used his staff we might send out  
a short despatch on these lines.

The amounts of the mortgages <sup>at</sup> ~~are~~ <sup>are</sup> very large  
in some cases on the crop areas. Still land in Kenya  
was valuable in 1929-30-31 so we can't criticize  
as we don't know the people & the area.

I agree that these statements are  
interesting, but it is almost impossible to draw any  
definite conclusions from the data available. This is  
mainly due to the fact that the statements can hardly  
be said to cover truly representative examples of the  
different industries. The scheme was designed to  
help the weak vessels - viz. those whose credit had  
been exhausted or whom it was thought to be desirable  
to maintain on the land. They could therefore hardly  
be looked upon as representative examples of the  
industries and they also do not represent randomized  
examples spread over the several districts.

It is known that only a fair proportion  
of coffee in Kenya is on land which is marginal  
for that crop and there are not in the course of the  
Sotik district - from a certain point of view - being  
unsuitable for arabica coffee.

The most useful lesson learned from this  
experiment made by the Agricultural Advances Scheme as  
they indicated in paragraph 14 of the review given by  
the Chairman of the Board, viz. that short term advances  
on the security of a crop should be confined to  
expenditure connected with the production of the crop.

3. GOV. KENYA.....659.....10/12/36  
 Request approval by telegram of the proposals indicated for the continuance of the Agricultural Advances Scheme in 1937 and attaches copy of a Report by the Board on the administration of the scheme for the eleven months ending the 30.11.36.

It is clear that the Agricultural Advances Scheme cannot be wound up for the time being, and I think it must be accepted that the proposed advance of £7,401 to the 15 selected cases in 1937 is most necessary. Incidentally there are only 12 cases shown in the schedules in which advances for 1937 are recommended, and the total sum involved amounts to £7,240. The 13th case may be that of Mr. T. G. Clayton, Class A VI, marked "still under cobson".

I think, too, that the proposed writing off of £5,168.9.95 in respect of the four debts described in paragraph 17 of the report is inevitable.

It is noteworthy that during the year a total of 21,183 (principal £467, interest £116) was repaid by debtors under category B IV, 3 & 4 cases where results have been disappointing and where no further advances would be justified, but where time should be given to the farmer to make other arrangements if he can, in the bare hope that the Board may recover more than if they took immediate action.

the receipt of Sir Joseph Byrne's despatch No. 659 of the 10th of December forwarding proposals for the continuance of the Agricultural Advances Scheme in 1937, and to confirm my telegram No. 5 of the 8th of January in which I <sup>had</sup> intimated that I approved his proposals:-

- (a) that the Central Agricultural Advances Board should be authorized to make advances in 1937 to 13 cases in Classes A. II, A. IV, A. V, and A. VI to the extent of £7,401;
- (b) that the Board should be authorized to incur necessary expenditure on

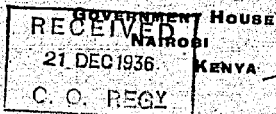

With reference to your predecessor's despatch No. 210 of the 31st March, regarding the Agricultural Advances Scheme, I have the honour to request your approval of the following proposals for the continuance of the Scheme in the year 1937:-

(a) that the Central Agricultural Advances Board should be authorized to make advances in 1937 to 13 cases in Classes A II, A IV, A V and A VI to the extent of £7,401;

(b) that the Board should be authorized to incur necessary expenditure on administration not exceeding £1,000 in 1937, and that a sum of £3,000 be placed at the disposal of the Board to meet unforeseen emergencies; and

(c) that advances to the extent of £6,168.95 in principal and interest be written off as recovered.

Report

These proposals are contained in a Report, of which a copy is enclosed by the Board on the administration of the scheme for the eleven months ending the 30th November. The Report shows that during this period a sum of £7,596 has been advanced and a sum of £12,289 received in principal and interest, and that the excess of revenue over expenditure during the period in the Revenue and Expenditure Account amounted to £3,475.

INTERIM REPORT OF THE LAND AND AGRICULTURAL BANK OF KENYA

1ST. JANUARY TO 30TH. NOVEMBER, 1956.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR

Your Excellency,

I have the honour to submit, on behalf of the Board, the following report for the period January 1st. to November 30th. 1956, together with the reviews and recommendations of the Board in regard to the future operations of the Agricultural Advances Scheme.

2. Complete statements of accounts for the year will be submitted as soon as completion of the Audit permits after the closing of the books at December 31st. 1956.

Meanwhile, this Report is submitted in the hope that an early decision upon the Board's recommendations may be received by cable in order that continuity of farming operations may not be disturbed by delay in advising participants of the arrangements authorized for 1957.

3. No amending legislation affecting the operation of the scheme has been passed since the date of the last report.

4. A definition of the classes into which accounts are placed is given below:-

CLASS A. II: Farmers who may be expected to pay advances in full if assistance continued.

CLASS A. IV: Doubtful cases where results have been disappointing which, however, show prospects of recovery in time, but where the farmer will certainly go under if not assisted further.

- CLASS A.V. : Cases governed by special considerations where the commitment to the Board is large and where recovery depends on production being maintained.
- CLASS A.VI : Cases formerly included in B.II who had made arrangements with merchant houses for finance, the sudden cessation of which at the end of 1935 necessitated the resumption of advances by the Board.
- CLASS B. I : Cases where repayment will be made in full during the coming year without further advances.
- CLASS B.II : Cases where arrangements have been or will be made with merchant houses to finance future operations on terms satisfactory to the Board.
- CLASS B.III: Cases where no further advances are required or recommended, but in which time should be given for repayment with a reasonable hope of eventual recovery.
- CLASS B.IV : Cases where results have been disappointing and where no further advances would be justified, but where time should be given to the farmer to make other arrangements if he can, in the bare hope that the Board may recover more than if they took immediate action.
- CLASS B. V : Definitely bad cases where the Board recommend realisation when a favourable opportunity occurs.

ADVANCES 1936. 5. The recommendations made by the Board in their Report for 1935 for the continuance of operations in 1936 were approved by the Secretary of State as follows :-

- (a) Advances to 24 cases (Classes A.II, A.IV, A.V and A.VI) £10,659.15.00
- (b) Administration Expenses not exceeding 1,000
- (c) Against unforeseen emergencies 5,000

The total authorised expenditure therefore was £14,659.15.00

6. Of the advances authorised above (£10,659.15.00) £7596.14.56 had been issued to participants up to November 30th. 1936 leaving a balance of £3065.00.44 available to them for the month of December.

7. Of the £8000 authorised for unforeseen

emergencies £297.9.50 had been issued up to November 30th, 1953 authorised by the Board as under :-

EXPENSES:

12. For the eleven months ending November 30th, 1956, Administration Expenses were £242,9.76 compared with £229,7.60 for the twelve months ending December 31st, 1955.

COLLECTIONS:

15. During the period January 1st. - November 30th, 1956 interest collections from participants amounted to £4274.8.45 and £51,9.00 was gained on the Bank account with the National Bank of India. Accruals in respect of the Debts previously written off amounted to £12,8.00. The gross revenue therefore amounted to £4318,2.43 and after deducting Administration Expenses £242,9.76 the net revenue accruing to the Treasury is £3475,12.67 of which £1615,5.00 has been paid to the Treasury for the period January 1st. - September 30th, 1956 and it is expected that as the participants materialise, a further sum of approximately £2000 will be paid to the Treasury in respect of October-December.

PRESERVE CASH POSITION:

14. The balance at the National Bank of India on November 30th, 1956 was £273,15.85.

13. If the retention of the principal sum by the Agents and the release of sums received during 1957 is authorised, it is hoped that no call will be made on the Treasury. The position, however, is more indefinite than as at this time last year owing to the introduction of the new Class (A.VI) involving the possibility of greater imposts upon the contingencies item of £2000.

**RECOMMENDATION:** 19. The Board now seek authority :

Sir,

With reference to your predecessor's despatch No. 210 of the 31st March, regarding the Agricultural Advances Scheme, I have the honour to request your approval of the following proposals for the continuance of the Scheme in the year 1937:-

- (a) that the Central Agricultural Advances Board should be authorized to make advances in 1937 to 15 cases in Classes A II, A IV, A V and A VI to the extent of £7,401;
- (b) that the Board should be authorized to incur necessary expenditure on administration not exceeding £1,000 in 1937, and that a sum of £5,000 be placed at the disposal of the Board to meet unforeseen emergencies; and
- (c) that advances totalling £6,165.9.95 in principal and interest be written off as irrecoverable.

2. These proposals are contained in a Report, of which a copy is enclosed, by the Board on the administration of the scheme for the eleven months ending the 30th November. The Report shows that during this period a sum of £7,596 has been advanced and a sum of £12,229 received in principal and interest, and that the excess of revenue over expenditure during the period in the Revenue and Expenditure Account amounted to £3,475.

Your Excellency,

I have the honour to submit, on behalf of the Board, the following report for the period January 1st. to November 30th, 1956, together with the reviews and recommendations of the Board in regard to the future operations of the Agricultural Advances Scheme.

2. Complete statements of accounts for the year will be submitted as soon as completion of the Audit permits after the closing of the books at December 31st. 1956.

Especially, this Report is submitted in the hope that an early decision upon the Board's recommendations may be received by you in order that continuity of farming operations may not be disturbed by delay in advising participants of the arrangements authorized for 1957.

5. No amending legislation affecting the operation of the scheme has been passed since the date of the last report.

DEFINITION OF CLASSES

4. A definition of the classes into which accounts are placed is given below :-

CLASS A.II : Farmers who may be expected to pay advances in full if assistance continued.

CLASS A.IV : Doubtful cases where results have been disappointing which, however, show prospects of recovery in time, but where the farmer will certainly go under if not assisted further.
