I am instructed to refer to Mr. Read's letter (17323/1924) of the 18th June last stating that the request of the British Medical association to be allowed to nominate a representative to serve on the Advisory Committee on East Africa should be borne in mind, and to express the hope that the desired opportunity may yet be accorded to the Association. In doing so, I am to express the satisfaction of the association at the inclusion in the personnel of the Committee of wo distinguished a representative of tropical medicine as Dr. Andrew Balfour, but at the same time to emphasise the importance of securing due weight in the deliberations of the Committee for the views of the organisation which has access to and represents the general experience of officers in the Colonial Medical Services.

The British Medical Association has for some time viewed with concern the difficulty in securing suitable candidates for appointments in these Services and is anxious to assist in finding remedy for that difficulty. In view of the prominent place given in the reference to the Committee to the improvement of the health and social conditions of the matives of East Africa and the unusual stress laid upon this aspect of the East African problem in the Deb. te on the subject in the House of Commons on April 8th last, the matter would appear to be one of very considerable importance, and the phrase used by the Secretary of State in announcing the projected appointment of the Committee, to the effect that its membership should be "representative of all sections in this House and outside" gives good grounds for the hope that the representations of the association in this matter will not be overlooked.
