With reference to the Anglo-Italian Treaty dated July 15th, 1924, relating to the cession of territory in Jubaland to Italy, I am directed by Mr. Secretary Amery to transmit to you, for the consideration of Secretary Sir Auster Chamberlain, the accompanying copy of a despatch which has been received from the Governor of Kenya, regarding the effect of the Treaty upon persons of Somali origin who are natives of the Aden or British Somaliland Protectorates, and who were in the transferred territory at the time of the cession.

In accordance with the terms of the second paragraph of Article 6 of the Tresty, such individuals lose the status of British protected persons on the transfer, and acquire Italian nationality without the option of retaining that status by withdrawing. Mr. Amery would suggest that, subject to Sir Austen Chamberlain's concurrence, the position of Somalis in this category should be represented to the Italian authorities, with a view to obtaining the agreement of the Italian Government to the interpretation of this portion of the Treaty in the manner proposed above.
