Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that I have been notified by the Secretary of State for the Colonies that sanction has been accorded to increase the pensions of certain old Government servants of this Protectorate on the same scale as that accepted as from December 1st 1920 by the Government of India as follows:-

Pensions up to Rs. 10/- per mensem are raised by Rs. 2/-
" over Rs. 10/- up to Rs. 20/- " " " Rs. 3/-
" " Rs. 20/- " " Rs. 30/- " " " Rs. 4/-
" " Rs. 30/- " " Rs. 40/- " " " Rs. 5/-
" " Rs. 40/- " " Rs. 45/- by an amount which will bring the pension up to Rs. 45/- per mensem.

Some proportion of the pensions of the persons in this Protectorate affected by this proposal is borne by the funds of the Government of India and the sanction now accorded to the increase is qualified by the proviso that the Government of India will be willing to continue to contribute towards the increase.

The period for which sanction has been given is from January 1st 1923 subject to reconsideration at the end of May 1924.

I enclose a list of the persons affected from which it will be seen that the extra sum involved to be contributed by the Government of India is £ 17-10-3.

I should be grateful if I might be informed if the Government of India will agree to the increase.

No. 100 of the 10th July 1924, regarding
the bonus payable to non-European
pensioners, I have the honour to transmit
to you the accompanying copies of corres-

pondence with the India Office on the subject.
The position appears to be as

follows:— The Lords Commissioners of the
Treasury agreed to the Somali land non-

European pensioners residing in a rupee-
using country receiving the same treatment
as to bonus as similar employees of the

Government of India, subject to the

contribution being forthcoming from
India to the extent of Rs. 100 lakhs.

This deviation has
been approved up to the 31st May,
1924.
