Sir John Campbell has now returned, and
it will no doubt be desired to send the paper to
him in order that he may record his views on the
general financial situation which I believe he
regards as extremely serious. No doubt Kenya has
realised by now that the presumption that prices will
not necessarily continue throughout 1931 as low
as during 1930 is far too optimistic. Still, it
would appear necessary to include in the despatch
on the Estimates some fairly strong remarks on the
need for economy.

There is a separate correspondence now
proceeding about the need for conserving - or rather
building up - surplus balances, and reference to
it will no doubt be necessary in the Estimates
despatch.

? Telegraph approval of the Estimates with
such remarks on the general situation as Sir John
Campbell thinks it desirable to include in the
telegram, and ? follow this up by a despatch
amplifying these remarks and enclosing a copy of
the memorandum herewith.

As regards paragraph 6 of the O.A.G.'s

over the Select Committee, and note with satisfac-

I am afraid that there are no indications that the period of depression has come to an end, or that the downward trend generally has been arrested. Prices continue to drop sharply: the rate is as rapid as before. All the indices point in the same direction, and they do not suggest that any flattening out of the downward curve is in sight. Prices, shipping indices, production indices, car-loading indices, traffic returns, provincial clearings of the banks, the import and export figures, the statistics of unemployment, here, in Germany and the United States, telegraph traffic returns--all tell the same tale, and nowhere (except as regards ^{two} ~~one~~ points referred to immediately below) are there any indications that the depression is ending. Recently--during the last two weeks--there has been some slight improvement in the prices of certain primary products; and the stock markets, here and in America, indicate that a more favourable view is taken as to the immediate prospects of some of the more important industrial concerns. Apart from these two indications (the importance of which should certainly not be exaggerated, for a variety of reasons) there are no indications whatever that the depression is ending. On the contrary, all the statistical evidence, and the general trend of informed opinion, seems to be that it is continuing unabated. It is thought that the heavy drop in prices must shortly bring its own remedy; but it is admitted that there are no signs of this yet. On the other hand, and except in cases (such as wheat, maize, rubber, etc, where existing known stocks are very high relative to consumption)

the general view seems to be that wholesale and retail dealers, manufacturers, etc., are working with the absolute minimum of stocks, and that a revival of demand would probably lead to a fairly rapid increase in prices. Further, it is ~~felt~~ generally, that the financial effects of the depression are likely to be more severely felt in 1931 than in 1930.

2. In these circumstances, we can hardly insist too strongly on the need for caution and economy in the financial administration of the Colony during 1931. The results to date will perhaps reinforce and emphasise the importance of this, and enable some kind of very rough quantitative estimate to be formed of the probable financial position during the rest of the year. The revenue returns will have to be very closely watched: the basis on which they have been framed seems unquestionably much too optimistic. The balance is undoubtedly at a dangerously low figure, which again intensifies the need for caution and rigid economy. I personally do not think that the 1930 revenue will be reached in 1931, and I am ~~extremely~~ apprehensive that there may even be a rapid and serious slump in the revenue.

I think we should draw attention to the absolute necessity for a running comparison with the results of 1930, for the main heads of revenue, and for such rapid readjustment of the ~~conditions~~ position as may be practicable, should the revenue estimates prove to have been unduly optimistic.

The working capital, for instance, is only 4%, roughly, on £ 2,500,000; and it seems difficult to go below that. I would accept the reduction of £ 15,000 on unallocated stores, however. The housing scheme money might fairly be charged to the loan--providing another £ 44,000. This would enable the anticipated deficit to be met from surplus balances, with a margin of about £ 23,700. But the view we formerly expressed--that these reallocations should be kept in reserve--seems sound. Things

in. (My own view is that the Exchequer will have to aid Kenya, if all other resources fail; but it will do so most unwillingly; and it will only do so under strong political pressure. But, in the last resort, it cannot allow Kenya to go bankrupt, to put the extreme case. It cannot allow that, to my mind, in its own interests. However that may be, it seems our obvious duty to make it clear to Kenya that they cannot expect aid from the Treasury; and thus force them back on their own resources, from the outset.)

Mr. Parkinson and I had a word with you about this this morning, and as Mr. Parkinson has had to go off to a Meeting he asked me to put up a short minute.

The action which suggests itself is to prepare a draft telegram on the lines proposed by Sir John Campbell, and to send it to the Treasury for concurrence. There is, however, one point on which prior guidance is desirable.

As Sir John Campbell points out, the trouble about income tax is that it is bound to take some time to get it going. It is true that Kenya have had an income tax before and that Mr. Rushton, the present Treasurer, had experience of it, so that they would be better able than most other territories to get it going quickly. Nevertheless, it would seem most unlikely that anything could be raised by this means before the 1st January. It will be seen, however, from Sir John Campbell's minute that what is immediately required is an emergency measure to tide the Colony over until the Financial Commission has produced its report.

Authority is therefore desired to draft a telegram to be agreed with the Treasury, and to be on the lines suggested by Sir John Campbell; the telegram to include in it something to the effect that if the Governor does not think that an income tax could be made to yield immediate results then there will be no objection to a special cut in salaries as a temporary measure to be reconsidered when the Financial Commission reports.

4. The Govt. must recognise, however, that this cleans up every grain left in the granary. There will no longer be a single pound on which he can rely. And, as noted above, there are still the possibilities of expenditure which cannot be foreseen, and which must be met, and of a further fall in revenue. For these reasons-- and for obvious general reasons--we cannot I think leave the position at that.

5. We must, I think, tell him somewhat as follows:--

(a) It is recognised that he will be unwilling to undertake ^{important} radical measures, till he is fortified by the report of the financial mission. It is therefore imperative that that mission should get to work as soon as possible. The question is perhaps no longer one of the very best possible mission; it is rather one of getting the best practicable mission at work as soon as possible.

(b) With every reserve used up, it becomes essential that something should be done meantime, as a temporary measure, in advance of the report of the financial mission, to deal with the situation. There are no signs that the present depression is passing, or will pass in any foreseeable future. All the indices point to continuance, and it seems necessary and prudent to re-frame the budget for this year, and to prepare the budget for 1932, on that assumption. No

The important thing is to recognise that the measures are avowedly temporary; that they will be abolished or altered in the light of the discussions on the report of the financial mission; and that the essential point, which should dominate the decision, is to get something broadly sound, yielding immediate or early results.

I have the honour to refer to Lord Passfield's despatch No. 197 (Reserved) of the 18th March, 1931, enclosing a memorandum dealing with certain questions arising from the Colony's Estimates for 1931.

1. An explanation is desired by your predecessor of the special measures which it is necessary to take for the collection of revenue in the Northern Frontier Province.

2. By Section 9 of the Northern Frontier Province Poll Tax Ordinance, 1930, the Governor is empowered to enter into agreements with representatives of tribes for the payment of commuted amounts in lieu of poll tax. This power the Governor has delegated to the Provincial Commissioner.

4. The system adopted by the Provincial Commissioner is as follows:-

When the agreements have been concluded the Headmen of the tribes concerned proceed to collect the agreed amounts through the heads of their sub-sections. These heads of sub-sections are not salaried Government servants and are therefore paid for their services in connection with the collection of tax a remuneration at the rate of 2% of the amount collected. The headmen are also remunerated at the same rate in consideration of the additional work put upon them and of the amount of travelling involved.

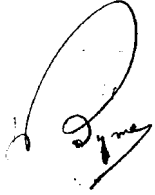

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Parkinson's letter of the 1st instant (16304/30) enclosing copies of a telegram sent to the Governor of Kenya on the 11th and of a telegram received from him in reply on the 18th July, with regard to the budgetary provision for accumulating surplus balances of the Colony, and Their Lordships direct me to request you to convey to the Secretary of State the following reply.

by increased revenue and decreased expenditure. With regard to the latter, Their Lordships are glad to observe that the Governor is putting drastic reductions into effect, and that although the extent to which such reductions will result in reducing this year's deficit cannot at present be foreseen, it is estimated that they should produce a surplus of £60,000 in the year 1932. With regard to increase of revenue, My Lords suggest that income tax should at once be re-introduced, and that a further increase in customs duties should be considered.

4. My Lords are in entire agreement with Lord Passfield's proposal to inform the Governor that in so far as he is compelled to have recourse to the above re-allocations of surplus balances to leave the 1931 Budget balanced, it will be necessary to aim at placing a similar amount, in addition to the £60,000 for which he is already estimating, to surplus balances during the year 1932.

3. At the beginning of the year there were 14 Officers, one of whom has since been transferred to the Veterinary Department and two others have been retrenched.

4. As a result of the reduction of three officers it has been necessary to combine the Fort Hall and South Nyeri districts under one officer and similarly the Embu and Meru districts under one officer. Prior to the reduction Fort Hall and Meru districts each had an officer and Embu and South Nyeri were combined. Thus in the Kikuyu Province there are now two agricultural officers instead of three. A reduction from three officers to two has also been made in Central Kavirondo. The transfer of one officer to the Veterinary Department has made no change as the officer in question is carrying on his former work, viz., improvement in methods of drying hides. The effect of leaving two posts unfilled has been largely reduced owing to leave arrangements as a result of which fewer officers are at the moment on leave than normally.

5. The general effect of leaving two posts unfilled and of the subsequent reduction in strength of three more officers is that no extension of agricultural activities in the Native Reserves is possible but present activities can be maintained without setback provided the position is remedied in the near future. In the present financial state of the Colony, however, I regret that I see no immediate prospect of increasing the existing staff.

6. In the settled areas also, reductions and adjustments have had to be made and of the six officers provided for under Item 40, one has resigned and one has

been retrenched, leaving four only available, who are distributed as follows:-

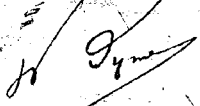

This leaves the Nakuru area without an officer and it is intended that the Officer-in-Charge of the Eldoret area, who is now engaged on locust work, should be posted to Nakuru as soon as the locust situation allows. The Eldoret and Kitale areas will then be combined under one officer.

With reference to Revenue, Head II, Licenses, Duties, Taxes, etc., Item II, Hut and Poll Tax (Native) I have the honour to inform Your Lordship that the arrears of £5,062 were in respect of the Meru District, Kikuyu Province. These arrears have now all been collected with the exception of £550, which represents remissions of tax after full enquiry into each individual case by the District Officers, and the taxes of a few natives who are working outside the District and who, it will probably be found, have paid their tax in other districts.

3. The causes of the arrears are a late start in tax collection in 1930, and difficulty on the part of the natives in finding the money for their taxes, owing to the general depression throughout the Colony. This has had the effect of making employment more difficult to obtain. Local markets for agricultural produce ...

As I have explained above, all cases requiring remission have been carefully considered by the District Officers and the tax remitted under Section 10 of Chapter 51 (the Native Hut and Poll Tax Ordinance) to any person who was found to be without sufficient means to pay and unable to obtain employment by reason of age or infirmity.

B. Surplus Balances.

The latest figures are contained in the enclosure to the Treasurer's "Appreciation of the position on the 6th May" in No. 1 in 17222/31, Flagged A. According to that memorandum, surplus balances amounted to £510,702, but as against this there were authorised allocations of £522,000, or £11,298 more than the ~~actual~~ surplus. The Treasurer, however, gives another table showing the actual

needed

needs for the purposes for which allocations have been made. He considers that the allocations may be reduced by 296,000, leaving unreserved surplus of 284,702. The explanation of some of the Treasurer's reductions is given in the enclosure to No.2 on 17137/31, Flagged B, but it is evident from 12A on that file, Flagged C, and from Mr. Allen's minute below (12) that he and Sir John Campbell did not think that all of these reductions could safely be made. They proposed in the ~~draft~~ telegram which they put up, and which was approved here but not approved by the Treasury and consequently never sent, to include the following sentence:- "In view of the risk of deficits in present and future years and the fact already pointed out that there is no outside source to which Government of Kenya can look for assistance, I consider that reallocations referred to should be kept in reserve". As regards the individual items, the following remarks may be made:-

- (a) The Treasurer explained (Flagged B) that the Colony has at present a fairly large loan balance, and that, in addition, its cash deposits exceed its cash advances. After careful investigation he is satisfied that for the time being it would suffice to earmark the reduced figure. No reason is ~~given~~ ^{appears} as to why it was not thought possible to approve this.
- (b) The Treasurer explained (Flagged B) that with reduced activities consequent upon curtailment of expenditure, he had ascertained that it would be possible to work on a ~~smaller~~ ^{smaller} balance within the original allocation until better times. No explanation appears of the reason for which it was not thought possible to approve reduction.
- (d) The Commissioner for Local Government has assured the Treasurer that £10,000 is all that is required.
- (e) Owing to locusts, etc. less maize has been exported than had been anticipated.

These figures do not take account of a proposal made in No.12 on 17/137/31 to transfer the £44,000 for Civil Service Housing Schemes (Item (c) above) from surplus balances to loan. In regard to this Mr. Allen included in the draft telegram which ~~was~~ approved here, but not approved by the Treasury, the following sentence:- "I shall, of course, be prepared to consider in due course your suggestion in regard to £44,000 for housing scheme but I foresee considerable difficulty and Treasury consent would be necessary", and he ~~has~~ said: "Personally, I think that the proposal to switch this amount over to loan should be kept in reserve in case deficits are realised, in which event it may be a convenient method of dealing with a small deficit".

II. According to the plan agreed with the Treasury the surplus balances of the Colony were, if possible, to be raised to £1,000,000 by 1936. When this plan was put forward it was anticipated that, with the addition of the £73,000 from revenue, in 1931, the surplus balances at the end of 1931, would be £611,600, and it was proposed that a surplus of £80,000 should be budgeted for in every year from 1932 to 1936. If on account of adverse conditions it was proposed to postpone this in whole or in part, the Treasury were to be consulted, and they were also to be consulted before in any year the surplus was allowed to fall short ~~of the~~ ~~provision~~ of the estimate in the Budget.

It has already been necessary to depart from the plan. On 17/222/31, the Treasury have been informed that there were no prospects of any surplus being realised in this year, and in No.4 on that paper (Flagged D) they agreed to the postponement of the plan by one year. The

The question of a further postponement of a year is to be considered when the Estimates for 1932 are submitted.

The Estimates now submitted by the Governor are for a ^(minimum) deficit of £65,000 during the current year, which, so the Governor says "it is not considered practicable materially to reduce but in order to restore the position as far as possible drastic reductions, in some cases involving further retrenchments, are now being made in the 1932 Draft Estimates with the object of budgeting for a surplus of some £60,000," in 1932. That is to say, if the surplus budgeted for for 1932 is realised, it will about square with the deficit of the current year, but nothing will have been placed to surplus balances in the year.

In approving the postponement of the surplus balances plan for one year, the Treasury, at our request, asked that the Governor should be informed that while additional retrenchments will not be insisted upon solely for the purpose of conserving the estimated surplus, it must be understood that, if necessary in order to avoid the possibility of a deficit, further retrenchments will have to be undertaken". This was duly telegraphed out to the Governor. He replied that where possible the further reductions which are being included in the 1932 Budget will be brought into effect this year, but that he is not yet in a position to say whether or by how much the anticipated deficit is likely to be reduced thereby as retrenchments will in some cases involve additional expenditure on passages, and, owing to the necessity for giving several months' notice and leave, they may not be finally effected this year.

III. Possible Measures of Economy or of raising Increased Revenue.

In the circumstances it seems desirable to indicate briefly possible methods of economising or increasing the revenue.

1. Customs Duties. The most obvious method is an increase in customs duties. Such an increase would have to be common to Kenya and Uganda and Tanganyika. Certain increases were made last month but we have not as yet received any estimate of the increased revenue which is expected to accrue. We may presume however that the Governor has taken account of this in estimating the deficit for this year.

2. Retrenchment. Wholesale retrenchment is uneconomic in the long run and is clearly to be avoided if possible. Anyhow, owing to the necessity for the grant of notice and leave it would have no immediate effect. Certain retrenchments are, however, to be made.

3. Income Tax or Cut in Salaries. I understand that these possibilities were discussed generally yesterday, and that it was thought that the income tax would be preferable to a cut in salaries. It was realised that the income tax would, in point of fact, be paid almost solely by officials.

It would seem doubtful if an income tax could produce anything in the current financial year in Kenya. When there was an income tax before it was, I believe, necessary to send a special officer out from the Board of Inland Revenue in this country to get it going. A special income tax on official salaries only would, however, be comparatively easy

4. Reduction in Military Expenditure. A telegram has recently been sent to the Secretary of the Governors' Conference as to the possibility of abolishing one of the two Reserve Battalions and of keeping only one Reserve Battalion for the two active-service battalions. The telegram asked that the four Governments should be consulted and that the Secretary of State might be informed of their views; then, if the Governments are in favour (as no doubt they will be), the proposal will be put to the Overseas Defence Committee, but it is quite possible that the latter body will not be able to agree.

The accounts for the first three months of 1931 are now complete and comparison with revenue collection in period in 1930 also taking into account probable short fall in hut and poll taxes due to locust invasions indicates that it would be only prudent to make a further downward revision of revenue estimate 1931 to £3,192,000. Revised estimate of expenditure after deducting estimated economies to the value of £172,543 and adding supplementary expenditure not covered by earmarked savings to the value of £35,692 now stands at £3,306,149 leaving an estimated deficit on the year of £114,149. Against this can be set general unspecified savings all heads of estimates which even in a year like the present may be taken at £40,000 provided no further unforeseen expenditure has to be incurred. It is not considered practicable materially to reduce this deficit but in order to restore the position as far as possible drastic reductions in some cases involving further retrenchments are now being made in 1932 draft Estimates with the object of ~~the~~ budgetting for a surplus of some £60,000. 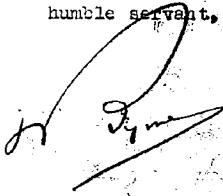

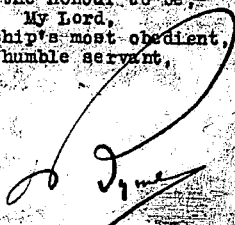

4. The sums indicated in the statement have been deducted from the relevant Head of Estimates (and from the relevant subhead in cases where details have been given) in the preparation of the General Warrant and no expenditure in excess of the amount shown in Estimates after taking these deductions into account can be incurred without special sanction, which can only be conferred under the authority of a Special Warrant.

5. His Excellency desires once more to impress upon Heads of Departments the importance of securing all possible reductions in working expenditure and this circular must not be taken to imply that finality has been reached. Indeed, present revenue prospects indicate that further steps may become necessary in the near future to effect additional economies in 1931 expenditure.

His Excellency would therefore be glad if Heads of Departments in replying to this circular would add an appreciation of the position regarding expenditure on ^{their} Departmental votes in 1931 indicating whether, by the exercise of the most stringent economy, existing services can be maintained during the year at a cost less than that covered by the General Warrant and, if so, the amount of further savings which may be anticipated on this account.

Reference Secretariat Circular No. 16 of 11th March, 1930.

With reference to paragraph 2 (1) of the above Circular, I am directed by His Excellency to state that, in view of the present financial position of the Colony, it will not be possible to consider, in connexion with the Draft Estimates for 1932, any proposals for new services or new appointments, unless the proposals themselves are calculated to lead to a reduction in expenditure or are based on a departmental reorganization designed to obtain greater efficiency and economy.

2. His Excellency is anxious that schedules showing in full the Draft Estimates for 1932 should be prepared at an early date. The necessary forms are being prepared and will be circulated in the course of the next few days and His Excellency would be glad if the schedules of Departmental Estimates could be submitted as soon as possible after receipt of the forms.

3. I am to add that as there is every prospect of the Estimates of Revenue for 1932 being considerably lower than those approved for 1931 and as there will be an automatic increase in recurrent expenditure in 1932 of approximately £80,000 on account of interest charges and normal increments, Heads of Departments are requested to reduce expenditure as much as possible below the figures approved in the 1931 Estimates.

Expenditure reductions now made amount to 2156,000 and without further retrichments which I am aware from the terms of your Confidential Circular despatch of the 14th April 1931 you are most anxious to avoid I do not consider that this figure can be materially increased. On this basis latest revenue figures suggest that 1931 revised Budget should approximately balance. Question of imposition of further taxation in order to provide a small surplus is being explored but as regards Customs you are aware of necessity of securing inter-territorial agreement to any alterations in the existing duties and delays and difficulties inherent in such a course. In any case I consider it definitely impossible to find a surplus of 260,000 this year, and I am addressing you seperately on this in accordance with paragraph 2 of your Confidential despatch (2) of the 9th March. Impossible to give more accurate forecast of locust menace at present. As regards surplus balance I am satisfied that reallocations already proposed are practicable. For example unallocated stores now stand at less than 280,000 and anticipated demands from local Government bodies have not been forthcoming & that it is not considered necessary to allocate any particular sum for this purpose at the present time. Further for reasons which I will put forward seperately I suggest that 244,000 for housing scheme might, as previously proposed, be transferred to Loan and met either from Savings or re-allocation on Funding Loan or from Loan Advances already provisionally approved in your despatch Confidential (3) of 9th March.

2. As regards the general financial
position, I note with satisfaction that
the Estimates represent a determined
attempt to bring under control the normal
tendency towards increase of recurrent
expenditure and an endeavour to secure a
substantial addition to the Colony's
Surplus Balances. I also note, with
satisfaction, that the Elected Members
agreed in principle with the preparation
of Estimates on those lines, and I trust
that the policy of building up the
surplus balances in future years on a

definite plan will meet with general acceptance. ^{also} I observe that the Estimates of Revenue were prepared on the assumption that the agricultural prospects of the colony were sufficient to justify an increase in trade returns as compared with the revised estimates for 1930, and that it would ^{have been} wrong at that stage to assume that there would be no revival in market prices. I am advised, however, that ^{apparently} ~~even now~~ there are no reliable indications that the period of depression has come to an end, or even that the downward trend generally has been finally arrested. It is, in fact, to be feared that the financial effects ^{of} depression are likely to be more severely felt in 1931 than in 1930. In these circumstances, I

felt it my duty to emphasise in the telegram quoted above the need for caution and ^{strict} ~~strict~~ economy in financial administration during the current year; and for a running comparison ^{(with those made in previous years, with a view} of the financial returns. ~~By extension~~

to making as rapid as possible such adjustments as may be necessary and practicable. By following this policy and by deferring all postponable expenditure until it is seen how the revenue comes in, I trust that it will be possible to avoid the precedent of drastic retrenchment in the public services in 1922, which, as Mr. Moore rightly observes, proved to be on an uneconomic basis.

I enclose, for your consideration, a memorandum dealing with certain details arising on the Estimates, and I shall await the further despatches which are desired on certain points.

I am replying separately to Mr. Moore's despatch No. 13 Reserved of the 25th January, in which he forwarded the statements referring to native taxation and expenditure.

I have also to refer to Mr. Moore's despatch No. 787 of the 19th December, 1930, and to inform you that His Majesty will not be advised to exercise his power of disallowance in respect to Ordinance No. 49 of 1930 of the Legislature of Kenya entitled "An Ordinance

(a) It is noted that the Select Committee recommended that the whole question of the salaries and conditions of service of the teaching staff should be referred to the suggested Terms of Service Commission. It should however be understood that the scales of salary which have already been agreed are the minimum which the Advisory Committee on Education in the Colonies considers justifiable. Even that scale, on a comparison with the normal scale in other East African dependencies, may prove detrimental to recruitment, and it would be a very serious matter if it was proposed to curtail it still further in any way.

(b) The sums to be paid by civil departments to military authorities in respect of the cost of civil transport carried out by the King's African Rifles has been shown as a reduction from the Estimates of expenditure (Appendix M, item 143). ~~As already explained~~ the correct procedure is to place such revenue to a separate revenue sub-head, the proceeds of which, in so far as they have not been required by the King's African Rifles to meet new or unforeseen charges during the year, should be set off at the end of the financial year against the total cost of the Force which will fall to be allocated between Kenya and Uganda in the correct proportion. KENYA ESTIMATES 1931

General.

First note, and express satisfaction at what is said in the last paragraph of page 9 of the Memorandum on the Estimates; namely that they represent a determined attempt to bring under control the normal tendency towards increase of recurrent expenditure, and endeavour to secure a substantial addition to the Colony's surplus balances. Agree that it is desirable to avoid any demand for retrenchment as in 1922 (see page 2 of the despatch), and also note with satisfaction that the Elected Members agreed in principle with preparing Estimates on lines to secure a substantial addition to the surplus balances (see paragraph 5 of Select Committee's Report, and page 3 of the despatch.) This is important in view of the proposed ^{policy} for building up Surplus Balances referred to below.

As regards revenue, refer to paragraph 16 on page 4 of the Memorandum on the Estimates, in which it is stated that the revenue Estimates have been prepared on the assumption that the agricultural prospects of the Colony ~~are~~ sufficient to justify an increase in trade returns as compared with ^{the} revised estimates for 1930, and that it would ~~have~~ be wrong at this ^{at} stage to assume that there will be no revival in market prices. But on this point say that pending clear signs of such trade revival it would be ^{the market} ~~be~~ ~~prudent~~ ~~to~~ proceed on the assumption that revenue in 1931 is not likely to exceed, and will perhaps more probably fall short of the revenue for 1930, and therefore to continue

a policy of strict economy deferring all postponable expenditure at any rate until it is seen how much revenue comes in.

There is, however, some reason to think that the revised estimate for 1930 has been too optimistic, but if in 1931 they only succeed in reaching that figure they would on the basis of these estimates realise a deficit of about £15,000 instead of the contemplated surplus of £73,000.

Surplus Balances.

The present position as regards these balances is set out in the note, 15 (c) in this file. In connection with the loan programme it has now been agreed that the Treasury ^{not} of the Kenya Government should be required if possible to provide ⁱⁿ the Estimates in each year from 1932 to 1936, for a surplus of such amount as would bring the balance up to a total of £1,000,000 at the end of 1936 on the understanding that the Treasury will be consulted, if a postponing ^{amount} of the provision, in whole or part, is proposed in any year on account of adverse conditions. It is also understood that if owing to such postponing the sum of £1,000,000 is not reached at the end of 1936 the annual provision for a surplus will continue year by year until the full £1,000,000 is reached. (As a matter of fact it ^{shall} ~~will~~ go on until they get an estimated surplus of £750,000, which would on the existing basis bring the total balances up to somewhat over £1,000,000.) The Treasury also assume that in the event of adverse conditions arising in the course of any financial year in

which

which provision for the required surplus has been made in the Estimates, they will be consulted before authority is given to allowing this surplus to fall below the amount provided.

Properly speaking, this means that if the Colony ~~has~~ succeeded in realising the estimated surplus of £73,051 in 1931, they will have to budget over the following five years for an average surplus in the neighbourhood of £80,000 a year.

To give effect to the foregoing arrangements it will be necessary to tell the Governor that they will have to contemplate budgeting on the above lines, that if in any year it is not possible to make the necessary provision in the Estimates, the Government will have to satisfy the Secretary of State (and the Secretary of State the Treasury) that this is the case; ~~and~~ that if in any year an estimated surplus appears to be unrealisable, the Governor should report the fact at the earliest possible date, with proposals for economies to meet the situation; and that if in any year, ^a the surplus ~~is~~ higher than that budgeted for is likely to be realised, it is not to be used as an excuse for extending services.

I propose ^{to} draft on the above lines on the relevant papers relating to the surplus balances, but it seems desirable to set out the position here; and in replying to the Estimates it will only be necessary to refer to the despatch now being prepared.

"About last November the downward tendency of wholesale prices showed certain signs of stopping. There was even a slight upward movement in some eight of the chief primary products. This might have been the first sign of a general upward movement, but it has not proved to be so, and since then prices have continued to decline sharply. Sir John Campbell said that the general opinion appears to be that it is difficult to believe that the present position can long continue, but there is no evidence, statistical or otherwise, of any improvement or indeed that the bottom of the trough has yet been reached. Nor of course is there any indication that if prices did rise they would return by the end of 1931 to anything like the level at which they were at the beginning of 1930".

As regards the estimates of revenue, it was anticipated that there would be an increase of £30,000 over the revised estimate for 1930 in the yield of Customs duties, and an increase of £20,000 over the revised estimate for 1930 in the yield of licences, duties, taxes, etc. The Memorandum on the draft Estimates was however dated 20th October, and since that date the position has become considerably worse. The Select Committee, though they succeeded in effecting reductions in expenditure by £20,000, did not touch the estimates of revenue. It now appears that the estimates of revenue during 1930 have been reduced by £50,000 between the 20th October and the 10th January. It therefore appears more than likely that the estimates of revenue are framed on too optimistic a scale.

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B. Discrepancies.

None arise in the case of the 1921 Loan. There are small discrepancies under "interest" in the case of both the 1927 and 1928 ^{years}, i.e., in each case the amount shewn as a reimbursement on the Colony revenue estimate being somewhat less than the provision shewn in the Colony and Transport Expenditure Estimates which is the same. The explanation will no doubt be on similar lines to paragraph 3(iii) of No. 8 of 15920/30 which dealt with ^a the corresponding discrepancy in the 1930 Estimates.

The Transport Estimates shew however substantial discrepancies as regards Sinking Fund in both years. The first payment (half yearly) in respect of the 1927 loan falls due on the 15th July 1931 and that in respect of the 1928 ^{loan}, on the 1st November 1931 i.e. in 1931 there is only one half yearly payment to sinking fund in each case the respective amounts being £25,000 and £17,500. The charges under "Public Debt" and the "Reimbursement" in the Colony Estimates correspond with these figures and also with the ^{proportionate} allocation ^{of capital expenditure} between Colony and Transport ^{services} shewn in Appendices II & III to the Transport Estimates; but the provision in the appendix shews the following excesses:-

REVENUE.

Head I. Customs.

Although there is a decrease of £10,000 on the Estimates for 1930 as passed, there is an increase on the revised Estimate for 1930 of £30,000. The principal decreases are in respect of grain and flour, spirits, other food and drink, and miscellaneous goods. This includes a sum of £8,000 as the yield of taxation in the Northern Frontier Province. Item 26. The Select Committee recommended (R. p.20) that as a measure of economy no commitments should be entered into involving the necessity to appoint an additional Assistant Conservator of Forests in 1932. In page 14

of his despatch the O.A.G. agrees and asks that the future requirements of the Colony may therefore be taken to be one Assistant Conservator to fill a vacancy expected in 1932, and no other new appointments. For the most part these grants are mandatory, but in some cases a grant may be made "in such proportion as the Governor in Council may determine" of the total expenditure on the object incurred by the Municipality. The total estimated expenditure on the Northern Brigade of the King's African Rifles in 1931 is £164,891, taking into account the estimated amount of reimbursements which will be paid to the military authorities by civil departments for the cost of civil transport carried out by the King's African Rifles in the Northern Frontier and Turkana areas. In the Estimates, this expenditure has been divided between Kenya and Uganda on the basis of the proportionate expenditure of the two territories in previous years. Under this arrangement, Kenya pays approximately 61 per cent and Uganda 39 per cent. In a despatch of the 24th September last, concerning the general arrangements for the reorganisation of the King's African Rifles, it was stated that the Secretary of State had come to the conclusion that the cost of maintaining the Northern Brigade should be shared between the two Governments in the proportions of Kenya-2 Uganda-1. In a telegram of the 7th November, the Acting Governor said that he proposed to submit the Estimates to the Select Committee in their original form (i.e. allocating only 61 per cent of the expenditure to Kenya, and not 66 per cent), any additional expenditure being provided for in Supplementary Estimates for 1931. The Secretary of State decided, after considering the further representations which were being made by despatch, that the allocation of two to one should be adhered to. The Acting Governor

I have no comment on details of the Estimates for the Brigade, but attention should be drawn to the following points:-

(a) As explained above, the sums to be paid by civil departments to military authorities in respect of the cost of civil transport carried out by the King's African Rifles has been shown as a reduction from the Estimates of expenditure (see Appendix M - Subhead 143). Reference is made to this arrangement at the bottom of page 37 of the memorandum on the Estimates. In the memorandum sent to the Governors of Kenya and Uganda on the 24th September regarding detailed arrangements for reorganisation, the following passage occurs:-

Paragraph n 1344/30.

"The Acting Governor of Uganda considers that revenue earned by the Corps for civil transport work should be credited to a separate sub-head, of which Uganda should receive a share apportioned on the same basis as the military expenditure. (b) Reference is made in the Report of the Select Committee on the Draft Estimates to the proposed removal of the headquarters of the 3rd Battalion, King's African Rifles, from Meru to Nanyuki. The position is that the Acting Governor was informed by the Secretary of State on the 14th November that, provided that he is satisfied that additional expenditure will not be involved, the Secretary of State approves the removal proposed. The Acting Governor proposed that the capital cost of erecting new buildings at Nanyuki should be met from Loan Funds. Our telegram suggested that consideration might be given to the possibility of meeting this expenditure from the amounts to be paid by civil departments in respect of the cost of civil transport. This suggestion was, of course, made before we knew that the Kenya Government proposed to show such receipts as a reduction from the expenditure.

(c) The Select Committee also recommended that, after the retirement of Brigadier Walker from the post of Inspector-General, a revised arrangement should come into force, under which either the services of an Inspector-General are dispensed with altogether, or an extension is made of the military command over which inspection is to take place, in order to distribute the cost of inspection over a wider field. My Lord,

I have the honour to forward for Your Lordship's consideration the Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the year 1931 as passed by the Legislative Council on the 28th November, 1930.

2. I also enclose for Your Lordship's information a memorandum on the Draft Estimates of Expenditure for 1931, as presented to Legislative Council, and the report of the Select Committee on the Draft Estimates for 1931, as adopted in the Legislative Council on the 28th November, 1930. I am transmitting under separate cover authenticated copies of the Appropriation Ordinance which passed its third reading on the same date.

3. The Draft Estimates, as laid before the Council on the 22nd October, provided for an expenditure of £3,464,045 against an estimated revenue of £3,516,023, leaving an estimated surplus of £51,978. They are fully explained in the memorandum and to the explanations there given I would only add one further statement. After the preliminary information regarding departmental and other

requirements for 1931 had been received in July, it became evident that the fall in world market prices of many of the commodities produced in Kenya for export must be expected to affect very considerably the purchasing power of the Colony, not only during 1930, but for at least a part of 1931. This factor in the economic situation, which arose after the estimates for 1930 were passed, made it exceptionally difficult to frame accurate estimates of the revenue likely to accrue during 1931 and greatly complicated the preparation of estimates of expenditure. It was clear, however, that the expenditure estimates could not contain provision for expansion of services except in the most urgent instances and that, in order to avoid budgeting for a deficit, special steps would be necessary to curtail existing expenditure. Apart from the desirability of framing estimates which would aim at securing a substantial addition to the Colony's surplus balances, I was most anxious to avoid a sustained demand for a campaign of retrenchment in the public services such as occurred in 1922 when comprehensive reductions in establishments took place on what has since proved to be an uneconomic basis. I did, however, feel that I should be justified in holding in abeyance during 1931 certain posts in the approved establishment which were vacant, and in postponing the introduction of certain new services which had been sanctioned in the estimates for 1930; and a rigorous examination of existing commitments was accordingly made both for the purpose of reducing estimates of expenditure for 1931 and of decreasing actual expenditure

during 1930.

4. Examination on these lines, coupled with the ruthless elimination of items of non-recurrent expenditure, indicated the prospect, after making provision for necessary revotes in respect of works already approved, whether chargeable to revenue or surplus balances, of budgeting for a surplus of approximately £50,000 in 1931 and I am pleased to be able to record that the broad lines upon which the Draft Estimates for 1931 were prepared were generally endorsed by the Select Committee appointed to consider those estimates. No suggestion for a campaign of retrenchment was put forward by Elected Members and the reductions in estimates proposed by the Select Committee, which had the effect of increasing the estimated surplus to £73,051, were almost entirely confined to the methods adopted in Draft Estimates, namely, the postponement of certain approved services, the holding of certain vacant posts in abeyance during 1931, and a further reduction in the provision for non-recurrent expenditure.

5. By motion passed in the Legislative Council on the 1st November, Draft Estimates were referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Colonial Secretary, the Treasurer, all the Elected Members, the Nominated Unofficial Member representing the interests of the African Community, and the Official Members of Council ad hoc in respect of the votes of their particular Departments. Draft Estimates were subjected to close scrutiny in Select Committee and the various points dealt with are referred to in the report now transmitted.

6. It has been customary during the past three years for the Governor to preside over meetings of the Select Committee on Draft Estimates. This procedure was first adopted in 1927, following a year in which, at the request of Elected Members, Draft Estimates had been considered in Committee of the whole Council. The Governor's presence in the chair when important matters of policy are under discussion in Select Committee has given opportunity for authoritative pronouncements to be made in the Select Committee itself and has been welcomed by elected members on this account. At the same time this practice makes great inroads into the Governor's time and in my view, and, I believe, in that of Sir Edward Grigg, is open to objection, both on general and constitutional grounds. It is clearly anomalous that the President of the Council should be Chairman of one of its Select Committees; still more so that, if Chairman, he should not be able for obvious reasons to sign the Select Committee's Report. On this occasion I was not present at any of the meetings of the Select Committee; the chair was taken by the Acting Colonial Secretary throughout; and I desire to take this opportunity of paying a tribute to the admirable manner in which Mr. Martin presided over the deliberations of the Committee. I was kept informed of the attitude adopted by Elected members on the various items of Estimates under discussion and was thus able to indicate to the Acting Colonial Secretary

those items on which Government felt unable to accept recommendations which Elected Members were inclined to put forward. My instructions in this respect were confined to the limited number of items on which, owing to the importance and urgency of the points at issue, I was prepared, if necessary, to over-ride unofficial opinion in Legislative Council by the use of the official majority. In each case, however, Mr. Martin succeeded in obtaining a modification of the terms of the Committee's report to meet in whole or in large measure the Government's view, and the report, as finally presented to Legislative Council, was adopted without a dissentient voice.

7. The Estimates for 1931 as passed by the Legislative Council show an estimated revenue of £3,515,983 and an estimated expenditure of £3,442,932, leaving an estimated surplus of £73,051.

8. The gross revenue estimates exceed the sanctioned revenue estimates for 1930 by £54,371. After deducting reimbursements and cross-entries, as shown in the table on page 6 of the volume of Estimates, the net increase in estimated net revenue from 1930 to 1931 is £29,696. No new taxation is contemplated and the revenue estimates for 1931 are based upon the information obtained in 1930 and previous years of anticipated receipts from existing sources. I would, however, invite Your Lordship's attention to paragraph 16 of the Budget memorandum, which made it clear to the

Legislative Council that the revenue estimates for 1931 have not been framed on the assumption that the present degree of depression will necessarily continue throughout next year, and to the passage on page 3 of the report of the Select Committee which states that Elected Members agreed to these estimates of revenue "on the understanding that Government will take all necessary steps to ensure the maintenance and extension of agriculture on which these estimates are primarily based".

9. I do not propose in this despatch to deal in detail with various schemes for the promotion of agriculture which are at present under consideration, but I would mention that two motions proposed by Elected Members were adopted at the recent session of Legislative Council; one to the effect

"That this Council requests Government to extend the operation of the Agricultural Advances Ordinance into the year 1931 and for this purpose to revoke any balance remaining unexpended under this head at December 31st, 1930";

and the other

"That in view of the serious and urgent position and immediate prospects of the maize industry, this Council requests the Government to call a conference of the representatives of all parties interested in that industry with a view to co-operative action sufficient to tide over the present crisis".

10. These and other matters relative to the agricultural industry in the Colony will form the subject of separate correspondence. I have quoted the text of these resolutions here because they are indicative of the attitude adopted by elected Members during consideration of the Estimates for

1931. The main points of principle which they stressed were that sympathetic consideration should be given to measures, whether or not they involved the expenditure of public funds, designed to enable competent farmers to remain on the land and continue cultivation in the present period of depression and deflated prices; and that every endeavour should be made to conserve the Colony's economic assets, first by securing the utmost economy in the public services, and secondly by giving preference to local candidates for Government appointments in place of importing new recruits from overseas. Their view on this latter question is contained in the first paragraph on page 2 of the report of the Select Committee. In regard to the former point they expressed great satisfaction at the passing of the Land Bank Bill.

11. I would also refer at this stage to certain proposals for holding separate enquiries, which affected consideration of the Estimates under more than one Head during the Select Committee stage. In the first place Elected Members pressed strongly for the appointment of a Commission of Inquiry into the terms of service for Civil Servants in Kenya and for a chairman of that Commission to be deputed by the Colonial Office. I have referred to this request in my despatch No. 751 of the 29th November, 1930.

In the second place, the Government proposed, in placing Draft Estimates before the Legislative Council, that a Committee should be appointed to investigate certain transport and travelling

questions. Reference to this matter is contained in paragraphs 31 to 33 of the Budget memorandum.

In the third place, a Committee is proposed to investigate the desirability of dividing the Colony and Protectorate into larger and fewer Provinces and to frame measures which will lead to a greater measure of decentralisation. Elected Members wished to await the results of this enquiry before expressing any definite opinion on the proposal to increase the establishment of District Officers or Administration clerks or on the suggested addition of a senior post to the establishment of the Secretariat.

12. The total estimated expenditure included in the Estimates for 1931 is £112,603 less than the total included in the sanctioned Estimates for 1930. The estimates of recurrent expenditure show an increase of £62,942 as compared with those approved for 1930; non-recurrent expenditure estimates show a decrease of £175,545.

13. The greater part of the decrease in non-recurrent expenditure appears under the Head Public Works Extraordinary, where the provision made is practically confined to revotes of the unexpended balances of approved votes for buildings, and water supplies and drainage, and for continuing approved works on roads. New provision is confined to small votes for minor works, for the purchase of mechanical plant, for furniture for new buildings, and other general items; to further provision for continuing administrative and other buildings at Kapenguria; and to the erection of additional accommodation at Kabete Reformatory.

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14. Reductions have also been found possible in other non-recurrent Heads. All Departmental Extraordinary Heads show a decrease and no provision has been included for Famine Relief Measures Extraordinary.

15. The Estimates as passed by the Legislative Council provide for a recurrent expenditure of £3,344,231, or £62,942 gross more than the recurrent expenditure sanctioned in the Estimates for 1930. Of this gross increase, £54,310 is due to greater provision made in respect of Interest and Public Debt Funded (the greater part being reimbursed by the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours Administration) and under the Head Pensions and Gratuities. Apart from these Heads, the principal increases occur under the following Heads: -

(1) Administration. An increase of £9,135.

(a) Two new items totalling £6,250 have been included, representing the cost of carriage of civil supplies performed by the Supply and Transport Corps of the Northern Brigade in the Turkana and Northern Frontier Provinces. This expenditure was previously borne on Military votes and was not shown separately in Estimates.

(b) Provision has been made for the addition of eight to the establishment of District Officers. In Kenya telegram No. 110 of the 1st April, this Government asked for the appointment of seven additional District Officers. Four of these were intended to fill vacancies in the present establishment likely to arise within the year and seven were intended as an addition to establishment. In subsequent correspondence ending with Kenya telegram

No. 293 of 8th September Sir Edward Grigg agreed to one further appointment for Kenya, making an addition of eight to the present establishment. In connexion with these additional appointments, I would invite your Lordship's attention to the paragraphs headed "District Officers" on pages 6 and 7 of the Report of the Select Committee. Elected Members were inclined to the view that the present financial position of the Colony did not justify an increase in the permanent and pensionable staff and that, if some relief appeared to be essential, junior officers should be appointed on a temporary basis. They also expressed the opinion that, in the event of enquiry proving that some permanent addition to establishment was necessary, the new appointments should be reserved in the first instance for local applicants. On learning, however, that twelve candidates had, in fact, been selected, they withdrew their opposition to the necessary provision being included in Draft Estimates on the assurances which I authorised the Acting Colonial Secretary to give to the Committee on the lines mentioned in the report. In view of those assurances I have caused eight appointments of District Officers to be shown for next year as supernumerary to sanctioned establishment in the volume of Estimates.

(2) Public Works Recurrent. An increase of £9,049, due to an under-estimation when the Estimates for 1930 were prepared in the amount required for Rents of Offices and Houses and House Allowances in lieu of Quarters. Sanction to supplementary provision for this purpose totalling £16,500 in 1930 was conveyed in your Lordship's despatch No. 819 (Reserved) of 17th October, 1930.

(5) Education Department - an increase of £6,590.

(a) This increase is divided between Indian and Arab and African education. Provision has been made for opening an Indian Girls' School in Nairobi and for necessary developments in Arab and African education.

(b) Revised scales of salary for the teaching staff were discussed with the Select Committee but no definite expression of opinion on them was recorded. Elected Members expressed the view that the question of the salaries and conditions of service of the teaching staff should be referred for examination to the proposed Commission of Inquiry on Terms of Service, referred to in paragraph 11 of this despatch and that no definite steps should be taken pending the report of that Commission. I consider it reasonable that this question should be subjected to more comprehensive review than was possible in Select Committee this year, more particularly as the matter is one upon which Elected Members have expressed doubt for many years past and because an undertaking was given in Select Committee on the Draft Estimates for 1930 that full opportunity for discussing this question would be given when the Education Bill was before Council and that this and other points would be referred for detailed examination to a committee, including all Elected Members, after the second reading of that Bill.

(c) I am dealing in a separate despatch with the new item inserted in Estimates for the payment of grants-in-aid for Goan education, referred to on

pages 17 and 18 of the report of the Select Committee.

(4) Agricultural Department - an increase of £4,459.

(a) Practically the whole of this increase is due to the transfer to this Head from the non-recurrent Head, Agricultural Department Extraordinary, of provision for services connected with Stephanodores, coffee inspection, etc., the assisted importation of pedigree livestock, and expenses in connection with the control of Striga, pests and diseases, services which were originally approved as special services but which experience has shown to be necessary over a longer period than was originally contemplated.

(b) Increased provision has been made for Grading and Inspection Services against an equivalent increase in estimated revenue, in view of the larger quantities of grain expected to require handling at the Port during 1931.

(c) The Estimates of the Agricultural Department have been remodelled in order to give effect to the recommendations of the Agricultural Commission for the establishment of a Division of Plant Industry and a Division of Animal Industry. The new post of Deputy Director (Plant Industry) replaces the post of Deputy Director of Agriculture. Provision has been made in Estimates for a new post of Deputy Director (Animal Industry), at a salary of £1,200 per annum. For the reasons given on pages 10 and 11 of the report of the Select Committee it is proposed that, on the post of Deputy Director (Animal Industry) being filled, the post of Chief Veterinary Officer should be deleted from Estimates. I propose to discuss with Mr. Stockdale this month the best method

of disposing of our existing personnel in conformity with this reorganisation.

(5) Secretariat and Legislative Council - an increase of £2,429. Of the increase shown under this Head, £1,350 is due to the insertion of an additional senior post against a corresponding reduction in the number of Provincial Commissioners. The reasons underlying this proposal are given in detail on pages 52 and 55 of the Budget memorandum and it is not, I think, necessary to elaborate them further. Subject to Your Lordship's sanction of this additional post, which I am convinced is necessary, I propose, in deference to the views expressed by Elected Members as recorded on page 59 of the report of the Select Committee, to make an acting appointment only to this post pending the results of the enquiry into the Provincial organisation to which I have previously referred.

16. The above Heads of Estimates are those in which the principal increases occur. There are, however, certain other Heads of Estimates upon which some comment may be desirable.

(1) Coast Agency. The Estimates provide for the inauguration of a motor service operating between Mombasa and Malindi. This service will greatly facilitate the carrying of mails, which at present depend upon a runner service, and will assist in the expeditious transport of Government loads and passengers in addition to undertaking private transport. Revenue is anticipated in excess of the recurrent cost.

(2) Forest Department. In view of the present financial position of the Colony, I am inclined to agree with the recommendation made by Elected Members under the heading "Training Grants", on page 20 of the report of the Select Committee, regarding projected increases in the establishment of Assistant Conservators of Forests and I should be glad if the terms of Kenya telegram No. 179 of the 27th May could be varied so as to read "one for appointment in 1932", this appointment, required in 1932 to fill a vacancy in the existing establishment, being the only new appointment contemplated in the near future.

(3) Military:

(a) The lines upon which the Estimates of the Northern Brigade have been prepared are forming the subject of separate correspondence. Examination by a sub-committee of the Select Committee, with the Officer Commanding Northern Brigade, of the details shown in Appendix M of the volume of Estimates, indicated that certain reductions in those Estimates were possible during 1931 and the Kenya share of the reductions so agreed to have been taken into account on the basis reflected in the Draft Estimates, namely 61.33 per cent of the whole.

(b) The Estimates of the Kenya Defence Force have been framed to a total, both recurrent and non-recurrent, of £12,615 which is the figure approved for Defence Force expenditure in 1930 in

(4) Police.

(a) The Police Estimates, which had been carefully pruned before Draft Estimates were presented to Legislative Council, were subjected to particularly close scrutiny in Select Committee, Elected Members considering that the gross expenditure proposed for the Police in this Colony was too high. A reduction in establishment is proposed to the extent of seventeen African Police in the Native Reserve areas; and one European Police Constable and six African Police are being withdrawn from the Nairobi traffic squad. In addition, two vacant posts of European Police Constable are being held in abeyance during 1951.

(b) In accordance with the approval conveyed in Your Lordship's despatch No. 490 of the 28th June, Draft Estimates reflected the proposal to introduce a long grade for Assistant Superintendents and Superintendents of Police. In Select Committee, Elected Members pressed for the salary scales of these offices to remain unaltered pending the results of enquiry into the question of terms of service and in all the circumstances of the case I considered that the proposal could be deferred.

(5) Prisons.

(a) Proposals for revising scales of pay in the

Prisons service have been under consideration for some time. As Your Lordship is aware, existing scales have caused dissatisfaction and it has been evident that some improvement is necessary if the right type of candidate is to be attracted to the service. The Commissioner of Prisons submitted, in connection with the Draft Estimates for 1960, a scheme of reorganisation under which Chief Warders should never be able to look for promotion to the higher "commissioned" ranks, their scales of salary proceeding from £500 to £500; and under which the "commissioned" ranks would be recruited on a cadet system similar to that in force in the Police.

(b) I was not disposed to support proposals on these lines because I consider that there are grave disadvantages in introducing a hard and fast line between "commissioned" and "non-commissioned" ranks. Although it sometimes is the case that officers of the Chief Warden type may not be suitable for promotion, the knowledge that they are debarred from such promotion tends to make them discontented even though the maximum of the scale of salary attached to their posts is higher than the minimum on which "commissioned" officers are appointed. Furthermore, in the Kenya Prisons service, which is a small service, I consider that it would be a mistake at the present moment absolutely to debar Chief Warders from all prospects of promotion. In the Police, European Police Constables can look forward to promotion to senior ranks and I see no reason why an officer of similar status, if employed as a Chief Warden in the Prisons service,

should not also be able to look for advancement.

(c) A further difficulty arises in present circumstances on account of the fact that the post of Chief Warder is not pensionable. On being promoted to the pensionable office of Assistant Superintendent, previous non-pensionable service as Chief Warder counts for pension and the prospects of promotion to pensionable office is therefore an additional inducement to efficient service.

(d) After full consideration, I was of the opinion that an extension of the scale of salary of Chief Warders to £390 per annum was a reasonable improvement to propose in present circumstances and this proposal was reflected in Draft Estimates. Elected Members were inclined to dispute the necessity for any improvement in salary scales in the Prisons service but I caused them to be informed that Government was convinced as to the necessity for increasing the maximum of the scale laid down for Chief Warders and they did not press their opposition to the proposal.

(e) In regard to the revised rates of pay shown in Draft Estimates for the Assistant Commissioner and for the Carpentry and Masonry Instructors I did not feel, in view of the present financial stringency, that the moment was opportune for over-riding the objections of the Elected Members, based as they were primarily on considerations of economy.

(6) Public Works Department. Pending consideration of the Report of the Committee of Enquiry into the Department the Estimates were considered and

passed without prejudice to any decisions that might be taken at a later stage of the enquiry.

17. Explanations of the various changes made in all Heads of Expenditure Estimates are given in the memorandum and in the report of the Select Committee. I attach to this despatch for convenience of reference a schedule of the principal new appointments proposed in the Estimates as they now stand and lists of all appointments deleted and of appointments proposed to be held in abeyance during 1931. Under separate cover I am forwarding a list of alterations proposed in the titles, emoluments or status of certain offices.

18.(1) With reference to the instructions conveyed in paragraph 3 of Your Lordship's despatch No. 200 (Reserved) of the 6th March, 1930, I am forwarding with a separate despatch a provisional statement showing the total revenue derived from the direct taxation of natives and the total amount expended upon services directly benefiting the native population.

(2) I am also sending separately a statement showing the amounts which it is expected to raise by way of contributions or cesses arranged through the Local Native Councils and the objects upon which it is proposed to expend these monies.

19. I would make one further observation which affects the Estimates under a number of Heads. During the course of the year I have received from Your Lordship a number of requests for consideration

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by this Government of proposals to make financial contributions to undertakings outside the Colony or to increase present grants. I have given careful consideration to each of these suggestions but Your Lordship will realise that, in a time of financial stringency such as the present, when proposals for developing the public services of which the Colony stands in urgent need have had to be abandoned owing to lack of funds, and when the utmost economy is necessary in all forms of expenditure, great difficulty must necessarily be experienced in making additional money available for institutions and other purposes outside the Colony.

20. New items have been inserted in Estimates for the following purposes of this kind :

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21. In addition to these items, as reported in my despatch No. 696 of the 30th October, a sum of £1,000 has been inserted, as a revote, as a contribution towards expenditure on Locust Research, and provision for this Colony's contribution to the Colonial Agricultural Service has been increased from £350 to £420 as requested in Your Lordship's Circular despatch of the 10th September, 1930. I hope to take

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advantage of Mr. Stockdale's visit to get him to explain to Elected Members the full implications of the scheme, and to obtain their support of the Government's adherence to the scheme for the next five years.

22. In some instances a decision has not yet been reached but in a number of cases I have had to inform Your Lordship with regret that provision could not in present circumstances be made for a new or increased contribution from this Colony.

23. In Kenya telegram No. 274 of the 26th August Your Lordship was informed that the question of increasing Kenya's contribution to the Imperial Bureau of Mycology would be placed for discussion before the Select Committee on Draft Estimates. The recommendation of the Committee on the proposal to increase this grant and that for the Imperial Bureau of Entomology referred to in Your Lordship's despatch Miscellaneous of the 13th September, 1930, is contained on page 12 of the Committee's report and is in the following terms :

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"While prepared to agree that the Colony derives very considerable benefit from the work of these bureaux, the Committee considered that in view of the present financial position of the Colony and in view of the many departmental services which are limited in scope owing to lack of funds, it was unable to recommend an increase in the contributions to these bureaux in 1931."

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24. I would also refer to Kenya despatch No. 664 of the 14th October, 1930, regarding the memorial to Sir Patrick Manson; to Kenya despatch No. 699 of the 31st October, 1930, regarding the

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meridian arc; and to Kenya telegram No. 533 of the 8th October, 1950, regarding the official history of the East African campaign; in which Your Lordship has been informed that this Colony is not in present circumstances able to make the contribution suggested.

25. The Estimates as now submitted for Your Lordship's approval are based on an estimate of revenue which presupposes that the present degree of depression will not necessarily continue throughout next year and that sympathetic consideration will be given to measures put forward for the promotion of agriculture. The estimates of expenditure have been prepared on the most conservative basis compatible with the maintenance of existing services but do not contemplate retrenchment of staff in any case except where abolition of office is justified on the facts of the case. Preface.

The Estimates deal with gross expenditure, the authority of the Legislature being necessary to the expenditure of the total amount required whether or not part of it is met by re-imbursements from other sources on whose behalf the expenditure is incurred.

Certain additions to both sides of the Kenya budget are also made for accounting purposes. The cost of services rendered by one Government department to another appear in some cases in the departmental Estimates of Expenditure and a similar amount is credited to Revenue.

The prefatory schedule shows that a sum of £944,229 appears for the above reason on both sides of the budget.
