It is not the Treasury/have insisted that the money used for research shall be confined to capital expenditure. That has been the idea since the proposal was first put before the Office by the Far Eastern Department. As I have said before, I am personally afraid of spending anything like £500,000 on strictly capital services in connection w/ research. It should be reduced to looking for useful things to erect which we could not afford to maintain.

I would deprecate the adoption of the Council's proposal as it stands, as it is bad economy to pay for a time out of loan funds for services which will be permanently required, and it simply becomes a matter of labelling part of our ordinary expenditure as loan expenditure when there is no special justification for such a description.

I think the best arrangement for avoiding

the words "capital" and "research" with a good deal of
latitude while maintaining the special and temporary
character of the service to be included. ~~Time will tell~~
~~whether more or less services, like those now being~~

~~types of diseases, e.g., pulmonary, or any other particular disease~~
of man. My plant is in the nature of capital service,
and I think might properly be financed from loan funds.
This type of a continuing service like the Bank
Instability, the initial expenditure may certainly be
regarded as capital expenditure on research, but, unless
the necessity arises, it would be undesirable to charge
any of the permanent expenditure, though largely on
research, against the loan, but even in this case if
there is no capital or temporary investigations at
all, and, in my judgment, what is admissible
against it, I do not know.

Patent Office have said that, is in the
first instance a matter for the Committee, and perhaps
they are present to you to consider let the unofficial
agent of the writer stand as a reply until it
is known whether the Committee will, in the mean-
time, be so thoughtful whether it will be worthwhile
for the country, and a report on top could
hardly be made. What we know of the importance of
combating venereal disease, and would help us on
the question whether it should be regarded as capital

I don't consider that we are at the least committed to spending a fixed percentage of the £100,000 on research. At an early stage we spoke of "say 5%", but as far as I remember this has now been turned into "a percentage or a certain percentage". This will be fulfilled when the sum devoted to research is, because it will always be a percentage of the amount devoted to communications.

The question of what can properly be called "capital expenditure" will, I believe, be dealt with in the "S.S.C." Committee -

I think a further letter should be sent to the Social Hygiene Council pointing out that the whole question as to how the loan is to be expended is under consideration and that it may be some time before the Committee can come to a decision as to what percentage can be devoted to research work, and that in the meantime he doubts if it would be worth while the Committee sending a deputation and that it is sufficient for him to have the

views as expressed in the
letter under reply.

I agree with Mr Bottomley that
any special mission such
as for enquiry into
ratite fly, or pluvial pneumonia
might properly be paid for
out of loan funds, but I think
any research work paid for
from the loan should be of
a "special" & temporary
character and should not
call in question the amount
the loanee can spend in a
large research expenditure
which will have to be paid
out of annual revenue.

Dear Mr. Amery,

You will recall that I raised with you verbally that the British Social Hygiene Council are deeply interested in the conditions, in as far as they may affect Public Health, that may be attached to the Guaranteed Development Loan for the East African Colonies and Protectorates.

My Council are deeply impressed with the seriousness of the Public Health conditions in certain of these Colonies and Protectorates; the fact that venereal and other diseases are resulting in a decrease of the native populations on which the development of the country depends renders this an economic as well as a social question.

We understand that a certain percentage of the Development Grants to be made under the Loan is to be devoted to scientific research. We are aware of the importance of increasing the efficiency of the existing research establishments and of securing coordination of effort in research on the East Coast comparable with that already established on the West Coast, but we venture to submit that the provision of adequate medical services in these areas is of paramount importance, and it seems to us essential that in any development works undertaken in East Africa the Public Health position must be considered by the Imperial Government.

We understand that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury take the view that capital expenditure only can be incurred on the percentage allocated for social purposes.

purposes from the Loan. We recognise that it is not within the province of this Council to express an opinion on technical economic points, but might we submit the suggestion that a definite percentage of the capital expended in each area should be allocated for medical and scientific purposes; that sum to be regarded as a capital sum and not recurrent, but that the method of its expenditure should be in accordance with the primary medical needs of the area concerned. It appears to us essential - both in the Imperial and local interests - that important medical problems should have primary claim on any financial provision facilitated by this Government. This is particularly true with regard to Venereal Disease, as its dissemination will inevitably be increased unless adequate measures are taken not only among the native population but also among the Europeans engaged on the Development Works, and therefore the Imperial Government becomes directly responsible for providing medical assistance.

If desired, my Council would gladly put their ideas before you more fully through a deputation from their Parliamentary Committee if you would be willing to discuss the matter with them.
