It does appear from  
A and B of Prof P letter  
that the grant of Honorary  
rank resulted in no increase  
of pay (300 super a month +  
£20 monthly) from that drawn  
as an Agent.

Neither Linti Allen or  
Keith were passed through  
the gazette for the grant of  
Temporary Honorary  
commission; but I do  
not think that it affects  
the case. We could get it  
done now if we wanted to.

The point seems to me to be  
that the Commission was  
in title and in fact  
honorary; and I cannot  
see that an officer  
appointed to an honorary  
Commission should be  
covered by the definition  
in 3 30 (1) of the Royal  
Warrant of the 2nd July 1920.

You will see that the  
Prof P has already referred  
the question to their S.A.  
Representative with inconclusive  
results.

I do not know whether it  
would be worth asking W.C.  
for an opinion. It would  
be best first writing to  
Samer Range, summarizing  
the position on the basis  
of the documents, asking  
for a statement of the status

I am directed by the Minister of Pensions to refer to the case of the late Hon. Lieutenant William John Allen, Intelligence Department, Kenya, who was transferred on 18th October, 1918, from the East African Mounted Rifles, when holding the rank of Corporal, to the Intelligence Department, as agent, and appointed Honorary Lieutenant within establishment on 1st January, 1916.

He was reported by the Officer Commanding, Cape Corps, as killed in action on 20th January, 1917, and it is now desired to confirm that Mr. Allen held commissioned rank in the East African Local Forces and received military pay as such.

A Enquiries have been addressed to the representative of this Department at Nairobi, but the information received is not sufficiently definite to enable it to be decided whether Mr. Allen, who, as an agent, is stated to have been in receipt of Rs 300/- per month and allowances, can be regarded as an "Officer" as defined by the Royal Warrant of 2nd July, 1920.

I am, therefore, to enquire whether your records indicate that Mr. Allen's status was similar to that of Major Pretorius, and other officers whose cases have been referred to this Department and whose names were published in the London Gazette of the 21st August, 1921, as having been commissions during the Great War. It is observed that Mr. Allen's name was not included in this list and the explanation of this omission would

be much appreciated.
