Sir,

With reference to Lord Milner's Confidential despatch of 10th November, 1920, I have the honour to transmit herewith a memorial addressed to yourself by Bhag Singh son of Thakur Singh, late of the Conservancy Department, Mombasa, appealing against a local decision that he was not eligible for a pension on retirement from the service.

2. The petitioner, who writes from Lahore, India, states that he has forwarded three copies of this memorial direct to the Colonial Office.

3. The post held by the petitioner was not a pensionable one, and his emoluments were less than £100 per annum, the minimum for a pensionable appointment.

4. With reference to the statement in paragraph 1 of the memorial that Mr. Sanderson, Superintendent of Conservancy, had recommended the petitioner for an increase of salary, there is no record of this, and Mr. Sanderson has now left the Service.

5. The two officials quoted by the petitioner in paragraph 4 of his memorial, Umi Ram and Abdulla Zena, both held pensionable appointments, as approved
