I have the hencur to report the following resume of a communique which appeared in the press on the 9th instant in regard to the future administration of Jubaland.

Signor de stefani, Minister of Pinance, will on his return from London submit the necessary decree-law to the Council of Ministers relative to the incorporation by Italy of the Jubaland territory recently ceded to her by Great Britain. The Minister of Pinance will also give his approval to the assignment of the funds required for the first instalment of the administration of the newly-acquired territory.

Ho decision has yet been taken regarding the division of the territory into 8 Commissionerahips. There will only be appointed one High Commissioner who, with the assistance of experts, will deal with the problems of the barrage' of the Juba river and the exploitation of its waters and of the outen crop. Bix months after his arrival in the Colony he will aubmit to the Government a complete scheme for regulating the administration of the Juba territory. The decree of incorporation will have effect when the agreement between Italy and Great Britain has been ratified by the latter. Although it is not possible to predict when that ratification will take place, it is believed that the date is not far distant.
