Requests telegraphic approval of creation of two posts of Senior Agricultural Officer and promotion thereto of Mr. J. Lyne Watt and Mr. J. J. Leckie.

It is true that Sir Alan Pim's proposed reorganisation of the Agricultural Department envisaged the creation of three posts of Senior Agricultural Officer. The Governor proposes, however, to create only two ~~such~~-posts. But we are given no hint in the despatch as to the Governor proposes to deal with the other aspects of Sir A. Pim's staff recommendations. These are summarised in pages 146-148 of his Report. It will be seen that as regards the Agricultural Officers, when Sir A. Pim reported, the staff consisted of 20. He recommended that there should be a total of 18 including the three Senior Agricultural Officers. He also recommended that the cadre of Assistant Agricultural Officers should be increased from 4 to 8.

The Governor says that there are 19 existing posts of Agricultural Officer. This agrees with the current Estimates. ~~Two of the 19 are Senior Agricultural Officers~~

The creation of the post of Senior Agricultural Officer will undoubtedly increase the efficiency of the organisation and there seems no reason to withhold approval of the two new posts recommended by the Governor. Mr. Watt and Mr. Leckie are well reported on. The latter is the better of the two, and was recently offered the post of Agricultural, Educational and Research Officer in Palestine (£300-800). Africa adopt the proposed new salary scales.

familiar with the present position regarding
East African colonies, but I do know that
agricultural officers in Kenya have petitioned
for their salary scale to be extended to £8750.
I am, therefore, passing this paper through the
Jeffries for advice as to what should be said
on the salary issue.

I also could not accept that the senior
agricultural officers can be the limit of such
posts in Kenya. I am anticipating approximately
three posts of your rank posts - 3 for
coastal areas - the two now proposed + 1
for the inland area (this is the recommendation
in the Pim report) and 1 for the European
areas. I am certain that this latter post
will in time be found to be necessary. I
do not press, however, for such a position
now as the men, with the necessary seniority
& experience, are not available. There are
only two men in Kenya suitable to fill
these senior posts at the present time, but
in agreeing with the positions now

Secondly, it is necessary to indicate that the creation of two further senior posts will be necessary at a later stage. The ratio of senior posts in West Africa has been accepted at a figure around 25% & on this basis the senior posts in the Dept. of Agriculture in Kenya will be about eight.

I have the honour to seek your approval of the creation of two posts of Senior Agricultural Officer in the Department of Agriculture in this Colony, as from the 1st June next, in substitution for two posts of Agricultural Officer provided for under Item 121 of Head III of the Colony's current Estimates.

2. This proposal was foreshadowed in Kenya telegram No. 63 of the 13th April on the subject of the Palestine appointment offered to Mr. Leckie, Agricultural Officer, to which your despatch No. 269 of the 29th March referred, and, as you are no doubt aware from correspondence which took place in 1930 and 1931, the proposal is not a new one, but has remained in abeyance largely owing to the state of the Colony's finances in recent years and to the necessity of reaching a decision on the various recommendations contained in Sir Alan Pim's Report.

3. It will be observed that in paragraph 251 of his Report, Sir Alan Pim advocated the appointment of a Chief Agricultural Officer for each Province who would frame and control policy in co-ordination with the Provincial Commissioner. Later in his Report Sir Alan Pim refers to these posts as Senior Agricultural Officers.



years ago to the placing of the three Agricultural Officers in charge of the work on the native side in the three Provinces in which services for native agriculture are given, the Central, Nyanza and Coast Provinces. It is considered, however, that promotion to these posts should not of necessity be restricted to officers employed in native services. There are nineteen existing posts of "Agricultural Officer or Agricultural Officer and Experimentalist", of whom fourteen work in native areas and five in European areas. In theory these are interchangeable, but in practice interchanging rarely takes place owing to the specialised nature of the duties of those employed in European areas.

4. It is true that Sir Alan Pim recommended the creation of three posts of Senior Agricultural Officer, but I am satisfied that for the present two posts only should be created and that this will be in due proportion to the total establishment of Agricultural Officers and Experimentalists. It is proposed that the two senior Agricultural Officers should be appointed to the Central and Nyanza Provinces, and it is clear that the duties of these two posts are more onerous and involve far greater responsibilities than that of the officer in charge of agricultural activities in the Coast Province.

5. It is proposed that the salary scale for the two posts should be £720 x £30 to £840.

6. I trust that you will see no objection to the creation of these posts in which case I recommend the promotion thereto of the two most senior Agricultural Officers, Mr. W. Lyng Watt, M.B.B.S., and Mr. W.G. Leckie,
