The qualifications of these officers appear to be inferior and not such as will be likely to fit them for promotion. In other tropical Dependencies where the encouragement of native agriculture forms the principal duty of the Agricultural Officers it has been proved repeatedly that whilst personality, practical knowledge and the power of adaptation are allimportant, yet a thoroughly sound academic training is equally essential if the efficiency of the Department is to increase from year to year.

Officers who are suitable in other respects and possess academic qualifications superior, if possible, but at any rate not inferior to those required for a Degree or good Diploma in Arriculture may be expected, as soon a they have accustomed themselves to tropical conditions, to have a wider outlook over their work, to appreciate
