Sir.

I have the honour to inform you that at a seem t meeting of the Harbour Advisory Board a proposal was somedered for the grant of an Entertainment Allowance to the Port Manager, Mombasa. The Port Manager, in his official capacity, is responsible for carrying out courtesy duties when British or foreign naval vessels or distinguished persons visit the Port; and these duties frequently lead to a certain amount of social entertaining.

- 2. The Board recommended that an allowance of £100
 per annum should be granted to the Port Manager towards the
 expenditure incurred in this connexion; and this recommendation
 has subsequently received the endorsement of the General Manager.
- 3. As you are aware, however, the Previncial Commissioner, Coast Province, draws an entertainment allowance from the Government of Kenya of £100 per annum; and while I am satisfied that a good case exists for granting a similar allowance to the Port Manager, I am unable to admit that the calls upon his purse are as heavy as in the case of the Provincial Commissioner. I recommend for your approval that an Entertainment Allowance (non-pensionable) be paid from Railway and Harbour funds to the officer carrying out the duties of Port Manager, Mombasa, at the rate of £80 per annum, with effect from the 1st of April, 1958; and I shall be glad to receive your sanction for this proposal.

Paregraph 1.

(Say that, after consulting the Colonial Office Mr. Norman has been engaged).

Paragraph 2.

We think it desirable to observe that the procedure adopted in this case is not in accordance with that normally followed in cases where it is desired to engage Staff in this country. recognise that you have full authority to make appointments to posts of this character, but we feel that, when it is necessary to select a candidate in this country, it is desirable to conform to the procedure approved by the Secretary of State and generally followed by Colonial Governments. Under this procedure we are furnished with particulars of the vacancy which it is desired to full and requested to select a candidate for it. Generally speaking we are in a position to review a wider field of candidates than is evailable to an individual officer of the Railway, and consequently to maintain a higher standard of qualifications. In making the selection we are, of course, always glad to avail ourselves of the assistance of an officer of the Administration, when available, and also to receive information of any candidate who may be known to the Administration to be suitable.

The 1926 reorganisation of the Railway had been under active consideration ever since, in the spring of 1924, it had been realised that the practice, which had then been in force for some time, of absorbing profits on the Railway into the finances of Kenya was both unfair to Uganda and also conducive to neglect of adequate maintenance of the line. To remove these drawbacks it was decided to establish the Railway as a business unit independent of the finances of the two colonies.

How this was to be effected, and the formation which the new Railway constitution was to take, were subjects which required and received closest attention.

Among other points it was to be expected that the power and consideration of appointment to both subordinate and senior posts would have received consideration. It is, therefore, a little surprising to find the acting Governor of Kenya in april 1925 (21285/25) asking out of the blue for certain extra powers to deal with appointments and salary soale changes up to 2450 per annum. These powers were granted; which the seems reasonable extension of the special powers already given, to retain unail to current discuss us.

had been brought into operation, proposals were put forward both here and in Kenya for dealing with the question of appointment. It seems that both these

sets

sets of proposals (which crossed in the post) were worked out entirely "on their merits" - see, for example, Sir C. Bottomley's minute of 6/2/36 on X3210/26 which reads: "Make the new Transport Administration a peg for raising the general question of reporting Railway. changes". See also the second paragraph of the High Commissioner's despatch in X3675/26 in which he says:-T am not aware that any instructions have been issued in regard to the manner in which appointments should be reported to you; and I propose to adopt the following procedure". This procedure was accepted with a few modifications, and is that the appointment, promotion and discharge of officers who are not on first class appointments (i.e. who are non-pensionable) is entirely within the powers of the General Manager as delegated to him under the Order-in-Council by the High Commissioner: while the appointment of pensionable officers serving on a scale under £1,000 a year is similarly arranged. appointment and promotion of officers serving at over 21,000 a year require the sanction of the Secretary of State (see minute of 13/4/38 in 3814 Secretary of State's despatch in 3675/26).
