397. 13th November. Legislative Council has unanimously passed amendment to Municipal Corporation Ordinance authorising regulation as well as suppression of Brothers by rules to be approved by Governor in Council. I understand that Bishop of Mombasa is protesting to Archbishop of Canterbury May I assent to Amendment which I consider highly desirable.

My dear Lord Duke,

I have received a letter from the Bishop of Mombasa—a very ressonable and capable man—a copy of which I enclose. He sends also a cutting from the East African Standard, Kenya. In that report the attorney General of the Colony is said to have urged that by putting in the words 'suppress or regulate' instead of words originally proposed—the mere words 'regulation of brothels'—"there would be a better chance of obtaining the Secretary of State's sanction", The Governor—then added "that he did not think that the Secretary of State would agree to the word 'regulation' only". Accordingly the Resolution was modified by the insertion of the words 'suppression or' with a view to conciliating the Secretary of State.

I am quite sure that if it became known in England that rules were receiving the sanction of the Secretary of State which provided for the regulation of brothels" there would be a considerable outcry. There are few subjects upon which those who think on these subjects feel more strongly, and it is quite clear that you ought to know what is passing. I think the Bistop of Benkey is a man to whose opinion on such a matter real weight may be attached. He was for many years in India where he was much trusted and

My dear Lord Archbishop,

I was horrified to read in our local paper this norming that in the Municipal Corporation Bill now before the Legislative Council powers were asked for the "regulation of brothels". I had not the faintest idea that the matter was coming up and have had no time to consult others with a view to concerted action. I shall write unofficially to the Colonial Secretary here and inform him that I am writing to you by the mail that leaves to-morrow, for of course the sanction of the Becretary of State for the Colonies is necessary before the law can be passed in this form, and I am anxious that those at home who have influence and feel deeply on the matter should be able at any rate to prevent a clause like this being rushed. The Chaplain of the Scotch Church here has promised similarly to write to the authorities of his Church. Whowing that I can count on Your Crace's sympathy, advice, and help,

Your letter of the 6th about the proposed regulation of brothels in Kenya did not come to me as a surprise, as the Governor had informed me by telegraph that the Bishop of Mombasa had sent a protest to you.

The position is that the provision was passed by the Lagislative Council but that the Governor, very properly, withheld his consent pending my approval.

That approval I have refused to give until I have full information on the subject by despatch, and you may be assured that when I deal with the matter I shall bear carefully in mind what you say and the strong feeling (which of course the Colonial Office appropriates) which exists in this country against any measure of the kind,

I must, as you will realise, give full consideration to what may be put before me as to the desirability of such a measure in the local circumstances, but you will

appreciate

appreciate from the attitude which I have already adopted that there is no danger of any hasty accepta of the local view.
