There is no need for me to lay stress on the qualifications of Sir Malcolm Watson in this respect as you yourself have had a first-hand opportunity of seeing the results of his work, in particular I may mention the saving of Fort Swettenham, when you visited the Malay States.

The value of anti-malaria work is borne out by the fact that private Companies in the Malay States elsewhere have realised that the initial cost of such work has an economic value which more than repays them. A good example of this I would draw your attention to the great support which we have been given by Companies with interests in Malaya to our newly formed Institute Industrial and Commercial Advisory Committee. Sir,

I have the honour to address you on the subject of the appointment of the three additional Resident Magistrates, provided for under Item 5 of Head XIII of Current Estimates.

2. My attention has been drawn by the Chief Justice for some time past to the desirability of replacing the lay Magistrates at important centres in settled areas by mag. trained and to deal with the many cases of increasing which the development of those areas produce. At the present time the duties of District Officers at places such as Eldoret, Nakuru and Kisumu are subject to intere numerous administrative duties upon to perform and are liable inadequate equipment of such officers legal training and qualification.

Mr. Lane was transferred from this Administration in 1923 to Zanzibar and was subsequently appointed as Magistrate in Tanganyika Territory in 1925. He applied in January 1927 for a transfer to Kenya as a Judicial Officer and the Chief Justice of Tanganyika Territory reported favourably on his abilities.

Mr. D. Edwards was called to the Administration in 1921 and since 1924 has carried out the duties of Registrar of the Supreme Court. He was called to the Scottish Bar in November, 1924.

Mr. Shaw is also a Barrister-at-Law and during twelve years service in the Indian Police performed the duties of a Magistrate of the First Class with limited powers for some four years at Calcutta.

Our weekly *Animals* feature published on February 1, we printed a paragraph headed "Hunting from the Air" and describing an airplane that was being built for Lieutenant Aboukir for the use of Lieutenant Commander Glen Kidston for an air tour of Kenya. It was stated that a special camera would be fitted to enable the pilot to take photographs of big game from the air, and that to facilitate his approach to them for the purpose of obtaining satisfactory photographs a pilot should be fitted to the engine exhaust. Unfortunately it was also stated that Lieutenant Commander Glen Kidston intended to employ big game from the air.

We are informed by the Commissioner of Customs, Messrs. Jacobson and Spyer, that the Kenyan Government has called his attention to statements of this kind published in English newspapers. We were that to shoot big game from the air would be unparliamentary and to use a special camera would be still more unparliamentary. We are sorry that the paragraph was so much severely worded, and we now take the best opportunity to correct any false impressions that may have been created. Commander Kidston is only using his airplane for photography, wild animals from the air, and never especially fitted for use for hunting and shooting game.

"GAME HUNT BY AIRPLANE".

In our issue of the 14th January, 1930, we published an article headed as above referring to Lieut.-Commander Glen Kidston. It has been suggested to us that our article, read in conjunction with articles in other papers published at the same time, might be construed as meaning that Commander Kidston intended to shoot wild beasts from an airplane.

We cannot think that this could be so, particularly in the case of such a well-known sportsman as Commander Kidston. We thought that our article made it quite plain that Commander Kidston's intention was merely to photograph wild animals from an airplane. To remove any possible misapprehension we have pleasure in stating that our article never intimated anything about shooting.

Another interesting trip has been arranged by Lieutenant-Commander Glen Kidston, R.N. His machine is shortly to be shipped to Aboukir, from which town he will fly south to Kenya, where he intends both to shoot and to photograph big game from the air, his machine being equipped with a small engine camera and a special engine. 100

Sheeping Big Game from a Moth

An aerial big game sheepling and photographing expedition to Kenya is planned by Lieutenant-Commander Glen Kidston R.N. His Moth, G-AAIV, has just been shipped to Aboukir, from which town Lieutenant-Commander Kidston will fly south to Kenya. The machine is equipped with a small Eagle camera, and a special silencer to lessen the sound of his engine, so that the animals may not be prematurely started.

Dear Sir,

Thank you for letting me have a copy of the De Havilland Gazette reporting the proposed aerial big game shooting and photographing expedition planned by Commander Glen Kidston, R.N.

Over a year ago the Colonial Office received information as to a projected aeroplane expedition under Commander Glen Kidston to Kenya, and it then appeared that he proposed to shoot game from the air. The Governor of Kenya was notified and asked to consider taking action under the local legislation which empowers him to prohibit and regulate methods of hunting, killing or capturing which are deemed to be unduly destructive. So far as I know, the expedition did not reach Kenya; and I cannot say what steps the Governor had actually decided to take on its arrival. I shall telegraph to him at once warning him of this new expedition to which you have drawn my attention and enquiring
