My Lord,

I have the honour to refer to the following extract from page five of African No. 973 "Regulations for the Employment of Officers in the E.A. Dependencies":-

"(iii). In Kenya, any officer, whose salary does not exceed £500 a year, wishing his wife to accompany him to the Colony on first appointment, or to join him before he has served for six months, must obtain permission from the Governor. The officer should himself apply for this permission if he is not in Kenya at the time, direct to the Colonial Secretary, Nairobi, or, if in Kenya at the time, through the Head of his Department."

2. This suggestion has the support of the Senior Commissioners who at their Meeting in July last passed the following Resolution:-

"That this meeting considers that Administrative Officers should be instructed that they cannot be accompanied by their wives during their first tour."

3. Your Lordship will readily appreciate that the difficulties of posting young Administrative Officers in this Colony are greatly complicated when to other considerations are added those of wives and families, particularly in view of the fact that there are many stations at which the accommodation available for cadets is not adequate for a married man.

4. Moreover quite apart from general posting difficulties the conditions of administrative service which include the obligation to pass at an early date examinations in law and languages, constant touring among the native populations and the necessity of acquiring by personal contact an understanding of native mentality, habits and customs, all combine to render it desirable that a cadet in the early stages of his career should have his mobility unhampered.

5. There may be difficulties in very exceptional circumstances which the Governor could dispose of on their merits but it should be understood that ordinarily permission for wives to accompany Cadets during their first tours will be withheld.

6. Mr. Morrison, the Chairman of the Tropical African Services Course at Oxford, was asked during his recent visit to this Colony whether in his opinion my proposal if adopted, would adversely affect recruiting for the Administration and he replied that in his opinion it would not. If Your Lordship is able to confirm this opinion of Mr. Morrison, I shall be grateful if effect may forthwith be given to my proposal.
