I have the honour to confirm my talkgram No.290 of the 29th of June in which I informed Cession of the Province of Jubaland to Italy took place at 9.45 a.m. on that day.

His Excellency Signor Zoli landed at Kismayu at 9 a.m. on the 29th June and was met by a guard of honour of the 3rd King's African Rifles under Captain A. L. Kent-Lemon.

The Cession ceremony took place in Government Square whither Signor Zoli and his staff were accompanied by Mr. J.O.W. Hope, C.M.G., as Senior Commissioner, Jubaland, and where guards of honour of Italian Troops and of the 3rd King's African Rifles were drawn up.

- On arrival of Signor Zoli and Mr. Hope proclamations were read in the English and Italian languages; the British flag was then lowered and the Italian flag hoisted while the guards of honour presented arms.
- I attach an extract of a Press report of the Ceremony.

The ceremony at Kismayu, the Headquarters of the Province, was simple but impressive. Unfortuone of the worst monsoons known at Kismayu and the Coast, and the transportation of the troops of ocrupation from Mogadiscio to Kismanu, and the evacuation of the Pritish troops, was carried out under the worst possible conditions

H L the High Commissioner to Trans Juba, Signer Zell, arrived * Kismeyu with his staff on the same on June 28. The disemberkation of Italian troops was at once begun, and the main treet of Kismayu was lined by a mpany of K.A.R. under command of Capt. A.L.
