Trs. Petition from Mr. Sultan Ali for grant of pensionable status. Comments thereon but in view of the circumstances indicated is unable to support the Petition.

The details of the petitioner's service are as follows:-

Uganda Railway .....	1. 7.1896 - 30. 9.1898
	1. 8.1899 - 31. 5.1902.
Compounder .....	17. 6.1902 - 31.12.1929.
Issuer of Medical Stores .....	1. 1.1930 to date.

The petitioner asks that he may be granted pensionable status as personal to himself. The post of "Compounder", which he held for nearly 23 years, was never gazetted as a pensionable office.

At the date of his promotion to "Issuer of Medical Stores" he was warned in writing that the post to which he was being promoted was not pensionable. At that time there were three posts of "Issuer of Medical Stores" but only two were pensionable. The petitioner was promoted to the non-pensionable post. By an accident all three posts were starred in the estimates for 1930 and 1931 as pensionable. The position was corrected however in subsequent estimates.

Had the Local Asian Civil Service not been created I have no doubt that Mr. Sultan Ali would have been accorded pensionable status, but one of the chief reasons for the inauguration of the new Service was to reduce the Colony's pensions commitments. In view then of the Governor's definite recommendation against the award of a pension it is difficult to argue that special treatment should be accorded to the petitioner. (See in this connection Mr. Flood's minute flagged A on 25179/54).

The post of "Issuer of Medical Stores" has now been definitely scheduled to the Local Asian Civil Service (see Appendix III of Kenya Secretariat Circular No. 15 of 1935, copy herewith), and the Government has granted the petitioner the full benefits of the Asian Local Civil Service Provident Fund, i.e. an amount has been put to his credit representing the arrears of contributions payable by Government from the first day of his established service up to the 1st May, 1935, the date of the inauguration of the new Service. On retirement this amount will be paid to him, plus a gratuity amounting in all to not less than £550.

The Governor points out that there are a number of non-pensionable officers such as the petitioner who have long and faithful service to their credit but who, on retirement, will not be eligible for a pension.

In the circumstances ? acknowledge and ask Governor to cause the petitioner to be informed that the S. of S. has considered his petition and is not prepared to intervene.

I agree that there is no case for intervention. The post of Compounder was never pensionable, & when he was made Issuer he was definitely warned that he w<sup>d</sup>. not be given pensionable status in that post. The fact that the post of Issuer was at one time starred without limitation gave him no rights in any case; he could have a claim if he had been confirmed in that post whatever the Estimator said, but not having been confirmed, he has no claim under the law. The half-promises held out that if he liked to retire in 1928 he w<sup>d</sup>. be considered specially but their force when he chose not to retire. He will receive what to an Indian subordinate must be a substantial sum when he retires.

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit a petition addressed to you by Mr. Sultan Ali, Issuer of Medical Stores, Medical Department, for the grant of pensionable status as personal to himself in view of his long and meritorious service over a period of more than 30 years.

Petition.

2. Mr. Ali served in the Uganda Railway Administration from the 1st July, 1896, to the 30th September, 1898, and again from the 1st August, 1899, to the 31st May, 1902, presumably as a Compounder though the records available do not establish this.

He was engaged as a Compounder in the Medical Department on the 17th June, 1902, from which date his service has been continuous.

On the 1st January, 1930, he was promoted to the non-pensionable post of Issuer of Medical Stores in circumstances set out in paragraph 4 below.

3. The post of Compounder which Mr. Ali held for some 27 years has never been accorded pensionable status although the Inter-Departmental Committee, which was appointed in 1925 to consider the terms of service for Asians other than clerks, recommended that three posts of Compounders should be accorded pensionable status. The Report of that Committee was transmitted to the Secretary of State under cover of

Kenya Confidential despatch No.170 of the 14th December, 1926, but as the result of consultations with the neighbouring Governments a superior scale of salary to that recommended by the Sub-Committee for Compounders was introduced with effect from the 1st January, 1927, without pensionable status - vide correspondence ending in Mr.Amery's despatch Confidential (2) of the 9th July, 1927.

Prior to the introduction of the new scale the scale then in force for Compounders was £90 by £6 to £144 per annum which converted into £150 by £12 to £216 per annum so that it will be seen that Mr.Ali received a considerable addition to his emoluments when the new scale was introduced.

4. The post of Issuer of Medical Stores, to which the petitioner was promoted in 1930, was pensionable before the issue of Secretariat Circular No.50 of 1927 and it will be observed from paragraph 8 of the Circular that the general question of pensionable posts was at the time of its issue under review. The Circular continues "It is observed, however, that certain of the posts held by these employees (Asians other than clerks) are pensionable. These posts will be treated as non-pensionable except in the case of present holders who have been accorded pensionable status". In view of the terms of this instruction Mr.Ali on promotion to the post of Issuer of Medical Stores with effect from the 1st January, 1930, was warned in writing that the post to which he was receiving promotion was not pensionable.

5. It will be observed that the petitioner's

claim

claim to pensionable status is based partly on the grounds that in 1930 and 1931 the posts of Issuer of Medical Stores were starred in the Estimates for those years. It will be seen that in the 1930 Estimates an additional post of Issuer of Medical Stores was created; but, through what appears to have been an oversight at the time, no explanatory note was inserted in the Estimates to indicate that the new post, in accordance with the terms of Secretariat Circular No.50 of 1927, could not carry pensionable status, and in consequence all the three posts were starred as pensionable. This error was repeated in the 1931 Estimates but appears to have been detected during 1931 and the necessary alteration was made in the 1932 Estimates from which it will be observed that only one post was pensionable.

Between 1930 and 1932 there was a further change in the holder of one of these posts and a non-pensionable officer was appointed thereto.

Despite this mistake in the compilation of the Estimates for 1930 and 1931, I am satisfied that there can have been no misconception whatever in the mind of the petitioner as to his pensionable status on promotion. The warning in writing referred to in paragraph 4 made the position clear to him.

6. Subsequent to the enactment of the Non-European Officers' Pensions Ordinance, 1932, it was necessary to gazette the post of Issuer of Medical Stores as a pensionable office (vide Government Notice No.331 of the 1st May, 1934) in order to safeguard the individual pension rights of the remaining Issuer of Medical Stores who had been accorded pensionable status

With the exception of a Storekeeper in the Police Department, whose case is dealt with below, the posts referred to in the petition, as having been accorded pensionable status are those which were recommended for such status by the Committee referred to in paragraph 3 above; vide correspondence terminating with Kenya despatch No.593 of the 19th October, 1933.

Mr.Kala Khan, the Storekeeper in question, was awarded a compassionate pension prior to the promulgation of the Non-European Officers' Pensions Ordinance, 1932, Lord Passfield's despatch No.39 of the 21st January, 1931, refers.

8. In this connection it is pertinent to remark that when the Non-European Officers' Pensions Bill was under consideration by Legislative Council an undertaking was given by the Treasurer that applications for compassionate pensions such as that awarded to Mr.Kala Khan would not be considered in future after the Bill was enacted.

9. There are a number of non-pensionable officers, such as the petitioner, who have long and faithful service to their credit but who on retirement will not be eligible for pension. In this connection I would refer you to the Colonial Secretary's Note No. S/Est. 19/1/2004/22 of the 8th March, 1935, from which it will be noted that Mr.Abdulla Khan who rendered over 30 years service has on retirement been awarded only a gratuity.

10. It will be observed that the question of the grant of pensionable status to Mr.Ali has been dealt with at some length in paragraph VI of my Confidential despatch No.97 of the 30th June, 1934. His claim for pensionable

pensionable status has been fully investigated in all its aspects and in the circumstances I am satisfied that he has no case for pension.

I would add that he is over 50 years of age and that, in view of his long and faithful service, he has been accorded special treatment and has been allowed to join the Kenya Asian Local Civil Service, and notwithstanding the terms of paragraph 21 (1) (b) of Secretariat Circular No.15 of the 18th May, 1935, he has been allowed to remain in that Service after the attainment of the age of 55 years. In addition he has, as a special case, been permitted to become a participator in the Asian Civil Service Provident Fund, which has resulted in Government paying into his Provident Fund Account some £350 or more in arrears. Should he, therefore, leave the Service, for example, at the end of next year this sum, together with its accretions to the date of his retirement, will be paid to him, in addition to a gratuity under Section 10 (1) of the Asian Civil Service Provident Fund Ordinance, 1934, in respect of his 34 years' service, the aggregate of which, it is anticipated, will amount to no less than £550; a not inconsiderable sum to an officer of his status.

11. In view of the foregoing, therefore, I am unable to recommend the petition for your favourable consideration.

Sir,

I most respectfully beg to petition you with the request that I may be granted pensionable status as personal to me, in view of the facts below set forth.

I am the most senior subordinate in the Medical Department. I was appointed in the Uganda Railway in 1896 and my services in the Medical Department dates from 1902. In course of my service, I have been in sole Medical charge of Lumbwa Expedition; one year at Nyeri; one year at Naivasha (then Provincial Headquarters); five years at Kitui and one year at Kabarnet. The other stations at which I have served are Kisumu, Fort-Hall, Embu, Kakamega and General Dispensary, Nairobi; 1923 to 1929. During these periods I was highly recommended by various Senior Medical Officers and Medical Officers for the promotion to the grade of Sub-Assistant Surgeon. In 1929 I was transferred to the Medical Stores, Nairobi, and was selected for the post of Medical Stores Issuer from 1st January 1930. It would not be out of place to mention here that the Issuers employed before me were pensionable.

In 1926 I received a letter NO.P/446 of 20-5-1926 in which I was given to understand that the question of my post being made pensionable had been referred to the Government.

In 1928 a letter NO.A.I.5/19 of 28th September 1928, intimated to me that I was recommended for pensionable status.

In November 1928 I received a letter NO.A.I.3/5 Vol.II of 15th November 1928, stating that the general question of pensions was still under consideration and my case must remain in abeyance for the present.

In December 1928 I received a letter NO.N.I.3/9 Vol.2 saying that if I desire to retire in the meantime my case might be submitted to Government for special consideration. Here I may mention that I was not in a position to retire owing to my (young children) large family, but similar cases to mine who were in a position to retire viz: 2 Sub-Foremen (illiterate Fundis) and one Issuer Police Department Stores availed themselves of this opportunity and were granted pensions. Had I been in a position to retire my case also would have received similar consideration.

In 1932 I received a letter NO.A.I.3/4 Vol.II dated 29th June 1932, informing me that the question of according me pensionable status was to be held over until the Non-European Pensions Bill become law.

In 1933 I received a letter NO.S/Est.19/I/34/50 to the effect that His Excellency the Acting Governor regretted that he felt he could not intervene in the matter.

In the Official Gazette NO.22 (Vol. XXXVI) of 1st May 1934, the Issuers of Medical Stores were Gazetted as pensionable.

On 20th June 1935 I had an interview with Hon: Dr. A.R. Paterson D.M.S. regarding this matter. The result of this interview was disclosed to me on 25th October 1935 and was to the effect that the Local Government does not approve of putting me on pensionable status.

Apparently, the main objection to my being on pensionable status is that, in my letter of appointment to the post of Issuer of Medical Stores are non-pensionable vide para:8, of Secretariat Circular NO.50 of 1927.

I beg to submit respectfully that the para:8 of Secretariat Circular NO.50 of 1927 of my letter of appointment should not in any way prejudice my case as that was sheer oversight vide letter NO.38/1165/46 dated 19th Oct., 1928.

I beg to further to inform you that in the Estimates for 1950 and 1951, which were passed by the Local Government of Kenya and approved by the Secretary of State for the Colonies, all Issuers of Medical Stores were shewn pensionable. In the Estimates of 1952 however, only one post was shewn as pensionable, the holder of which is still serving.

I beg to still further inform you that repeated verbal promises of pensionable status were made to me by various responsible officers as far as back, as the Late Dr. MacDonald, and Dr. A. D. Milne, Senior Medical Officers and Medical Officers, Kenya. Over a number of years there has never been a definite decision regarding the promise that my case "would be considered when I retired". I humbly submit that there are cases on record to whom pensionable status are granted personal to them in consideration of their long and meritorious services, and I give as instances such cases Tailor Masters, Mason Masters, Carpenters, Sub-Foremen of Public Works Dept., (illiterate Fundis), Sub-Draughtsman, Sub-Surveyors, Sub-Inspectors of Post and Telegraph Dept., Dhow Inspector even Postmen, etc.

In view of the above mentioned facts, I very respectfully beg you to order a revision of my case and put me on a pensionable status. I now have served the Government for about 59 years. I am old and have a large family. I amply deserve a pensionable status. I hope, you will, Sir, redress my just grievance.

RE: NEW TERMS OF SERVICE.

SECRETARIAT CIRCULAR NO. 50 DATED JUNE, 1927.

At your interview on 16th instant with the Acting Deputy Director of Medical Services it is understood that the opinion you expressed with regard to the new conditions of Service, vide Secretariat Circular NO. 50 dated 7th June, 1927, is as follows:-

Your major objections to signing the Letter of Appointment were,

- (a) that Clause 3 of this Letter imposed peculiarly harsh terms upon Compounders whose service, in two instances at least, was over 25 years;
- (b) that the Compounders are apprehensive that if the Medical Stores Issuers who are at present non-clerical are included in the grading of posts under Secretariat Circular NO. 50, then the conditions as laid down in paragraph 8 of that Circular may have the effect of curtailing certain pension privileges already granted to Medical Store Issuers;
- (c) that it is considered that the scales of salary which have been recently granted have a direct origin from the Secretary of State and were introduced to place the Kenya Compounders on a par with their colleagues in Uganda and Tanganyika and were introduced independently of grading of posts and the scales laid down in Secretariat Circular NO. 50.

It was understood, also, that you wished if possible to remain under the old terms of Service, but to retain the salary as recently granted by the Secretary of State.

If this is impossible you would be willing to agree to the new terms of Service, if Clause 3 of the Letter of Appointment were altered from "one week's notice" to "one month's notice" and if paragraph 8 of Circular NO. 50 could be read without prejudice to any pensionable status or post to which you may be appointed, and if paragraph 3 (d) remains in accordance with Section 182, Code of Regulations.

Presumably you spoke on behalf of the other Compounders

Please confirm or otherwise these impressions as soon as possible.
