I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Sir H. Reads letter of the 1st December last ^{Final} (67295/1920) and subsequent semi-official correspondence further regarding the proposed grant of an allowance to the officers deputed to act for the Governors of the Dependencies of Eastern Africa during the periods when the latter are on tour away from headquarters.

In reply I am to request you to inform the Secretary of State for the Colonies that in deference to his further representations My Lords are now prepared to sanction the reimbursement of necessary expenditure on entertaining actually incurred by the deputies up to a maximum of £1 per diem.
